RECOMMENDATION

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Attachment A to this report provides information on crime, crime trends, crime reduction and crime intervention activities in Oakland for the second quarter of calendar year 2018.

BACKGROUND AND LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

In 2013 the Public Safety Committee requested a quarterly report from OPD on crime trends and crime reduction activities in the City of Oakland. This report is provided four times a year and updated to include the preceding three-month period (January through March; April through June; July through September; and October through December).

ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES

This informational report is presented to the City Council and the Oakland community to provide an update on crime and crime reduction activities in Oakland. The attached presentation (**Attachment A**) contains information as follows:

- Crime statistics for each of OPD's five Police Areas (1-5) including trends and reduction activities.

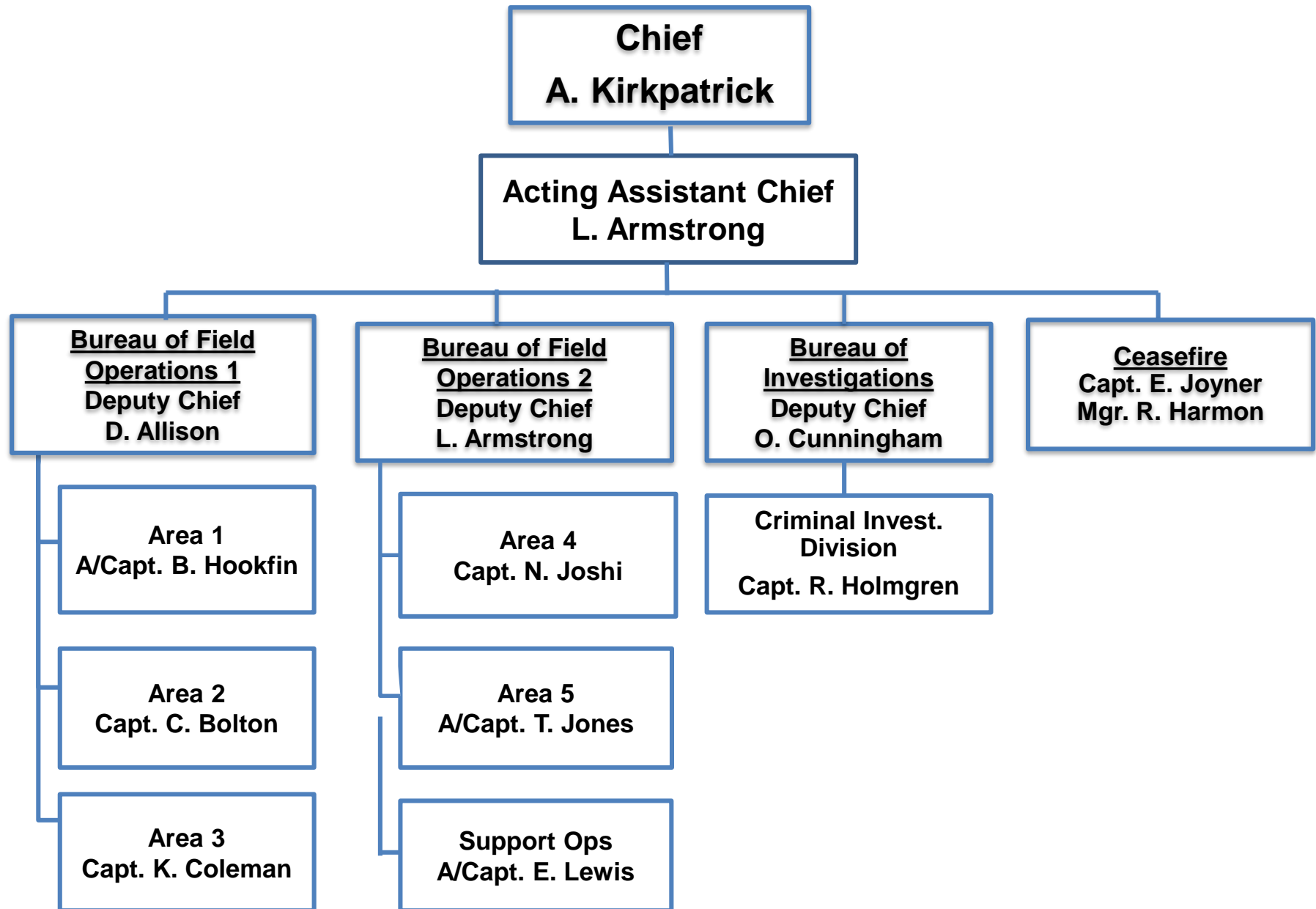

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Area 1: Robberies and Burglaries

Street-Level Robberies Are Down 21%

- Impacted areas around the BART stations (West Oakland)
- Around the downtown Broadway corridor
- Jack London Square and Chinatown
- Excellent follow up being done by Patrol and CID to identify vehicles and suspects
- Area 1 SRS has arrested robbery crews in the West Oakland BART area, and FPU has done a great deal of follow-up identifying vehicles associated with these crimes

Area 1: Robberies and Burglaries, *cont.*

Auto Burglaries Are Down 22%

- Beats 3 and 4 – Chinatown
- Vehicles had valuable items in plain sight
- NSCs and Ambassadors diligently leafleting impacted areas
- Multiple suspects arrested for auto-burglaries in the downtown area
- 15 new burglary abatement signs ordered for posting in high-crime areas

Area 1: Shootings and Homicides

- Homicides are flat with five total, as compared to the same number this time last year.
- The five 2018 homicides don't appear to be related, and the victims did not appear to be active in historical gang feuds.
- Aggravated assaults are down 8% as compared to this time last year.
- Special Resource Units are very familiar with the primary offenders in feuds and actively monitor them.
