## RECOMMENDATION

**Staff Recommends That The City Council Adopt The Following Pieces Of Legislation:**

- 1) **A Resolution Authorizing The City To Apply For, Accept And Appropriate Grant Funds From The California Department Of Housing And Community Development In An Amount Not To Exceed \$2,000,000 For The Housing Related Parks Program (Program Year 2015) For Improvements To Rainbow Recreation Center.**
- 2) **A Resolution Amending Resolution No. 85407 C.M.S, Which Authorized The City To Apply For, Accept And Appropriate Grant Funds From The California Department Of Housing And Community Development Under The Housing Related Parks Program In An Amount Not To Exceed \$2,000,000 For Improvements To Saint Andrew's Plaza, Curt Flood Field And Josie De La Cruz Park, To Change The Project Accounts.**

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Adoption of the first proposed resolution would authorize the City to apply for up to \$2,000,000 in grant funding under the California Department of Housing and Community Development (CA HCD) Housing-Related Parks (HRP) Program for improvements to Rainbow Recreation Center. This resolution is a required element of the grant application used to show that the City Administrator has the authority to apply for, accept and appropriate funds granted by this program. An approved and signed resolution is due to CA HCD by March 4, 2016.

Adoption of the second proposed resolution would result in a minor revision to Resolution No. 84507 C.M.S., which authorized the City to apply for, accept, and appropriate grant HRP Program funds in 2014-15. This resolution is used by the Budget Department to allocate the funds into the correct income and expenditure accounts. Resolution No. 84507 C.M.S., in its current form, does not allow the Finance Agency staff to appropriate funds to the correct expenditure accounts. This limitation has resulted in project delays due to the inability to access funds. The proposed resolution corrects the coding block to reflect the corrected expenditure account and therefore is a minor administrative revision.

## **BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY**

The HRP Program is intended to assist public agencies in maintaining and developing community parks necessary for the creation of vibrant livable urban communities, in conjunction with the development of affordable housing projects.

The HRP Program is a non-competitive State-wide grant. The grant awards are based on the number of affordable housing starts. Other threshold requirements for this program include having a Housing Element in compliance with State law by December 31, 2015, Annual Progress Report on the Housing Element from 2009 to 2014, the threshold of affordable housing starts and substantial rehabilitations from January 1, 2010 to December 31, 2015.<sup>1</sup> The City of Oakland meets all of these requirements. Additionally, the grant application must state what park projects will be supported with the grant award funds. Staff proposes that the City apply for the amount of eligible grant funding to support the renovation and expansion of the Rainbow Recreation Center.

The State of California Department of Housing and Community Development released the notice of funding availability (2015 NOFA) for the HRP Program grant funds on October 26, 2015. The grant application is due February 4, 2016. The grant application requires that a draft of the resolution that will be submitted to the governing body of the jurisdiction be submitted and that an approved and signed resolution be submitted by within 30 days of the grant application submission date (March 4, 2016). The HRP Program is funded through Proposition 1C, the Housing Emergency Shelter Trust Fund Act of 2006. The award is not competitive; all cities and counties who meet the eligibility requirements as described in the program guidelines will be funded. It is a multi-year grant program and it will last as long as funds are available. It is estimated that there will be one more round of grant funding available after the 2015 NOFA round.

## **ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES**

Approval of the proposed resolution will authorize the application for, acceptance, and appropriation of up to \$2,000,000 in grant funds. The final grant amount will depend on the final number of affordable unit starts, demonstrated affordable unit substantial rehabilitations, and the extent to which the City qualifies for certain bonus award points. Staff will use these grant funds to fill a funding gap in a renovation project located at the Rainbow Recreation Center.

