

Dear Honorable Mayor Edmund Brown,

My name is Edward Baraona, I am 19 years old and I am seeking a position on the Oakland Youth Commission. I grew up in San Francisco in the home of poor yet strong working women, in the south of market district near downtown. My sister and I have been the vulnerable victims of eviction since I was 10 years old. For that reason after living with friends and eventually my grandmother, we were blessed to reside in our home in West Oakland. After high school I decided to take advantage of my abilities in directing and cinematography of documentaries funded by citizen film productions. On my arrival from my latest project in Israel, I returned to school and quickly adapted to the Laney Theatre company, debuting a performance on stage and making friends. I am currently an English major at Laney College.

After entering the workforce from welfare, my mother had no time for my sister and me. She was devoted entirely to cleaning houses and looking after people who were unrelated to our family. She, however, did this for our sake to pay for electricity and food, and did *her best to help with our homework. After my father's death during my years in elementary school, she became both a mother and a father. She worked everyday, and at times I would find her crying outside in the hallway, for we lived in a studio apartment without a room to release her sentiments. Crying and knowing that she could no longer afford the rent. We spent a few months living in houses of close friends of my mother. We were then left with the options of living in with my grandmother who struggled to meet the demands of rent money and bills and to move out into the streets to join a shelter program. With my grandmother, at least we had a home. The only luxury was that of a color television that helped us forget that we were poor even if for just an hour or so. My mother and grandmother earned so little each month; a dollar was enough to excite me.*

My remembrance of moving once again continues to burn in my memory. The rents were raised and we therefore found a home but almost on the brink of living out in the cold. The stretching of my mothers' labor time and crunching of her wages and detachment from her children was the worst form of involuntary neglect. After a hard day of work, the highest part of the day was anticipated for the next episode of stories in novellas (Spanish soap operas) on the television. It is almost as if her American dreams melt as she spends time with my sister in front of the TV. From an angle, each day is as mundane as the previous, especially for my grandmother who stopped going to work after her sickness took over her aging body. Her life is quite simple, either she watches television or sits out on the porch waiting for the sun to sink behind houses, her only view of a sunset. She is slowly waiting for the end of the day. At times when I come back home a little late, I see my grandmothers' face glow with colors and sounds of the images on the screen of the television in the darkness of the living room, but I also see something more vile and horrifying. I see a glimpse of my mother's future, after her energy has expired.

I know that I am not the only one who has absorbed these experiences. There are many people in the world who suffer a much worse fate than I. In my neighborhood however

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the solution to stretch wages is through illegal and life threatening ways. The deep supply of addictive drugs sold to the homeless and teens that visit and wander throughout our streets during the afternoon is just a fraction of examples and situations. There is no future or hope but a circumstance that paralyzes our existence from attaining or attempting our dreams. They are attracted to temporary pleasures after their abandonment by their mothers, their fathers who are entrapped in the struggle towards avoiding blackouts of electricity and starving stomachs, in the repetitive, passionless devotion we call work. This feeds on the impatience and temptation to the fast and easy dollar. To boldly risk not only time in jail as a consequence, but death as a possibility in the games of high stakes. The game I resisted with all of my might, despite pains while growing up with nothing but dreams beyond the streets of shattered dreams.

Take a look at Oakland youth in the afternoon wandering throughout the streets, while parents work afternoon night shifts or at home after a long day at the job. The violence that takes place on the streets against the innocent over trivial matters is only one of the many aspects of time spent away from our own children. Invite Oakland citizens and civil service members to the homes, and experience the reality of living poor. These are merely the few examples the people of Oakland are compelled to face because in extreme cases such as midnight or afternoon homicides, witnesses will fear to come forward. It is not easy to risk being a Good Samaritan since the price adds to the annual rate of deaths of the city. I would personally write and mail letters addressing the problems to the legislative chamber members as an appointed member of the Youth Commission. I would personally hand one for each council member in their office to no longer consider them as politicians or civic workers but as friends to me and my neighbors. If all else fails these problems must be addressed in simple and clear presentations of visuals, testimonials, and the rekindling of faith of the city among people throughout poor neighborhoods. Oakland cannot afford to ignore these issues. The cost of one young life is already too high.

I offer my honesty and capabilities of taking a stand without falling apart. I will stand with my beliefs and viewpoints for justice and social change. I offer my persistence to tackle such issues with the influence and power appointed to me. I will lend my ears to the wisdom and knowledge of my colleagues with the greatest amount of respect and consistency. Above all I offer a spirit of commitment and leadership because I look forward to working with an intelligent group of people to serve the needs and issues that Oaklanders face today.

The future holds many possibilities, and one I hope to pursue is the mayor's office. In fact, the position of mayor is barely the beginning of my journey; I know that with my communication and presentation skills, I will strive to become Senator of California. My goals at this moment are to transfer into a prestigious university and continue in a school of law, Yale. Nothing is stopping me and therefore I will achieve my dreams with constant persistence and hard work, and maybe a bit of luck! The city of Oakland is not only home but my refuge, and I therefore owe this city everything I can offer.