- Ceasefire strategy being implemented for the groups that have been self-selected for enforcement action as well as Custom Notification and Call-Ins.

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Area 2: Shootings and Homicides

Continued Priority of Action for Violent Offenses

- Assaults with firearms show 57% YTD decrease and decrease from quarter to quarter
- Focus on solving and preventing homicides and shootings
- Continued weekly collaboration with investigators, Ceasefire, and outside agencies and partners

Area 2: Shootings and Homicides, *cont.*

All Area 2 Patrol and Special Resource Section teams are aware of precision-based and intelligence-led expectations:

- Visible deterrence, familiarity with individuals, wants, warrants, and leads
- Directed patrol without overly saturating high-crime areas with patrols and enforcement
- Immediate follow-up to all shootings, regardless of offense or injury
 - Neighborhood canvass, video review and retrieval, quick collaboration and communication
 - Efficient use of ShotSpotter technology

Area 2: Robberies and Burglaries

Sustained Reductions of Robberies and Burglaries

- Directed patrol without overly saturating high-crime areas with patrols and enforcement
 - Robberies continue to target victims walking near or along major thoroughfares (Broadway, Telegraph, Grand – Beats 8 and 14)
 - Bags, purses, electronics, and so on, carried by pedestrians appear to be an attractant
 - Laptop thefts and robberies from coffee shops and similar settings

Area 2: Robberies and Burglaries, *cont.*

- Continued collaboration with investigators – quick follow-up on leads and arrests
- Weekly communication and collaboration regarding suspects who travel across area, city, and jurisdictional borders
- Offense specific probation/parole follow-ups

Area 2: Problem-Solving Projects

- Projects opened through community collaboration to address neighborhood specific needs
- Q2 goal was to better involve patrol officers, secure more community input and evaluation, and ensure projects are assessed

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Area 3: Robbery Trends

- Primary robbery hotspots include:
 - Beat 17X
 - Beat 18X
 - Beat 18Y
 - Beat 20X
- Peak hours are between 5:00 pm and midnight
- Peak days are Thursdays and Saturdays

Area 3: Robbery Suspects

- Several juvenile teams
- Use stolen vehicles
- Generally not from the area
- Usually on probation

