RE: **A Resolution Authorizing The City Administrator To Enter Into Grant Agreements Not To Exceed Total Allocation Of \$673,362, With Agencies Selected Under The City Of Oakland's 2008-09 Permanent Access To Housing (PATH) Strategy To Provide Housing And Services To The Homeless; To Allocate \$133,000 In Match Funds To East Oakland Community Project For The 2008-09 Families In Transition Program; To Release A Second Request For Proposals Under The 2008-2009 PATH Strategy To Fill Service Gaps, Total Allocation Not To Exceed \$128,574; To Allocate Up To \$52,750 In Match Funds To East Oakland Community Project For The 2008-09 Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program (MCTHP); To Allocate Funds To Cover 2008/2009 Lease Cost At The MCTHP Facility In The Amount Of \$36,000; And To Allocate \$10,000 To The City's 2008/2009 Hunger Program**

SUMMARY

The Oakland City Council authorized, under Resolution No. 81105, C.M.S., the issuance of a Request For Proposal (RFP) under the City of Oakland's 2008-09 Permanent Access To Housing (PATH) Strategy supported by \$811,936 in funding available under the City's Emergency Shelter Grant, Emergency Housing, and Winter Relief Programs. The RFP was released in April 2008. Out of the ten applicant agencies who responded to the RFP, five were selected to be recommended for funding. The rank and review process was conducted by a panel of disinterested parties from homeless housing, services and advocacy disciplines. The agencies recommended for funding are described and submitted for approval in this report.

The City of Oakland receives an annual grant from the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) under the Supportive Housing Program (SHP) for the Families In Transition (FIT) program, a scattered site transitional housing program operated by the East Oakland Community Project (EOCP). The SHP grant awards the City \$245,146 for the FIT program and requires a local match amount for those funds. The City provides an annual allocation of \$133,000 from its Emergency Housing Program (General Purpose Fund), to satisfy the match requirement. Authorization to provide this amount for match is also included in this resolution.

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Under the 2008-09 PATH RFP process, City staff worked with the review panel to evaluate the objectives of the selected applications against the objectives of PATH in order to discover the service gaps still existing. The identified gaps include, but are not limited to, housing support and services for youth, singles, re-entry population and families. Staff is recommending that the City Council authorize the release of a second RFP that specifically targets service gaps only.

The City of Oakland receives an annual grant from the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) under the Supportive Housing Program (SHP) for the Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program (MCTHP), one of the City's transitional housing programs operated by the East Oakland Community Project (EOCP). The SHP grant awards the City \$259,432 for the MCTHP and requires a local match amount for those funds. The City provides an annual allocation up to \$52,750 from its Community Promotions Program for Service Organizations (General Purpose Fund), to satisfy the match requirement. Authorization to provide this amount for match is also included in this resolution. In addition, staff seeks authorization to allocate \$36,000 to cover the lease cost of the MCTHP facility owned by HOPE Housing, Inc. Hope Housing has agreed to a reduced rate of \$36,000 per year to cover lease of the MCTHP, a 14-unit apartment building on 84th Avenue in Oakland, which houses one of the City's transitional housing programs.

Lastly, staff seeks authorization to allocate \$10,000 to the City's Hunger Program to cover costs within the 2008-09 Hunger Program food distributions and special events. Staff anticipates a decrease in at least one of its customary fund sources for the 2008/2009 program year. This allocation will aid in covering said decrease, while providing services at the levels provided during the 2007/2008 Hunger Program year.

FISCAL IMPACT

Funds to support recommended activities under the 2008-09 PATH Strategy, fund matches and lease costs for the 2008-09 Families In Transition Program and 2008-09 Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program, and to support the Hunger Program are available from the following fund sources:

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BACKGROUND

Permanent Access To Housing (PATH) Strategy

The Oakland PATH Strategy is an Oakland specific companion to the Alameda County-wide EveryOne Home Plan. The EveryOne Home Plan is a roadmap for ending homelessness in the county over the next fifteen years by way of housing and wrap-around support services to homeless people in Alameda County and to those living with serious mental health illnesses and HIV/AIDS. Both PATH and EveryOne Home are based on a Housing First program model that emphasizes rapid client access to permanent housing rather than prolonged stays in shelters and transitional housing.

Implementation of a Housing First approach will not necessarily result in an immediate elimination of emergency shelter and/or transitional housing services. The Housing First approach is commonly implemented through four primary stages:

1. Crisis Intervention and Short-Term Stabilization
2. Screening, Intake and Needs Assessment
3. Provision of Housing Resources
4. Provision of Case Management

In order to implement these four stages, the PATH Strategy focuses on both housing development activities to provided needed housing resources, and realignment of the service delivery system to support the transition to a Housing First approach.

