Detailing Citywide Crime Statistics and Law Enforcement Efforts Related to

the Juvenile Crime

SUMMARY

As requested by the Public Safety Committee on November 27, 2007, staff has prepared a follow-up informational report detailing Oakland Police Department (OPD) statistics for robbery and burglary offenses, along with information pertaining to national statistics and the geographic locations where these crimes occur. This report also contains information on charging or clearance rates. All information contained in this report is reflective of calendar year 2007, unless otherwise noted. This information is primarily inclusive of adult statistics as juvenile information was reported during past presentations.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is an informational report. Fiscal impacts have not been included.

BACKGROUND

On November 27, 2007, staff presented a report to the Public Safety Committee detailing statistical information concerning burglaries and robberies committed in the City of Oakland. The report also contained information relative to juvenile suspects and case dispositions involving juvenile suspects.

Upon conclusion of the presentation, the Committee directed staff to provide a follow-up report containing crime statistics on all offenders, as well as national statistics in comparison to the City of Oakland, the geographic areas where these crimes occur, and statistics on solved cases.

Crime statistics contained in this report for the past year (2007) identify the numbers of:

- robbery reports received;
- robbery cases assigned to investigators;
- robbery cases charged by the District Attorney's Office;
- burglary reports received;
- burglary cases assigned to investigators; and
- burglary cases charged by the District Attorney.





- 16% or 4 of the 24 reports involve juveniles;
- 23% or 8 of the 35 suspects are juveniles;
- 25% or 2 of the 8 juveniles are on probation or parole.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) utilizes a *call-out* system, in which investigators remain on call (standby) 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to respond to in custody or egregious crimes. Standby investigators have been highly successful in clearing cases by obtaining confessions and identifying crime series as a result of this system. This process shows that suspects are more likely to cooperate in the early stages of an investigation as opposed to attempting to elicit information days later, and/or after incarceration.

District Attorney's Office

Staff formally contacted the Office of the District Attorney to request that a representative of the DA's office present information on its protocol and procedures relative to the disposition of juvenile cases (Attachment 1). As of the date of this report, no response has been received.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: The Department's analysis of crime, specifically robberies and burglaries, is another tool used to reduce crime in Oakland and improve the quality of life for residents and merchants. This leads to a lower crime rate, which in turn encourages economic development and prosperity.

Environmental: There are no environmental opportunities associated with this report.

Social Equity: The Department's response to crime leads to the identification, arrest, successful prosecution of those responsible for committing crimes in Oakland. It serves as a deterrent and reduces recidivism rates thereby making the City a safer place.

DISABILITY AND SENIOR ACCESS

There are no ADA or senior citizen access issues identified in this report.

RECOMMENDATION / RATIONALE

The Department will continue to collect and analyze crime related data and criminal trends. In addition to our increased patrol presence, staff will continue to explore and utilize the latest technology in an effort to thwart criminal behavior.

ACTION REQUESTED OF THE COUNCIL

This is an informational report; therefore, no action is requested of the Council. Staff recommends acceptance of this report.

Dear District Attorney Orloff:

On September 25, 2007, the Oakland Police Department presented a report to the City of Oakland Public Safety Committee detailing crime statistics for the City. In particular, this report described the Department's efforts to address burglaries (residential, commercial, and automobile) and robberies. The report focused on crime trends and patterns for this calendar year as well as the two previous years. At the conclusion of the presentation, the committee asked for additional statistics concerning arrests, charges, and dispositions for the aforementioned crimes. It was also requested that information specific to juveniles be included in the supplemental report.

Captain Loman indicated that he could provide all of the information requested except the statistics regarding dispositions of adjudicated cases. He indicated that he would contact someone from the Alameda County District Attorney's Office and invite them to attend the subsequent hearing related to this. He also indicated that standards for dispositions are guidelines; many cases are handled based on factors relative to the case, such as:

- Previous offenses
- Age of suspect
- Egregiousness of the offense
- Injury to victims or witnesses
- · Weapon, etc.

On November 27, 2007, the police department presented the supplemental informational report on crime, including statistics and trends, and juveniles for the City. At that time, the committee learned that the information regarding dispositions on cases and dispositions on juveniles was not available. It was also learned that representatives from the Alameda County District Attorney's Office declined the invitation to attend. However, the committee would still like to receive as much public information as they can about post-adjudication dispositions, especially in regards to juveniles, and directed staff to do so.

The Public Safety Committee is formally requesting your presence for the next Public Safety Committee meeting regarding this information; it is scheduled for February 26, 2008. In addition, the committee would like to receive the following information:

- Dispositions on robbery and burglary cases for the calendar years 2005, 2006 and 2007
- Dispositions on robbery and burglary cases involving juveniles for the calendar years 2005, 2006 and 2007
- Current charging guidelines for robberies and burglaries (residential, commercial, and auto)
- Current charging guidelines for juveniles convicted of robbery and burglary (residential, commercial, and auto)
- Current diversion programs available for juveniles and/or alternative programs (i.e. Home Supervision, Electronic Monitoring, Youth Court, Boot Camp, etc.)
- What are the factors that will mitigate a case?
- Do you track recidivism rates for either adults or juveniles? If so, can you provide that information?

The information requested will be submitted to the City Administrator's Office one month before the committee meeting. Hence, we respectfully request to receive your report by January 29th, 2008.
