#### **RECOMMENDATION**

The Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Oakland Fund For Children and Youth (OFCY) Planning and Oversight Committee (POC) recommend adoption of a resolution authorizing the City Administrator to negotiate and execute grant agreements between the City Of Oakland and various non-profit and public agencies to provide direct services for children and youth in an amount not to exceed \$10,762,224 for fiscal year 2013-2014. The POC recommends that these grant programs be renewable with City Council approval in fiscal years 2014-2015 and 2015-2016.

#### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Oakland Fund for Children and Youth Planning and Oversight Committee requests that City Council approve a resolution to authorize grant agreements for 126 OFCY programs recommended for funding through the Kids First! Children's Fund in the amount of \$10,762,224 for fiscal year 2013-2014. The grants are recommended to implement the OFCY 2013-16 Strategic Investment Plan and the first year of OFCY's three-year grant cycle.

OFCY's three-year Strategic Investment Plan (2013-2016) was approved by the City Council in December 2012 (Resolution No. 84130 C.M.S.) to address the well-being of Oakland children and youth from birth through age 21. The Strategic Plan presents strategies with emphasis on parent education and early learning opportunities; safe, supportive and engaging programs to foster youth development and success in school; older youth leadership in schools and community, and expanded access to career pathways and workforce opportunities.

The POC's competitive proposal review process began with the release of a Request for Proposals in December 2012 to solicit proposals for the three-year grant cycle (2013-2016). OFCY received 248 applications in January 2013, which were reviewed by the POC and staff through a series of public meetings in March and April 2013. The POC finalized its recommendations for the award of these grants in May 2013.

The 126 selected programs propose to serve approximately 22,000 children and youth at program sites throughout Oakland. This report includes the following attachments:

#### **OUTCOME**

Adoption of the resolution will result in the execution of grant agreements with non-profit and public agencies for 126 grant programs funded through the Kids First Children's Fund and will allow approximately 22,000 children and youth to receive direct services from contracted agencies for the period of July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014. The grants are renewable with Council approval for FY2014-2015 and FY2015-2016 contingent upon the evaluation of services and satisfactory performance.

#### BACKGROUND/LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Oakland voters passed Measure D in July, 2009, to revise the Kids First! Children's Fund Amendment in the Oakland City Charter (originally passed as Measure K in November 1996), and continue the set aside of general purpose funds through Kids First! for a second 12-year life cycle. The four goals outlined in Measure D are: 1) Support the healthy development of young children, 2) Help children and youth succeed in school and graduate high school, 3) Prevent violence and reduce youth involvement in crime and gangs, and 4) Help youth transition to productive adulthood. OFCY is overseen by a 17 member Planning and Oversight Committee (POC) composed of eight (8) youth and nine (9) adult members.

Under Measure D, 3% of the City's unrestricted general purpose fund revenues are set aside in a "Children's Fund" for direct services for children and youth. The POC is responsible for the completion of a three-year Strategic Investment Plan, the solicitation of proposals for funding to implement the Plan through an open and fair application process, and the selection of a grants package for Council approval in entirety. The POC must also oversee annual evaluations of grantees' programs, and receive reports from the City Auditor on the baseline spending requirement for children and youth.

#### ANALYSIS

OFCY released a Request for Proposals (RFP) in December 2012 following Council approval of the OFCY Strategic Investment Plan. In January 2013, the POC received 248 proposal applications for grants totaling over \$23.0 million. Over a three-month period, all complete and qualifying proposals (225) were scored by outside readers, considered by the review subcommittee of the POC and selected on the basis of the quality of the proposal relative to others received in each strategy area and additional selection criteria.

#### **Criteria** for Selection

The FY2013-2016 OFCY funding recommendation results from the POC's effort to balance a variety of complex issues. The criteria considered in the selection of proposals included the average score and ranking for each proposal as an indicator of the quality of each application. Additional critéria used by the POC in the selection process include past performance as documented by the grant monitoring and evaluation processes; geographic distribution of services relative to where youth in poverty live in Oakland; cost-effectiveness of services; demonstrated capacity to deliver proposed services; services to hard to reach or specific populations of children and youth; and leveraging of local city assets or initiatives.

