Economic Trends Based on Most Recent Indicators Report and East Bay Economic Outlook, East Bay Economic Development Alliance	Actions/Outcome The City of Oakland economy continues to show signs of recovery, generally matching regional trends as documented in April's Economic Indicators Report prepared by staff: Oakland is home to nearly a quarter of the jobs available in Alameda County. Unemployment in Oakland stood at 10.4% as of May 2013 compared to 8.1% for the Stale. The Oakland –Fremont-Hayward metropolitan district unemployment rate ending May was 6.7%. With more than 200 firms supporting approximately 3.500 jobs, Oakland's Green and Clean lech sector grew in size during the downturn. Oakland's office sector overall (downtown and beyond) continues to have about an 11% vacancy rate.
		 Oakland's industrial market has one of the lowest vacancy rates in the East Bay al 6.13%. Oakland-East Bay area is the hottest housing market in the country; home prices rose by 31.2 % from May 2012 to May 2013. 		The May 2013 East Bay Economic Outlook, produced by Beacon Economics and published by East Bay Economic Development Alliance, reports:
		 Office properties remain in greater demand throughout Alameda County, with Oakland's Central Business District having the lowest vacancy rate (11.8%) and the highest average rent (\$28.67/sq. ft.) in Alameda County. Total household employment in the East Bay has increased 2.5% in the year ending March 2013, leaving the regional unemployment rate at 7.7% compared to the statewide rate of 9.4%. Employment in the service sectors, including administrative support and leisure and hospitality have seen some of the biggest job growth in recent years.

	 The housing market is rebounding quickly, and employment in the construction sector (up 9.9% in the year ending March 2013) is tracking with that rebound. The East Bay's manufacturing sector is also expected to change its prior course and show positive growth of 1.9% in 2013. The East Bay serves as a national hub for entrepreneurship, as well as sustainable and environmentally friendly business, exemplified by our concentration of B-corporations (defined as meeting "rigorous standards of social and environmental performance, accountability, and transparency"). Of 162 such firms in California, Oakland is home to 14 of them, including Sungevity, One Pacific Coast Bank, Revolution Foods, Give Something Back, Numi Organic Tea, and Wendel Rosen, meaning that although Oakland has just over 1% of California's population, it is home to over 8.5% of the companies.

Second Quarter of 2013 in Oakland's Key Economic Sectors	Economic Development Strategy, focusing on Action Plans for the Food & Beverage and Creative Industries sectors.
	 Food & Beverage Sector: Hope Collaborative Food Hub Analysis: Staff continued to advise the HOPE Collaborative on the development of a feasibility study and business plan to establish a food hub serving Oakland and the Bay Area. The Collaborative is currently seeking an Owner/Operator (produce wholesalers and marketers). The business plan will explore the feasibility of a stand-alone business, a social enterprise arm of HOPE Collaborative, or a joint venture opportunity. Additionally, the facility could serve as an anchor tenant/business where other local food businesses could co-locate. Creative Industry Sector: Launch of Oakland Makers Group: Staff facilitated and helped launch Oakland Makers (www.oaklandmakers.org) to celebrate Oakland's creative "maker" economy: technology, industrial business including specializing in industrial arts, applied technology, artisan production, custom manufacturing and education. The launch event at the Beasley Sculpture Garden on May 22, 2013 attracted 125 "makers" and featured three national speakers on the U.S. manufacturing

- o Popuplicod Innovation Center Collaborated with Real Estate Services for permits and lease negotiation with Popuphood in 1 Frank Ogawa Plaza (including a sublease with HUB Oakland - a co-working space). Purpose was to increase Oakland's exposure as a location for creative and innovation sectors.
- Continued participation on the East Bay Economic Development Alliance on Advanced Manufacturing Initiative Taskforce.

Green & Clean Sector:

- Co-produced Oakland: Building Green Business: 2013 supplement to the S.F.
 Business Times' featuring Oakland's growing green business sector. Firms
 featured were Integral Group, Mosaic, SfunCube, Lucid, DR3 Mattress Recycling,
 and Asphalt Shingle Recyclers.
- Sponsored Launch of SfunCube Solar Accelerator: City sponsored launch of the Bay Area's first solar entrepreneurial incubator, co-located with Sungevity, Jack London Square. The event was also linked to a business briefing for the Cleantech Open 2013. Cleantech Open is the world's largest accelerator for Cleantech startups, with eight active regions. In June, Cleantech named Bright Source Energy of Oakland to the Global Cleantech Top 100 List. BrightSource Energy, Inc., headquartered in Oakland, designs, develops, and deploys solar thermal technology to produce high-value electricity and steam for power, petroleum, and industrial-process markets worldwide.