Area 3: Robbery Victims

- Asian, Latino, and Caucasian females when **no** weapon is used
- Asian, Latino, and Caucasian males when a weapon is used
- Victims are generally preoccupied
- Victims are generally walking on the street or exiting from cars

Area 3: Robbery Losses

- Cell phones
- Money
- Tablets
- Backpacks
- Designer bags
- Gold chains

Area 3: Burglaries

- Numbers driven by auto burglaries
- Items left in vehicle
- No disproportionate location or time identified

Area 3: Commercial Burglary Trends

- Typical method of entry is smashing a window
- Typical loss includes a cash register with money in it
- Security cameras and alarm systems aren't necessarily a deterrent
- Some commercial burglaries are actually shoplifters with the intent to steal
- Peak times are weekdays from midnight to 5:00 am

- Community Relations
- Homicides

Area 4: Homicides

- The number of homicides in the second quarter of 2018 (four) is the same as the number in the second quarter of 2017.
- One of the four homicides has been solved, and an arrest has been made. Of the remaining three, only one appears to be gang- or group- related. All three cases are still being investigated.
- Great collaboration between street teams, investigations, and outreach partnerships.

Area 4: Shootings (Excluding Homicides)

- The number of shootings this quarter is the same as compared to the second quarter of 2017. Shootings are down by 8 % YTD.
- Some shootings are group- or gang-related.
- Custom notifications issued to at-risk individuals.
- Targeted and continuous enforcement on specific individuals, not neighborhoods.

Area 4: Rapes

- Rapes are down by 50 % for this quarter, and down by 42 % YTD.
- No serial rapist. Rapes not connected.
- Nearly all incidents involved suspects known to the victim.

Area 4: Robberies

- Robberies are down by 10 % for this quarter, and down by 19 % YTD.
- Dedicated foot patrols strategically deployed in high robbery areas.
- Several key arrests made.
- Business districts are prone to robberies and auto burglaries.
- Community outreach and education.

Area 4: Robbery Trends

- Victims are typically on foot or getting in or out of a vehicle.
- Targeted Items:
 - Money
 - Cell phones
 - Jewelry
 - Electronics (laptops, notebooks, and so on)

Area 4: Burglaries

- Burglaries, as a whole (residential, auto, commercial, and other) are down by 35 % for this quarter and down by 22 % YTD.
- Auto burglaries drive burglary numbers.
- Residential burglaries are significantly down by 42 % this quarter and down by 36 % YTD.

Area 4: Vehicle Theft

- Vehicle thefts are down 20% for this quarter.
- Use of technology to apprehend suspects and recover vehicles.

Area 4: Going Forward

- Continued focus on violent crime, quality of life, and community relations.
- Strategic deployment of resources for the most efficient and effective results.
- Accountability.
- Community outreach.
- Emphasis on foot patrol.

Area 5: Homicides and Shootings

- Six homicides in the first quarter of 2018 (down from seven same quarter last year)
- Assaults with firearms are up 12% compared to same quarter last year
- 14% decrease in homicides year to date
- 50% increase in rapes
- 8% decrease in robberies
- 34% decrease in burglaries

Area 5: Enforcement Efforts and Blight Concerns

- Sharpen focus on specific individuals associated with criminal street gangs that are driving violence.
- Partnering with Ceasefire and federal partners on known violent offenders.
- Removal of abandoned vehicles from neighborhoods.