PATH Strategy implementation priorities² are summarized as follows:

1. Housing Resources
2. Rapid Re-Housing Services
3. Preventing Homelessness

Agencies recommended in this report for funding under the 2008-09 PATH Strategy will be contracted to work within the PATH priorities listed above. The same for those agencies selected for funding under the second RFP to be released under the 2008-09 PATH RFP as it applies to, but not limited to the following identified service gaps:

- Rent and Utility Subsidies
- Move-In Costs
- Eviction Prevention (*housing cost only, not staff cost*)

- Housing Specialist Services
- Hotel/Motel Vouchers
- Domestic Violence Housing/Housing Services
- Re-entry and Veteran Housing/Housing Services

Families In Transition Program & Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program

The City of Oakland has annually received awards under the SuperNOFA process to fund the City's Families In Transition (FIT) program and the Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program, respectively. These two programs provide housing to families for up to twenty four months with support services to assist families in reaching a sustainable level of self sufficiency and, ultimately to prepare these families for permanent housing.

HUD's Supportive Housing Program (SHP) requires a funding match and the City provides the match funds from its Emergency Housing Program's annual allocation in the amount of \$133,000 and from its Community Promotions Program for Service Organizations (CPPSO) annual allocation in the amount of \$52,750.

The East Oakland Community Project (EOCP) is the contracted agency under the FIT program. A grant agreement has been executed between the City and EOCP for the HUD funded portion of the FIT program. Staff wishes to amend the contract, to add the mandatory match funding. EOCP is currently the contracted agency for the Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program as well. This grant agreement is to be renewed in October 2008 for the 2008/2009 program year.

KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

Demographics of People At Risk of Homelessness in Oakland

In addition to the 6,300 people who are homeless in Oakland over the course of a year, there are approximately 17,200 more people with serious and persistent mental illness and/or HIV/AIDS who are living in precarious or inappropriate situations. These estimated 17,200 people represent 11,128 house-holds and are at extreme risk of homelessness due to their disabilities and extremely low incomes defined as at or below 30% of Area Median Income (AMI).

Housing Needs of Homeless and At Risk People

There are a total of 15,115 households in Oakland that are either homeless or at risk of homelessness:

- 3,987 homeless households; and,
- 11,128 households at risk of homelessness.

These 15,115 households have a variety of housing needs. Some need short term financial assistance or other support services to prevent them from becoming homeless. Some need affordable housing, meaning a housing unit that costs no more than 30% of their income, which is accessible to people who have extremely low incomes. Many, particularly those who have

disabilities and have been homeless for a long period of time, need supportive housing. Supportive housing is permanent housing that is affordable for people with extremely low incomes that includes onsite supportive services that are designed to help tenants stay housed and work to meet other self-directed goals, such as improving health status, obtaining employment or making connections to the community. It differs from affordable housing in that affordable housing generally includes only very limited or no onsite services. Supportive housing has been proven to be a very effective model for ending homelessness for people who have serious disabilities and other complex problems.

Using the methodology established in EveryOne Home, PATH has determined that:

- 7,380 households need permanent affordable and, where needed, supportive housing; and,
- 7,735 need short term assistance to prevent or end their homelessness, such as short-term rent or mortgage subsidy or a short stay in an emergency shelter.

While the City of Oakland has a significant inventory of affordable housing, there are very long waiting lists for these units and most of them do not have supportive services. There is a tremendous unmet need for housing for the 7,380 households who need permanent housing affordable to people with extremely low incomes. Therefore, PATH contends that homelessness can be prevented or ended for these 7,380 households only by creating affordable and supportive housing units affordable to those with extremely low incomes.

The five agencies recommended for funding under the 2008-2009 PATH Strategy will provide a combination of housing and services, resulting in households achieving stability in permanent housing (by way of housing with wrap-around services). The following are brief descriptions of the five programs selected for funding under the 2008/2009 PATH Strategy:

<u>AGENCY</u>	<u>RECOMMENDED FUNDING</u>
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St. Mary's Center	\$100,000
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St. Mary's Center Senior PATH program is an integration of services needed to move seniors from homelessness to permanent housing. This program also aids seniors in maintaining housing. Services include, but are not limited to winter shelter for seniors, homeless case management, mental health services, substance abuse programs, income management, daily meals and other services to assist seniors in finding and maintaining permanent housing.

Lifelong Medical Care	\$236,567
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This program includes integrated, on-site resident services at the Harrison Hotel to support 81 single adult residents in maintaining housing and improving their quality of life while contributing to the community. Services provided by Lifelong Medical Care at the Harrison Hotel in Oakland serves people who are homeless with mental health and substance abuse issues, HIV/AIDS disabilities, and other homeless sub-populations.