#### **OFCY Strategic Priorities and FY2013-2016 Funding Recommendation**

The OFCY 2013-2016 Strategic Investment Plan addresses the four goals outlined in the Kids First! Amendment (Measure D), targets services to children and youth in areas of high need in Oakland, and promotes strategic leveraging of resources to maximize collective impact on outcomes for Oakland's children and youth. The Plan emphasizes prevention through parent education and early learning opportunities, support for student success and youth development programming in safe and supportive environments in out of school time (both school and community or neighborhood based sites), youth leadership in schools and the community, and expanded access to career pathways and workforce opportunities for older youth. The Planning and Oversight Committee recommends 126 programs which will engage over 22,000 children and youth and their families in Oakland.

The table on the following page illustrates recommended funding amounts for each OFCY strategy area. Funding requested far exceeded funding available, across all strategy areas except school based after school programs. The POC received 248 proposal applications in January 2013 for requests totaling over \$23.0 million. The total amount of funds requested exceeded the funds available for the several strategy areas by a margin of 3:1. OFCY received 24 applications requesting a total of \$3,536,516 in funding for youth career and workforce programming, and recommends funding totaling \$1,076,412 to support 11 programs. OFCY received 35 requests for funding in Community Based Out of School Time Strategy totaling \$3,076,227, and recommends funding 11 programs with funds totaling \$868,701. A total of 126 programs are recommended for funding in the amount of \$10,762,224 in FY2013-2014.

In addition to the location of service sites, the POC considered proposal information on the residence location of children and youth to be served. The chart below provides data on where children and youth from birth to age 17 in Oakland live based on an approximation using census data, and where children and youth to be served reside by Council district as proposed. An effort was made to ensure that on the whole the programs selected approach a more equitable distribution of services in consideration of council districts with larger proportions of Oakland's children living in poverty.



# Goal Area 1: Healthy Development of Young Children

Twelve agencies will support the healthy development of young children through services to improve the quality of preschool classrooms and programs to reach families of young children in Oakland neighborhoods.

Providers of mental health and developmental consultations support early childhood education teachers at Head Start sites and Oakland Unified School District (OUSD) Child Development

Centers. Programs address classroom competency in support of the social and emotional wellbeing of young children and school readiness. The strategy will fund four lead agency providers and their subcontractors to deliver services to 42 sites and reach an estimated 2,577 children.

OFCY supports community playgroup programs that engage parents of young children in early learning activities, connect them with education and resources, and provide developmental coaching to ensure the healthy development of young children. Funding for eight lead agencies will support programming at 19 different service sites, such as parent cafes and baby learning centers in community sites, including city recreation centers, and family resource centers and public housing, to reach a projected 971 parents and over 1,000 young children.

Pre-Kindergarten Summer Camp programs for children with no prior pre-school experience are not recommended for funding in 2013-2014, but will be reconsidered for funding in 2014 if funds are available.

#### Goal Area 2: Student Success in School

The Oakland After School Initiative is continued through OFCY's partnership with the Oakland Unified School District. The City's OFCY investment of \$4 million leverages over \$7 million that OUSD receives through state After School Education and Safety (ASES) hunding and federal 21st Century Community Learning Center funding. In support of the full service community schools plan, lead agencies provide safe and engaging learning environments after school and directly contribute to a positive school climate in 46 elementary sites and 18 middle school sites. The sixty-four programs are jointly funded and evaluated, and will engage approximately 7,824 students.

Transitions programs support high school graduation and target students at risk of disengaging from school through academic, case management, leadership development and peer support for the transition to high school. Additionally, youth leadership programs support the creation of positive culture through peer leadership in schools. OFCY funding will support four lead agencies providing services that will reach a projected 2,678 students. Youth are engaged as peer leaders to support a range of positive behaviors, including promoting healthy choices; preventing violence and resolving conflict; addressing equity and inclusiveness issues; and helping students to succeed and graduate. Three lead agencies will be funded to reach approximately 4,773 students.

#### Goal Area 3: Youth Leadership and Community Safety

OFCY continues to fund community based organizations which provide safe and engaging programming for children in neighborhood sites during the summer and the school year. Program activities include arts, fitness, field trips, community service, leadership development, academic and peer support activities. Eleven programs will be funded by OFCY to reach approximately 1,985 children and youth in community based after school and drop in programs.