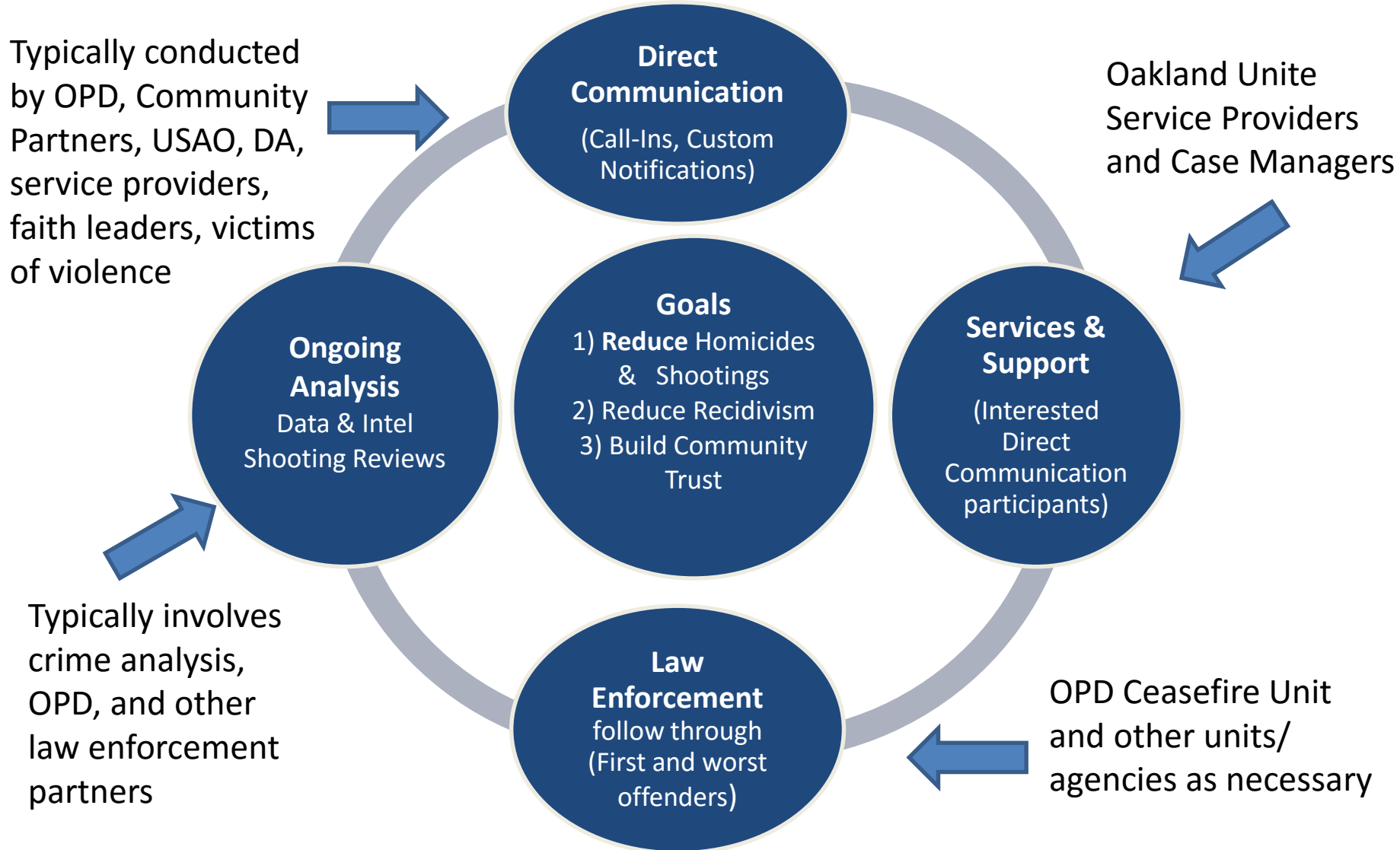

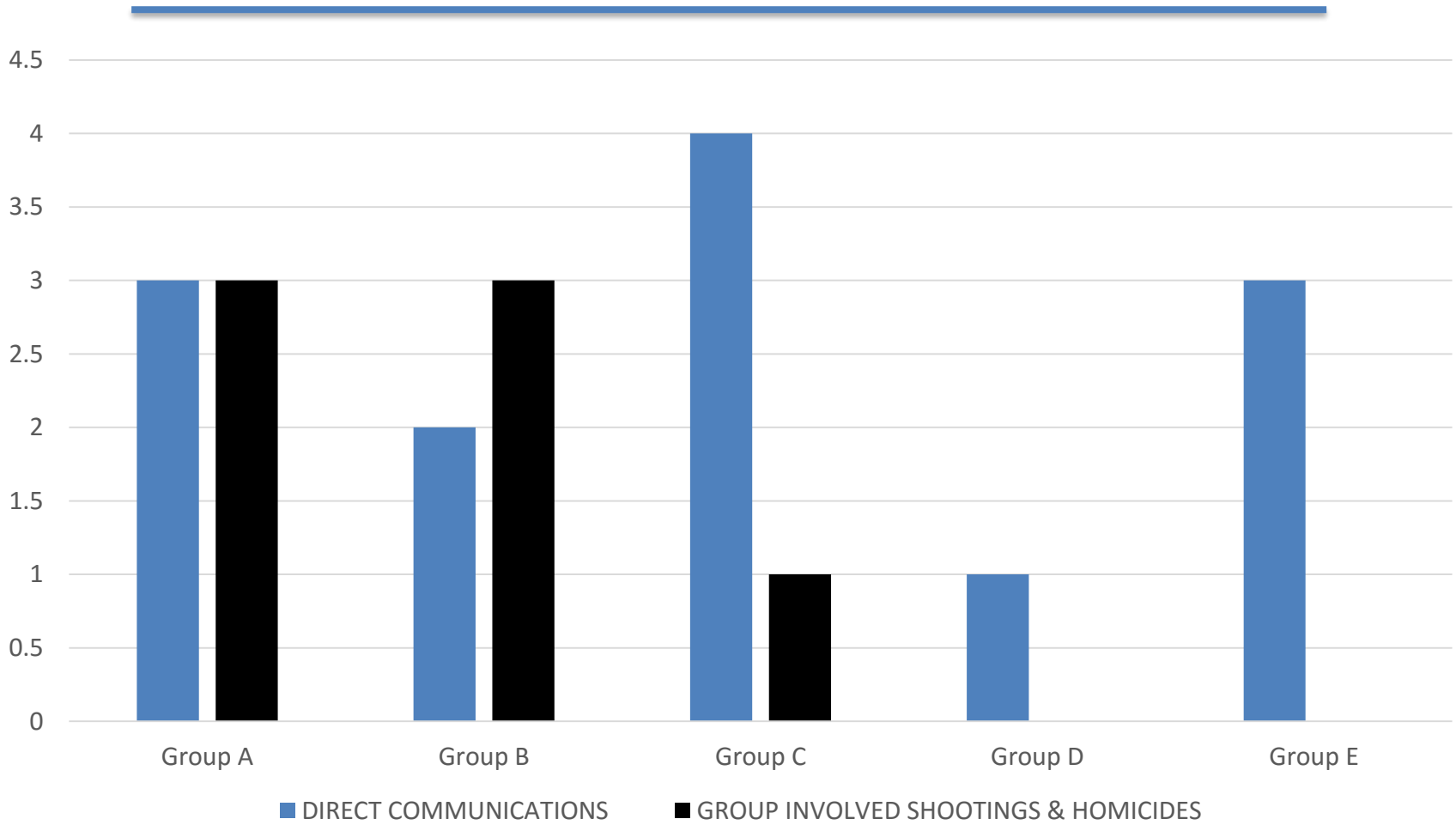