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First Place For Youth

\$137,500

This program provides supportive housing services to 20 homeless youth with a special focus on former foster care youth. Housing is secured for the 20 youth at the Madison Apartments (a 79 unit permanent affordable housing facility). Services provided with housing are targeted to eliminate experiences of homelessness for youth in Oakland. Assistance is provided to secure and maintain safe and stable housing, learn crucial employment readiness skills and resource advocacy.

East Oakland Community Project

\$140,000

The East Oakland Community Project (EOCP) operates the new Crossroads homeless service facility, providing temporary accommodations for single adults and families, including people living with HIV/AIDS. The program is geared to address the rapid re-housing needs of clients while at the same time addressing the issues that challenge them attaining this objective. Services are provided to the Crossroads clients to assist them into more stable living situations, including transitional and/or permanent housing.

East Bay Community Law Center

\$59,295

This program provides homeless prevention services and assists low-income residents with housing issues, many of whom are at risk of becoming homeless in the absence of advocacy services. Staff and students of this agency provide rental housing tenant workshops, landlord negotiations, legal assistance and community education to low-income Oakland residents to assist their clients in maintaining stable housing.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: PATH Strategy activities, Hunger Program activities and Transitional Housing programs for homeless provide opportunities for stability, training and support that assist them in transitioning to self-sufficiency and economic independence.

Environmental: The provision of housing for homeless persons is intended to address the environmental degradation caused by homeless families and individuals living on the streets.

Social Equity: The expenditure of these City funds provides for the most basic of human needs and assists the homeless to become reintegrated into society.

DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

The programs and services recommended for funding in this report are accessible to disabled persons and seniors.

RECOMMENDATION(S) AND RATIONALE

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Administrator to execute grant agreements under the 2008-09 PATH Strategy not to exceed a total allocation of \$673,362; to approve a the release of a second RFP under the 2008-09 PATH Strategy to fill service gaps not to exceed total allocation


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of \$128,574; to authorize the City Administrator to increase the award amount by \$133,000 for a grant agreement between the City of Oakland and East Oakland Community Project, providing HUD mandated match funding; to authorize an allocation of \$10,000 to the City's Hunger program from funds available under the City's Emergency Shelter Grant; to authorize allocations of \$36,000 and \$52,750 to cover lease costs and fund match requirements for the City's Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program.

ACTION REQUESTED OF THE CITY COUNCIL

That the Council approve the resolution authorizing the City Administrator to enter into grant agreements not to exceed total allocation of \$673,362, with agencies selected under the City of Oakland's 2008-09 Permanent Access To Housing (PATH) Strategy to provide housing and services to the homeless; to allocate \$133,000 in match funds to East Oakland Community Project for the 2008-09 Families In Transition Program; to release a second request for proposals under the 2008-2009 PATH strategy to fill service gaps, total allocation not to exceed \$128,574; to allocate up to \$52,750 in match funds to East Oakland Community Project for the 2008-09 Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program (MCTHP); to allocate funds to cover 2008/2009 lease cost at the MCTHP facility in the amount of \$36,000; and to allocate \$10,000 to the City's 2008/2009 Hunger Program.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO ENTER INTO GRANT AGREEMENTS NOT TO EXCEED TOTAL ALLOCATION OF \$673,362, WITH AGENCIES SELECTED UNDER THE CITY OF OAKLAND'S 2008-09 PERMANENT ACCESS TO HOUSING (PATH) STRATEGY TO PROVIDE HOUSING AND SERVICES TO THE HOMELESS; TO ALLOCATE \$133,000 IN MATCH FUNDS TO EAST OAKLAND COMMUNITY PROJECT FOR THE 2008-09 FAMILIES IN TRANSITION PROGRAM; TO RELEASE A SECOND REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS UNDER THE 2008-2009 PATH STRATEGY TO FILL SERVICE GAPS, TOTAL ALLOCATION NOT TO EXCEED \$128,574; TO ALLOCATE UP TO \$52,750 IN MATCH FUNDS TO EAST OAKLAND COMMUNITY PROJECT FOR THE 2008-09 MATILDA CLEVELAND TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM (MCTHP); TO ALLOCATE FUNDS TO COVER 2008/2009 LEASE COST AT THE MCTHP FACILITY IN THE AMOUNT OF \$36,000; AND TO ALLOCATE \$10,000 TO THE CITY'S 2008/2009 HUNGER PROGRAM

WHEREAS, Oakland City Council Resolution No. 79923 C.M.S. authorizes the development of the Oakland Permanent Access To Housing (PATH) Strategy to end homelessness in the next ten years, and