Healthcare Sector:

Impacts of the Affordable Care Act: The Act includes a variety of measures specifically for small businesses that help lower premium cost growth and increase access lo quality, affordable health insurance. Depending on whether an individual is self-employed, an employer with fewer than 25 employees, an employer with fewer than 50 employees, or an employer with 50 or more employees, different provisions of the Affordable Care Act may apply. The Affordable Care Act health insurance reforms will roll out in phases, many of which will occur in 2013 and 2014. Staff is working with SBA Regional Office IX and various Chambers of Commerce to provide information and training to Oakland businesses. See:

Staff is working with the University's broker to identify locations. Samuel Merritt University offers degrees at the undergraduate and graduate level in five academic disciplines: Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Physician Assistant, Physical Therapy and Pediatric Medicine. The University has a student population of approximately 1,400 students, of which the majority attends the Oakland campus.

Strategic Initiatives AC Transit Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Business Impact Mitigation Program: Economic Development is the lead for the review of AC Transit BRT Business Mitigation Program. Activities involve community outreach, AC Transit coordination as well as coordination with PWA, Housing, and CAO offices. Goal is to engage business and community groups on the BRT route regarding impacts and solutions. July 9th Report to PWA Committee. Oakland Sustainable Neighborhood Initiative: As one of eight U.S. cities chosen to participate, ED Manager attended EcoDistricts Incubator training in Portland, Oregon with five other team members from Oakland. Funded by the Enterprise Foundation, the training will assist in the International Blvd. Sustainable Communities Grant Project. Oakland Fiber-Optics Initiative Working Group: Supporting the Department of Information Technology in their effort to (a) develop a citywide broadband strategy and (b) implement a fiber-optic pilot project in the Oakland Airport Business Park. Kiva Zip Trustee Partnership: Economic Development staff led the effort to develop a Trustee partnership with Kiva. This was approved by City Council, making Oakland the first municipality to operate as a Trustee of this innovative small business, crowd-sourcing financing program. The Port of Oakland is one of the major property owners. Given Tideland Trust responsibilities of the Port, staff has been involved in the development of an agreement with the Port and City to facilitate the Port's full participation in the district. July 16th is Public Hearing date for ballot count. City Council approved annual reports for four BIDs/CBDs (Koreatown/Northgate, Downtown Oakland, Lake Merritt/Uptown, Fruitvale BIDs). Staff designed and City Council approved a new CBD Formation Grant Program to help support the creation of new CBD/BIDS. Continued participation in Downtown Oakland and Lake Merritt-Uptown Association CBD Board and Committee meetings including annual meeting on June 13; and participation in the CBD/BID Managers Council. 8. Broadway Shuttle/Streetcar	 Over 190,000 passengers used the Broadway Shuttle during the second quarter of 2013. These passengers are estimated to have spent over \$2 million at restaurants and other businesses along the route, based on passenger surveys. Secured \$317,000 in grant funding from the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) to support Broadway Shuttle 2013 operations The Alameda County Transportation Commission approved a \$352,000 Vehicle Registration Fee grant; funds will support Shuttle operations over the next two years and off-set the loss of redevelopment funding. Underway with plans to extend the Shuttle hours by three additional hours Monday-Thursday (until 10pm). The expansion is anticipated to begin by summer or fall of this year. Staff continues its effort to finalize a co-marketing partnership with BART to promote downtown's restaurant and nightlife scenes with ads in BART stations and trains, in exchange for BART ads on the Broadway Shuttle, at a proposed net cost of \$102,000. The Broadway Transit Urban Circulator Study consultant contract has been executed with Fehr & Peers and the study has commenced. The study will assess costs and benefits of

upgrading the Broadway Shuttle to an electric streetcar and will evaluate extending the route through the Broadway Valdez Specific Plan area to Kaiser Hospital and MacArthur BART. Funded by a \$300,000 Caltrans grant secured by Economic Development staff, the project is being co-managed with the PWA Transportation Planning and Funding Division. Staff helped coordinate and promote the following events: 9.