In the case of using the grant award funds for the renovation of the Rainbow Recreation Center, it continues the rationale used for the HRP Program 2010-11, 2013 and 2014 NOFA grant applications for previous park projects approved by City Council. Improvements to the Rainbow Recreation Center would further the City's objective of connecting affordable housing

development to broader community revitalization activities. Rainbow Recreation Center is located within a mile of Lion Creek Crossings where the City has invested approximately \$14 million in this multi-phase affordable housing development. Additionally, this project was identified as a priority project for City Council District 6 and is listed in the Park Prioritization list for FY 2011-13, approved by Council under Resolution No. 83725 C.M.S. in February 2012. It has received Prop 84 park revitalization grant funding and this additional funding will cover funding gaps in the current scope of work for the project.

Additionally, Rainbow Recreation Center complies with place-based "bonus" awards using the following criteria:

Park Project Location Based Bonus Points—tied to the location of the park project for which the jurisdiction is proposing to use the funding award;

- a. Projects located in park-deficient communities (evaluated using the following website designated by CA HCD: <http://www.parkinfo.org/factfinder2011/grantee.html>)
- b. Projects located in disadvantaged communities (evaluated using the following website designated by CA HCD: <http://www.huduser.gov/qct/qctmap.html>),
- c. Projects located within a quarter mile distance or a half mile walking route of infill housing (i.e. located within an area that is already developed or on a vacant site that is surrounded by pre-existing urban uses).

In prior years, Staff developed a two-step analysis to determine the parks chosen for the remainder of funds from this grant application. The same analysis was used to establish the Rainbow Recreation as the HRP program award recipient:

- 1) Analysis of all known City plazas, parks, and recreation facilities that were in compliance with the two location based HRP bonus award criteria (the location in a park-deficient community AND location in a disadvantaged community) that would maximize the HRP Program grant award amount. This analysis yielded a list of 49 plazas, parks and recreation facilities (**Attachment A** - List of 49 Oakland Public Facilities).
- 2) Park project readiness—
  - a. Projected construction/upgrade timeline compliant with HRP Program expenditure requirements (by approximately June 2018),
  - b. Cost of projected use of funds within the amount budgeted,
  - c. Scope of work allowed under HRP Program guidelines.

The City has a number of park and recreation facilities with deferred maintenance and capital improvement needs. Funding for these types of activities is very limited, making it difficult for the City to maintain park facilities in an adequate condition. The HRP Program provides an opportunity to meet some of those needs. Staff proposes to apply for funding for improvements to Rainbow Recreation Center because it fits these criteria for the HRP Program and maximizes the amount of grant funds.

The following table explores an alternate proposal for the use of these funds.

<b>Alternative #1</b>	Fund only project(s) which are on the Park Prioritization List AND which is also present on <b>Attachment A</b> - List of 49 City Public Facilities (i.e. maximizing the City's grant award amount).
<b>Pro</b>	The City would maintain the currently estimated grant award amount since choosing a project from <b>Attachment A</b> - List of 49 City Public Facilities will comply with bonus award points thereby still maximizing the City's award amount.
<b>Con</b>	The majority of projects on the June 2014 Park Prioritization List (see Resolution No. 85056 C.M.S., June 17, 2014) have total development cost estimates that far exceed the currently estimated HRP Program grant award and in some cases have already received needed project funds. None of the projects on the Park Prioritization list are on <b>Attachment A</b> - List of 49 City Public Facilities AND are within grant award funding amount.
<b>Reason for not recommending</b>	The City risks submitting the grant application late and likely loses the opportunity to secure non-competitive grant funds if it takes time to vet any one OR all of these projects for inclusion in the grant application.

Staff therefore does not recommend this alternative.

**FISCAL IMPACT**

Securing the HRP Program grant funds will contribute to the City's community revitalization goals and OPR's facility upgrade goals. The Rainbow Recreation Center has an existing rehabilitation plan. With the HRP Program funds will cover a gap in funding for the current scope of work envisioned for the Center. Upgrades to this facility will reduce the costs of maintaining this aging community park asset and improve the infrastructure.

Funds for Rainbow Recreation Center will be received into the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), HCD Administrative Organization (89919) and Miscellaneous State Grant Award Account (46229). Once the grant funds are available for distribution and all grant receivables have been confirmed by HCD staff, funds will be appropriated to the respective project manager and the project accounting codes. The project number will be established once the rehabilitation projects are initiated.