WHEREAS, the PATH Strategy is a companion to the Alameda County-wide EveryOne Home Plan, a three tiered system to ending homelessness, combining housing and service priorities for homeless, persons with HIV/AIDS, and persons with mental health care needs; and

WHEREAS, Oakland City Council Resolution No. 81105 C.M.S. authorizes the issuance of a 2008/2009 Request For Proposal (RFP) for homeless programs and services under the City of Oakland's Permanent Access To Housing (PATH) Strategy, funded under the City of Oakland's Emergency Shelter Grant, Emergency Housing and Winter Relief Programs; and

WHEREAS, a panel of homeless service provider professionals reviewed and ranked the proposals submitted under said RFP; and

WHEREAS, said panel recommended funding to five agencies for a total allocation of \$673,362, from the \$811,936 made available per Oakland City Council Resolution 81105 C.M.S.; and

WHEREAS, from the \$811,936 in funds committed to the 2008-09 PATH Strategy, there is a balance of \$138,574 from available Emergency Shelter Grant; and

WHEREAS, staff wishes to release a second PATH RFP to allocate \$128,574 for service gaps not filled by the five agencies selected under the first 2008/2009 PATH RFP process leaving a balance of \$10,000 available funds; and,

WHEREAS, funding for the 2008-2009 Hunger Program is needed to support Hunger Program activities in the amount of \$10,000, said funds available from the balance of unallocated PATH Strategy funds from Fund 2103 (HUD), Organization 78111 (Community Housing Services), Project G270710 (2006/2007 Emergency Shelter Grant Program, and now, therefore, be it

WHEREAS, staff desires to fund in amounts not to exceed those listed below, the following agencies under the 2008-09 PATH Strategy:

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland has received a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in the amount of \$245,146, under the Supportive Housing Program (SHP) to support the City's 2008/2009 Families In Transition program, a transitional housing program operated by the East Oakland Community Project; and said SHP grant requires that the City provide \$133,000 in matching funds for the supportive services and operations budget line items of the grant ; and

WHEREAS, a grant agreement has been executed between the City and East Oakland Community Project for the HUD funded portion of the FIT program and the agreement needs to be amended to add the mandatory match funding and increase the award amount by \$133,000; and

WHEREAS, funds are available to support said match requirement from the 2008-09 Emergency Housing Program allocation of \$248,000 in fund 1010 (General Purpose Fund), 78111 (Community Housing Services), 54912 (Third Party Contracts), G306810 (Emergency Housing Program); and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland has received a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in the amount of \$259,432, under the Supportive Housing Program (SHP) to support the City's 2008/2009 Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program, a transitional housing program operated by the East Oakland Community Project; and said SHP grant requires that the City provide \$50,000-\$52,750 in matching funds for the supportive services and operations budget line items of the grant ; and

WHEREAS, an annual allocation of \$52,750 is made from the City's Community Promotions Program for Support Service Organizations (CPPSO) to support match funding requirements for the HUD funded Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program (MCTHP) and said funds are in fund 1010 (General Purpose Fund), 78111 (Community Housing Services), G309610 (CPPSO); and

WHEREAS, the City does not have funds budgeted to cover lease costs of the Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program and staff has identified budget savings in a 2007/2008 allocation for lease costs in the amount of \$36,000 from Fund (2108) Community Development Block Grant, Organization 78111 (Community Housing Services); Project G168550 (Shelter Lease Savings); and now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council authorizes the allocation of available 2006/2007 and 2008/2009 Emergency Shelter Grant, Emergency Housing Program, Winter Relief Program , and Community Promotions Program of Service Organization funds to support contracts under the 2008/2009 PATH Strategy, Families In Transition Program, Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Program and Hunger Program; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Administrator or her designee as agent of the City is hereby authorized to negotiate and enter into Agreements with the five agencies identified above in an amount not to exceed a total of \$673,368 for 2008-09, for the purpose of providing housing and services to the homeless; and to conduct all negotiations, execute and submit all documents and including but not limited to applications, agreements, amendments, modifications, payment requests, and related action which may be necessary in accordance with this Resolution and its basic purpose; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: Funds to support PATH Strategy contracts and activities listed above shall be supported by funds available in funds: [1] 2103 (HUD), Organization 78111 (Community Housing Services), Project G270710 (2006-2007 Emergency Shelter Grant); [2] 1010 (General Purpose Fund), Organization 78111 (Community Housing Services), Project G168410 and G306810 (2006-2007 & 2008-2009 Emergency Housing Program); [3] 2108 (Community Development Block Grant-CDBG), Organization 78111, Project G168610 (2007-2008 and 2008-2009 Winter Relief Program; and [4] 2103 (HUD), Organization 78111 (Community Housing Services), Project G306210 (2008-2009 Emergency Shelter Grant); and be it