Summer programs provide enrichment activities and academics to combat summer learning loss. OFCY will support 10 agencies to serve 1,514 children and youth during the summer.

Older youth leadership programs will engage over 2,000 youth in building community and safety in Oakland neighborhoods. Seven programs are funded to work with older youth to engage peers, families, and the broader neighborhood in youth led efforts that directly benefit neighborhood initiatives and improve community safety. Seven lead agencies will be funded by OFCY to serve approximately 2,290 youth.

# Goal Area 4: Successful Transitions to Adulthood

OFCY will expand youth workforce engagement opportunities for young people. To assist young people in the transition to a positive and productive adulthood, OFCY is expanding its funding for programs that demonstrate links to employers in the region, provide viable pathways for young people into jobs and careers, and provide paid summer jobs and direct work experience. OFCY will support 11 agencies to reach 1,085 youth through the strategy and engage them in meaningful employment opportunities. Four programs provide academic support services and will reach approximately 1,865 youth next year, specifically addressing academic needs to keep youth engaged in school, support them to graduate, and transition to productive adulthood.

# PUBLIC OUTREACH/INTEREST

The POC's funding recommendation was discussed publicly during review subcommittee meetings held between February and April 2013. The Planning and Oversight Committee held a public meeting on April 17 to receive its review subcommittee's recommendation and hosted public meetings in May 2013 to affirm the hunding package and approve the recommendations for forwarding to Oakland City Council. The POC and ad-hoc review subcommittee meetings were all hosted at Oakland City Hall.

#### **COORDINATION**

The City Attorney's Office and the Budget Office have been consulted in the preparation of this report and resolution. The OFCY Strategic Plan, which forms the basis for this recommendation, was developed with input from key stakeholder departments in the City, including the Office of the Mayor, the Office of the City Administrator, the Office of Parks and Recreation, the Oakland Public Library, and the staff of the Workforce Investment Board.

#### COST SUMMARY/IMPLICATIONS

The Oakland Kids First Children's legislation mandates that 90% of funds be used for direct support for children and youth service organizations. The remaining 10% of funds support fund administration, including staffing, evaluation, and data management services. The City of Oakland Proposed Policy Budget FY2013-2015 idenfifies \$11,763,186 in fiscal year 2013-2014 for the Kids First Children's fund, of which 90% or \$10,586,867 is available for grants in

FY2013-i4. Funds totaling \$10,762,224 will be available for the OFCY grants from the FY2013-2014 Kids First! budget appropriation upon adoption of the proposed policy budget, the appropriation of interest earned to the Fund 1780 Project P420831, and use of the unspent project balances located in Kids First! Oakland Children's Fund (1780) in Project P364030 and Project P157731. The table below summarizes the sources of funds available for OFCY grant contracts for FY2013-2014.

The proposed budget appropriation for Kids First for FY2014-2015 is \$12,125,533, of which 90% or \$10.91 million will be available for grants.

# FISCAL/POLICY ALIGNMENT

The recommendation forwarded by the Planning and Oversight Committee is in accordance with the requirement to set aside 3% of the unrestricted general fund revenues annually to the Kids First Children's Fund. OFCY funding strategies are in alignment with city policy supporting positive outcomes for children and youth, notably Oakland UNITE! for violence prevention and reduction; the Oakland WIB for youth employment; the OUSD's Full Service Community Schools Strategic Plan; and the Oakland Educational Cabinet's goals to increase access to quality early childhood education and increase the high school graduation rate of Oakland students.

# PAST PERFORMANCE, EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP

OFCY grant programs are evaluated annually by an independent consultant. Program targets for youth enrollment, hours and duration of service, types of activities are captured in the CitySpan grants management database and assessed in the annual evaluation process. In FY2013-14, ail contracted programs will be evaluated by the firm Public Profit, Inc.

During the review process, the POC received and considered performance data on current OFCY grantees related to the quality of programs, based on site visits conducted by the independent evaluator. Program performance targets for youth participation and hours of service were also

considered through review of the OFCY FY2011-2012 year-end evaluation reports and the FY2012-2013 mid-term evaluation report.

# SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

*Economic*: OFCY funding generates employment opportunities through 60 lead agencies funded to operate 126 grant programs. These agencies are predominately Oakland-based, employ local staff and have a positive economic impact. In addition, OFCY funds are used to leverage and match additional local, state, federal and foundation funding sources, and thereby bring additional resources into Oakland. Numerous projects will provide direct economic benefit to youth through stipended leadership opportunities, internships, and subsidized employment.

*Environmental*: Programs include projects that work to improve the neighborhood and local environmental conditions, and also promote ecological and environmental education and conservation.

*Social Equity*: OFCY prioritizes funding for services that reach youth with the greatest needs. OFCY funding increases services to immigrant children and youth, children living in high stress neighborhoods, and youth exposed to violence, regardless of ability to pay. Over 6,000 youth projected to be served are limited or non-English speaking; while over 2,000 of the youth projected to be served will have cognitive/ learning / developmental disabilities.

## RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO NEGOTIATE AND EXECUTE GRANT AGREEMENTS BETWEEN THE CITY OF OAKLAND AND VARIOUS NON-PROFIT AND PUBLIC AGENCIES TO PROVIDE DIRECT SERVICES FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH FOR A TOTAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$10,762,224 FOR FISCAL YEAR 2013-2014 RENEWABLE FOR TWO ONE-YEAR PERIODS WITH COUNCIL APPROVAL

WHEREAS, Measure K/Kids First! Initiative established the Oakland Fund for Children and Youth ("OFCY") in 1996 to help young people grow to become healthy, productive, and honorable adults; and

WHEREAS, the passage of Measure D in 1998 revised the Kids First Charter Amendment and established a second 12-year life cycle for the Kids First! Children's Fund administered through the Oakland Fund for Children and Youth;

WHEREAS, the Planning and Oversight Committee ("POC") provides oversight and direction for the OFCY planning and funding review process; and

WHEREAS, the revenue appropriation for FY2013-2014 to the Kids First! Oakland Children's Fund (Fund 1780) is to be approved in the FY2013-2015 Adopted Policy Budget and 90% of the appropriation in the amount of \$10,586,867 will be available for grants and is located in Kids First! Oakland Children's Fund (P46530); and

WHEREAS, any interest earned and amounts unspent or uncommitted by the fund at the end of any fiscal year are to be made available for future grants as specified in the Kids First! Charter Amendment; and

WHEREAS, interest income earned from March 1, 2010 to February 28, 2013 in the amount of \$9,526 is available for these grants; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to appropriate the interest income earned in the amount of \$9,526 to Kids First! the Oakland Children's Fund (1780) in project OFCY FY1011 FY1112 Interest Earned (P420831), and to allocate said funds to the selected grant awards resulting from the December 2012 Request for Proposals for direct services for children and youth in FY13-14 in accordance with the Kids First! Charter Amendment; and

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WHEREAS, prior interest and revenue appropriations for services that are now completed has resulted in an unspent project balance of \$160,018 in Kids First! Oakland Children's Fund (1780) from project OFCY FY09-10 Contracts (P364030), and \$5,813 from project OFCY FY02-03 Interest Earned (P157731), and these funds are available for allocation to grants; and

WHEREAS, in December 2012, the City Council approved the OFCY Strategic Investment Plan with priority areas: 1) Healthy Development of Young Children, 2) Student Success in School, 3) Youth Leadership and Community Safety, and 4) Transitions to Adulthood; and

WHEREAS, in December 2012, the POC published a Requests for Proposals based on the adopted OFCY Strategic Investment Plan 2013-2016 and conducted an "open and fair" competitive review process for the selection of grants for the OFCY 2013-16 grant cycle; and

WHEREAS, in January 2013, OFCY received 248 proposals and responses from private non-profit and public entities to provide services for the OFCY grant cycle 2013-16; and

WHEREAS, the OFCY staff and trained reviewers have evaluated 248 proposals for the Oakland Fund for Children and Youth in accordance with the criteria in the Request for Proposals; and

WHEREAS, the POC has complied with the goals, objectives and service priorities in the Strategic Investment Plan; and

WHEREAS, the POC recommends the following 126 grant funding awards in the amounts specified below for FY2013-14, and as renewable with City Council approval for FY2014-15 and FY2015-16:
