Supplemental Report Concerning Charges for Employee Parking in Downtown

City Garages

### **SUMMARY**

This report supplements the September 14, 2010 report to the Finance & Management Committee and provides a financial comparison of the administration's plan to offer a \$130 group parking rate to employees previously parking for free, and Council member Kernighan's plan to charge a sliding scale fee based on employee income. The Administration believes that its current offer of \$130 for all eligible employees, regardless of income, is more equitable and would generate more revenue to the City.

### **BACKGROUND**

The City Council voted on June 24 to eliminate free parking privileges for City employees. To ensure that the City realizes the additional budgeted revenue for downtown parking garages and does not lose customers to a more competitive private garage, the City Administrator has offered a \$130 group monthly parking rate to the employees who previously parked for free.

At the September 14, 2010 Finance and Management Committee meeting Councilmember Kernighan modified her prior proposal to provide a graduated parking fee to employees formerly receiving free parking in downtown garages. She reasoned that the lower fees to employees with lower salaries would encourage a higher level of participation in payment for monthly parking.

### DISCUSSION

## a. Administration's Proposal

As of September 16, 103 employees have signed up for the group monthly parking rate. (These numbers are not final since some employees may be late in applying due to vacation, etc.) Based upon these preliminary participation figures, the City would realize \$162,240 in additional annual revenue. This additional revenue is for City employee parking only, and does not take into account additional revenues that may be generated by transient (non-City) parkers who are able to park in spaces previously occupied by non-paid City parkers.

# b. Council member Kernighan's Proposal

Council Member Kernighan's proposal provides for a graduated parking fee, based upon income levels. The table below shows the proposed fee schedule, the number of eligible employees, and the number of employees currently participating in the current group rate fee schedule. The table also estimates the "Maximum Revenue" and "Minimum Revenue" that could be realized using the proposed fee schedule. The Maximum Revenue estimate assumes 100% participation by those in the lower three income categories, and the current actual level of participation by those in the highest income category. (Since there would be no change in fee level for those in the highest income category, we have assumed there would be no change in participation under the proposed schedule.) The Minimum Revenue estimate assumes the current actual level of participation in all income levels.

The Minimum Revenue yields about \$141,000 annual revenue, which is about \$21,000 less than the existing fee structure generates. The Maximum Revenue under Councilmember Kernighan's proposal could result in **up to \$172,680** in annual revenue – however, this assumes that all of the eligible employees with incomes below \$95,000 sign up. This may or may not be realistic. In addition, the greater occupancy of stalls at substantially below market rates eliminates the potential income for transient parkers. At a \$50 monthly rate a stall would only have to be occupied for 4 days at the daily rate to exceed the revenue produced by the monthly parker. Hourly rates would create an even greater difference.

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING BUDGET POLICY REGARDING CITY SUBSIDIZATION OF PARKING IN THE DOWNTOWN CIVIC CENTER FOR CITY EMPLOYEES

WHEREAS, the City has exercised discretion in determining which employees receive free and/or subsidized parking and to that end has continued to review employee eligibility for free and subsidized parking; and

WHEREAS, the City has identified approximately 200 employees who had been eligible for free parking in the City's three downtown garages -- Clay, Dalziel and City Center West garages prior to September 1, 2010; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council eliminated free parking for City employees as of September 1, 2010; and

WHEREAS, faced with a potential loss of parking garage revenue, during the City Council recess the City Administrator offered employees who had formerly been eligible for free parking a rate of \$130.00 per month, at the three downtown City garages; and

WHEREAS, the City seeks to reduce subsidization of parking, consistent with its environmental-and transportation policies and desire to discourage use of personal vehicles, while ensuring that the City does not experience a significant decrease in revenue from employees choosing to park at non-City garages at a reduced rate; and

WHEREAS, the City seeks to award subsidies for parking that take into account the relative ability of employees to pay for parking, awarding the greatest subsidy to the lowest paid employees, and the least subsidy to the most highly paid employees; Now therefore be it

**RESOLVED:** that employees who were eligible for free parking prior to September 1, 2010 in the downtown City-owned parking garages shall be eligible for a discounted rate, based on the attached, graduated parking fee schedule, as of the first day of the month following passage of this resolution; and

**FURTHER RESOLVED**: that the City shall satisfy any requirement that it may have to provide notice and an opportunity to discuss the reduction with unions representing affected employees, prior to implementation of such reductions.

# RESOLUTION CONTINUING SUBSIDIZED PARKING RATE OFFERED BY THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR DURING CITY COUNCIL RECESS TO EMPLOYEES WHO FORMERLY RECEIVED FREE PARKING

WHEREAS, the City has exercised discretion in determining which employees receive free and/or subsidized parking and to that end has continued to review employee eligibility for free and subsidized parking; and