**PUBLIC OUTREACH / INTEREST**

With regard to Rainbow Recreation Center, these park improvement projects were selected because of heavy community use and support from local organizations and community partners in their rehabilitation. In addition, OPW conducted extensive community outreach before applying for the Proposition 84 State Parks Grant and continues to engage the community during the design process.

## COORDINATION

Housing staff consulted with staff from the OPR, the Oakland Public Works Department (OPW), the City Administrator's Office and the Project Implementation Division prior to selecting the proposed project. The recommendations based on this coordination was to fund Rainbow Recreation Center. These parks were chosen based on their eligibility to secure maximum funding (see **Attachment A** - List of 49 City Public Facilities), their need for investment, proximity to HCD prior investments (furthering the City's objective of tying affordable housing development to broader community revitalization activities) OR presence on the City Park Prioritization list (a separate public process prioritization capital improvement needs).

This report has also been reviewed by the Office of the City Attorney and by the Controller's Bureau.

## SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

**Economic:** Authorization of City staff to apply for the HRP Program grant will provide up to \$2,000,000 in funds to support the rehabilitation of City parks and recreation facilities that will provide design and rehabilitation work for the City and local businesses.

**Environmental:** Projects selected will be required to incorporate sustainable design elements, improve energy efficiency and reduce the use of natural resource by utilizing recycled-content materials wherever possible as well as recycle construction debris to meet City waste recycling program.

**Social Equity:** Projects enhance the provision of basic service levels and quality of life amenities to very low- and low-income neighborhoods.

## CEQA

Rainbow Recreation Center as the named HRP Program fund recipients, are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), under Section 15301 ("Existing Facilities") of the CEQA Guidelines because: 1) paragraph (d) of section 15301 includes "Restoration or rehabilitation of deteriorated or damaged structures, facilities or mechanical equipment to meet current standards of public health and safety;" 2) paragraph (e) includes "Additions to existing structures provided that the addition will not result in an increase of more than: 50 percent of the floor area of the structures before the addition, or 2,500 square feet, whichever is less." Further, the recommended public facility fund recipients are also exempt from CEQA under Section 15302 ("Replacement or Reconstruction") of the CEQA Guidelines, which states "Class 2 consists of replacement or reconstruction of existing structures and facilities where the new structure will be located on the same site as the structure replaced and will have substantially the same purpose and capacity as the structure replaced....".

**ACTION REQUESTED OF THE CITY COUNCIL**

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt two pieces of legislation: 1) a resolution authorizing the City to apply for up to \$2,000,000 in grant funding under the California Department of Housing and Community Development Housing-Related Parks (HRP) Program for improvements to Rainbow Recreation Center; and 2) a resolution that amends Resolution No. 84507 C.M.S., which authorized the City to apply for, accept, and appropriate grant HRP Program funds in 2014-15. This resolution corrects the coding block to reflect the corrected expenditure account.



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**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO APPLY FOR, ACCEPT AND APPROPRIATE GRANT FUNDS FROM THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000,000 FOR THE HOUSING RELATED PARKS PROGRAM (PROGRAM YEAR 2015) FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO THE RAINBOW RECREATION CENTER**

**WHEREAS**, the State of California, Department of Housing and Community Development (the "Department") has issued a Notice of Funding Availability dated October 26, 2015 (the "2015 NOFA"), under its Housing Related Parks ("HRP") Program; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Oakland desires to apply for a HRP Program grant for improvements to the Rainbow Recreation Center and submit an application for the 2015 Designated Program Year Application Package released by the Department for the HRP Program; and