My name is Craig Gentry. I was born in Oakland and lived here until I was age six. At that time, my family relocated to San Leandro, CA where we resided for another ten years; however I stayed between my grandparents home in Oakland and my own. During this time, I attended elementary school at Corvallis, middle school at Washington Manor and two years of high school at San Lorenzo High. I attended Deer Valley High School in Antioch, CA for my junior and senior years of high school. Throughout my K-12 grade education, I had exceptional grades graduating with a 3.8 cumulative GPA and I participated in many clubs at my school including the Black Student Committee where I held the position as the historian as well as the Math Club. I was also the youth director at my church and the Vice-Chair of the Oakland Youth Commission my senior year of high school. Currently, I attend San Francisco State University as a sophomore where I am also a member of the Black Student Union and plan to run for junior class officer next school year.

Violence is the number one issue that youth in my community face. Violence that stems from gangs, drugs, or mentality and is constantly surrounding Oakland's youth. *Many of the issues that youth in Oakland face are extremely apparent and can be witnessed by youth as well as adults. I do not think that it is necessary to further address the issues because the media does every time someone is murdered or convicted of crimes. What I think the youth commission and the city of Oakland need to focus on is drawing attention to the positive things that are going on in Oakland such as Youth Uprising, a very popular place for teens to go after school, and the mural project that the youth commission worked so hard to have put up. Once people begin to see that there are things to do in Oakland other than selling drugs and being involved in gangs, they will want to join and I know this because I did and I'm sure the rest of the commissioners can testify to as well. Oakland's youth participate in many negative things because of boredom and if there were more places and events for youth to go to, that element would be virtually eliminated.*

I would be a great addition to the commission because I was a very influential in the events that we have put on the past few years that were very successful. Youth Recognition Day and International Youth Day were both events that I dedicated a large portion of my time to along with a few other consistent commissioners. I also have many more ideas that I believe would be an asset to the commission and how it can go about effectively changing how youth in Oakland are perceived.





Oakland's Youth Commission Application

Letter of Intent

To Whom It May Concern:

During my summer internship at the Oakland Mayor's Office I learned that some of the many issues that are affecting youth today are truancy, violence, and teen pregnancy. After being involved with Coro I have started to look in to these issues in more depth by a conducting logic study on how youth can obtain a higher education and workshops with youth on how truancy affects the school budget. Also the Latino youth are faced with school drop out problems even in the middle school level. I believe the cause of this problem may be a lack of motivation and a tendency not to set goals for themselves. Youth leaders in our community have a responsibility to do something about these issues and I believe the Oakland's Youth Commission is the perfect place to start for a youth. If a part of the Oakland's Youth Commission I will be creative to find solutions to the problems brought to the table and support the growing youth movement in Oakland.

I've actually learned to live with this, and because of her business trips, I've gotten the experience of traveling to New York multiple times, and going on my first vacation to Hawaii (very fun I must say!) My dad is a professor and administrator at UC Berkeley, so because of him, I get to attend many events at the university, exposing me to many different issues that are going on in the world. There are so many people from Oakland and the Bay Area who are making a name for themselves and leading a full life. And I'm sure that there will be more to come. So far, those are a few ideas and a few solutions, although I'm not sure if they'll work, but anything is worth a try. These issues are why I want to be on the Oakland Youth Commission—so I can make a stand and a difference within our community.

For college, I would love to either stay in California and potentially attend a UC, or go to the East Coast and attend a school there. I know total opposites, but I can't get enough of either of them, and I really don't know much about what's in the middle of the two, so that's how that decision came to be. The colleges I would like to attend in the future or apply to are: UCLA, USC, UC Berkeley, Stanford, UCSD, NYU, Columbia, Harvard, and Yale. I have high expectations for myself, and hopefully will achieve and follow through with them. I'd like to go to graduate school after college at one of the universities that I listed above, too. So as to my future profession, I'm not quite sure, but I have an idea of the careers I might want to do. When I was younger, I really wanted to be a grocery store bagger—I mean I even had the fake fruit, and a little play scanner that I made—but luckily, I have grown out of that stage. Now I'm thinking of being a lawyer like my mother, a doctor because I love all those medical shows and it looks intriguing, or some role in the media (not like the tabloids or anything, or even an actress, or singer) I might even combine two of the three professions, and be an entertainment lawyer or something like that. Children know nothing of the world and for them to experience such a disaster is troubling. The neighborhood I was raised in was filled with violence, but I maintained isolated from the neighborhood corruption.

Whenever I see her or talk to her, I become more aware and determined to work harder in school and be understanding among all people. I try my best to avoid judgment. 
