- In order to further support local Oakland businesses, Oakland firms may earn additional preference points during the evaluation phase of the Request For Proposal and Request for Qualifications (RFP/RFQ) process up to 2.5 preference points for operating a business with a substantial business presence in Oakland, and up to 3.55 points for employing Oakland residents and new hires, as follows:

 - c. MPSLB contracts and OPSLB contracts under \$250,000 will be exempt from Oakland's Local and Small Local Business Enterprise participation requirements because the contractors will meet the requirements by virtue of their Oakland certified small local business status.
 - d. For pre-construction and other professional services, the selection and award of contracts shall be based on demonstrated competence and qualifications for the types of services to be performed, at fair and reasonable prices to the city, in addition to preference points awarded under Oakland's social equity policies and compliance with Oakland's purchasing programs such as Living Wage and Equal Benefits.

- g. For Construction services, the City Administrator may solicit bids on the open market, without advertising if all responsive bids exceed the engineer's estimate.
- Waiver of Small Local Business Enterprise Subcontracting Requirements for Local and Small Business Enterprises Applying for Professional Services Contracts. The City will waive small local business enterprise subcontracting requirements for Oakkınd certified local businesses that apply for professional services contracts as the primary contractor with the City.

SECTION 2. Severability.

If any section, subsection, subpart or provision of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances, is held invalid, the remainder of the provisions of this Ordinance and the application of such to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 3. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall become effective immediately on final adoption if it receives six or more affirmative votes on final adoption; otherwise it shall become effective upon the seventh day after final adoption.

- Waiver of Small Local Business Enterprise Subcontracting Requirements for Local and Small Business Enterprises Applying for Professional Services Contracts. The City will waive small local business enterprise subcontracting requirements for Oakland certified local businesses that apply for professional services contracts as the primary contractor with the City.

SECTION 2. Severability.

If any section, subsection, subpart or provision of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances, is held invalid, the remainder of the provisions of this Ordinance and the application of such to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 3. Effective Date.

This ordinance shall become effective immediately on final adoption if it receives six or more affirmative votes on final adoption; otherwise it shall become effective upon the seventh day after final adoption.