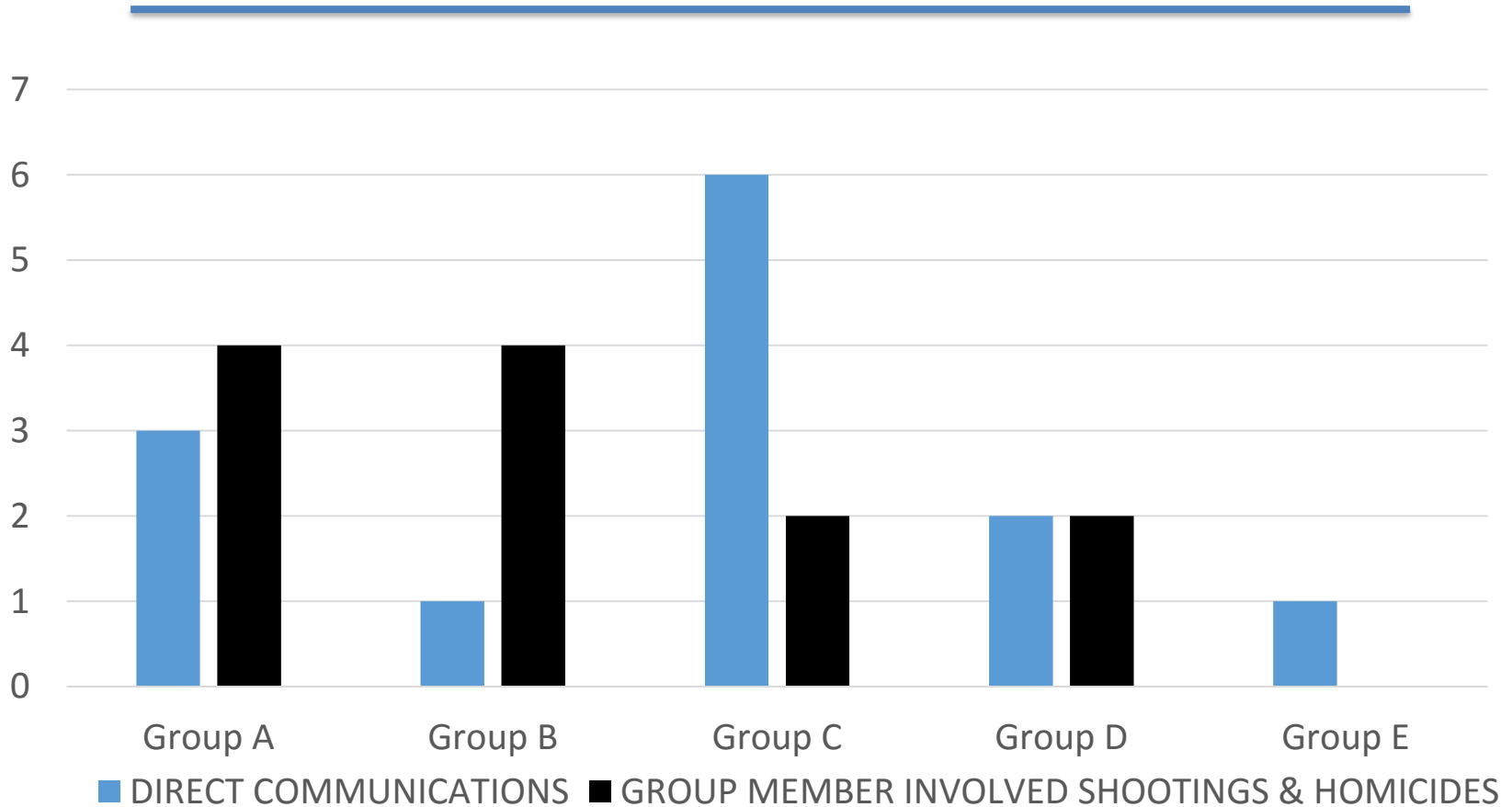

April 2018 Direct Communications & Top Group Member-Involved Shootings & Homicides*