**WHEREAS**, the Department is authorized to approve funding allocations for the HRP Program, subject to the terms and conditions of the 2015 NOFA, Program Guidelines, Application Package, and Standard Agreement; now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED:** That the City Administrator is hereby authorized to apply for and submit to the Department the HRP Program Application Package released October 26, 2015 for the 2015 Designated Program Year for a grant in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000 to be used for improvements to the Rainbow Recreation Center and to accept such funds if awarded; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That if the application is approved, the City Administrator on behalf of the City of Oakland is hereby authorized to enter into, execute, and deliver a State of California Standard Agreement (the "Standard Agreement"), and any and all other documents required or deemed necessary or appropriate to secure the HRP Program grant from the Department, and all amendments thereto (collectively, the "HRP Grant Documents") in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City of Oakland shall be subject to the terms and conditions as specified in the Standard Agreement; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the funds are to be used for allowable capital asset project expenditures to be identified in Exhibit A of the Standard Agreement, the application in full is incorporated as part of the Standard Agreement, and any and all activities funded, information provided, and timelines represented in the application are enforceable through the Standard Agreement; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City of Oakland hereby agrees to use the funds for eligible capital asset(s) in the manner presented in the application as approved by the Department and in accordance with the NOFA and Program Guidelines and Application Package; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City Council hereby authorizes the City Administrator or his or her designee to negotiate and execute the State contract documents, administer the grant, modify, amend or extend agreement terms from the HRP Program, and take whatever action is necessary and appropriate with respect to the project and the HRP Program grant consistent with this Resolution and its basic purpose; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City Administrator is authorized to execute in the name of the City of Oakland the Application Package and HRP Program Grant Documents as required by the Department for participation in the HRP Program; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That when the HRP Program funds are received, such funds will be appropriated for the Rainbow Recreation Center in the following revenue and expense accounts: California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), DHCD Administrative Organization (89919) and Miscellaneous State Grant Award Account (46229), and that the expenditure budget shall be appropriated in the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), Oakland Public Works Capital Improvement Project - Project Management Organization (92270), with the Project Number established once the project is initiated; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That a copy of this Resolution will be transmitted to the State of California, Division of Housing Policy and Development, Department of Housing and Community Development, and placed on file with the City Clerk; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That this action complies with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), because the improvements to the public facility named as recommended HRP Program fund recipient, Rainbow Recreation Center, is exempt from CEQA review under Section 15301("Existing Facilities") and Section 15302 ("Replacement or Reconstruction") of the CEQA Guidelines.



**WHEREAS**, Resolution No. 85407 C.M.S. passed on January 29, 2015, authorized the City to apply for, accept, and appropriate a Housing Related Parks ("HRP") Program grant from the California Department of Housing and Community Development in an amount up to \$2,000,000 for improvements to Saint Andrew's Plaza, Curt Flood Field, and Josie de la Cruz Park; and

**WHEREAS**, the Resolution specified that funds would be deposited into California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), DHCD Administrative Organization (89919) and Miscellaneous State Grant Award Account (46229); and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Resolution No. 85407 C.M.S., the City applied for and accepted a HRP Program grant (program year 2014-2015) in the amount of \$912,550 and entered into a Standard Agreement with the Department but has not yet been able to appropriate the funds because the wrong account (organization) numbers were specified in the resolution; now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED:** That Resolution No. 85407 C.M.S. is hereby amended to appropriate the HRP Program grant into the following accounts:

- For Saint Andrew's Plaza: the revenue budget shall be appropriated into the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), DHCD Administrative Organization (89919) and Miscellaneous State Grant Award Account (46229). The expenditure budget shall be appropriated in the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), Oakland Public Works Capital Improvement Project - Project Management Organization (92270), Project Number P494610.

- For Curt Flood Field: the revenue budget shall be appropriated into the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), DHCD Administrative Organization (89919) and Miscellaneous State Grant Award Account (46229). The expenditure budget shall be appropriated in the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), Oakland Parks and Recreation Capital Improvement Projects – Project Management Organization (94500). The project number will be established once the Curt Flood Field rehabilitation project is initiated.
- For Josie de la Cruz Park: the revenue budget shall be appropriated into the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), DHCD Administrative Organization (89919) and Miscellaneous State Grant Award Account (46229). The expenditure budget shall be appropriated in the California Housing and Community Development Fund (2144), Oakland Public Works Capital Improvement Project - Project Management Organization (92270). The project number will be established once the Josie de la Cruz rehabilitation project is initiated.