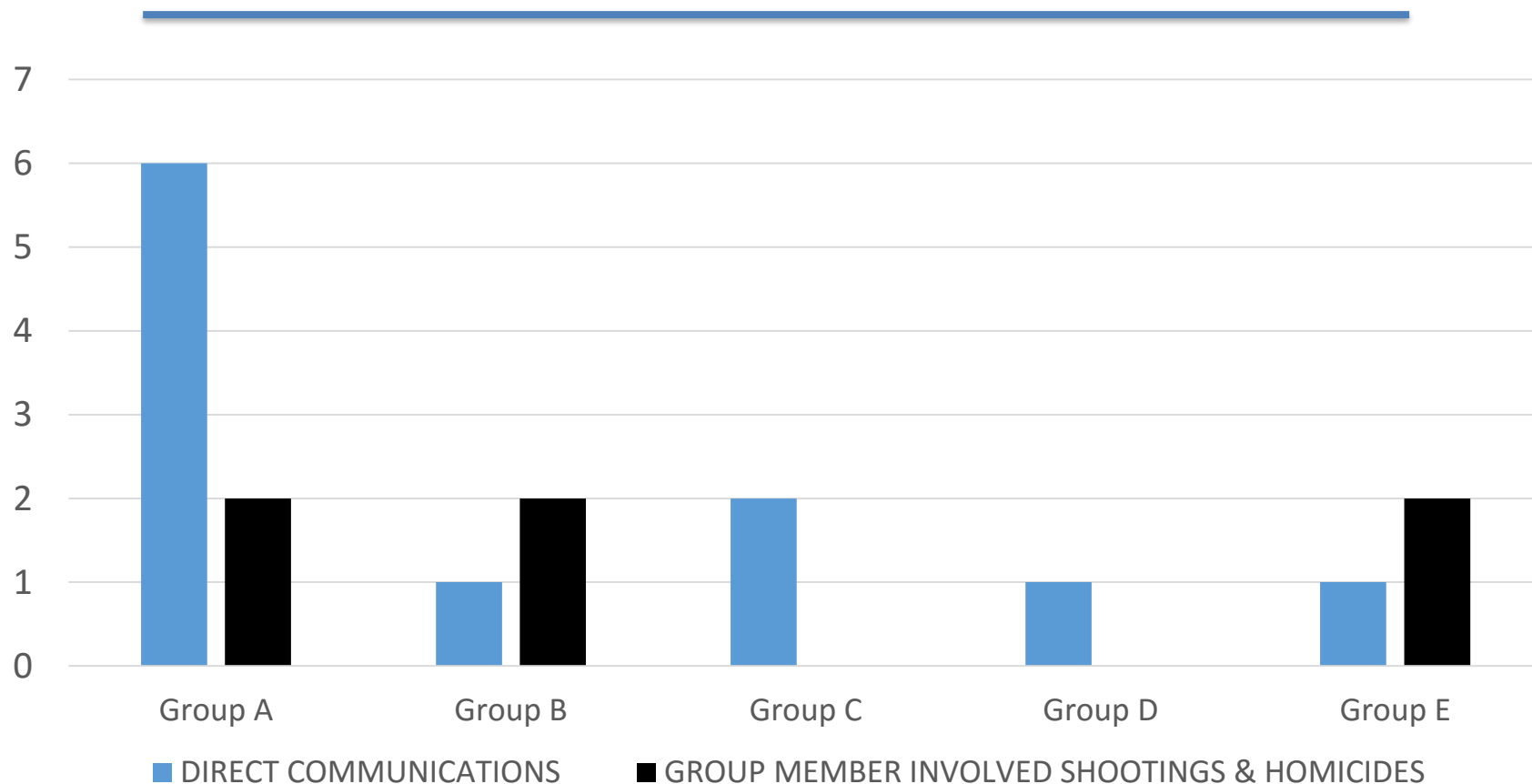

Evaluation Update

- Mathematica Policy Research leads the overarching Measure Z service evaluation that begin in 2017
- First report released in November and focuses on adult life coaching and employment strategies. Findings include:
 - Programs are serving people at the center of violence;
 - Services are consistent with best practices; and
 - Both strategies decreased short-term arrests for violence

Evaluation Update, *cont.*

- Second report released in May and focuses on agency progress. Findings related to adult life coaching include:
 - 42% reported violent victimization to OPD before services
 - 64% of participants were arrested by OPD before services
 - Agencies rely on the Oakland Unite network, resources, and trainings
 - Agencies dedicate >20% of budget to direct participant support
