RE: RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO ENTER INTO A PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH BERRYMAN AND HENIGAR FOR THE STREET SURVEY AND PAVEMENT MANAGEMENT PROGRAM UPDATE FOR AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$315,000.00

#### **SUMMARY**

A resolution has been prepared authorizing the City Administrator to enter into a professional services agreement with Berryman & Henigar for the Street Survey and Pavement Management Program Update in an amount not to exceed \$315,000. The survey will update the Pavement Management Program (PMP) and link the PMP to the City's Geographical Information System (GIS).

It is recommended that the resolution be approved.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS

Approval of this resolution will authorize a professional services agreement in the amount of \$286,523.44 with contingency of approximately 10% (\$28,476.56) for a total amount not to exceed \$315,000.00. The following funds are available from Measure B ACTIA and Municipal Improvement Capital:

The Contract Compliance assessment and Public Arts assessment will be set aside upon award of the contract.

#### BACKGROUND

The City has approximately 836 centerline miles of streets. In order to effectively manage the street network and annual resurfacing program, the City needs to have an updated record of the

condition of each street. The last pavement management inspections were performed in 1998 for a portion of the City's street network. This PMP update will use the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's standardized inspection procedures to update the condition of approximately 750 centerline miles of streets within the City. The remaining streets are currently being reinspected as part of the Metropolitan Transportation Comission's Pavement Management Technical Assistance Program (MTC P-TAP) and are not included as part of this survey. Those inspections will be complete by July 2005. These inspections are the basis of the PMP and will be used to calculate the Pavement Condition Index (PCI) for each street and schedule streets for resurfacing each year as part of the street resurfacing program. This project will also identify all of the streets in poor condition that may require stopgap maintenance (e.g. pothole repair) until they can be resurfaced.

In order to be eligible for State and Federal street rehabilitation grants, the City must maintain a certified PMP. As part of the certification, arterial and collector streets are required to be inspected every two years and residential streets every five years. The City of Oakland's certification is pending the completion of these inspections.

#### KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

The City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) in January 2005 for professional consulting services to conduct a Citywide Street Survey and Pavement Management System Update. Seven firms responded to the RFP. Upon the review of the proposals, the top four teams listed below were invited for interviews:

- 1. Berryman and Henigar
- 2. Nichols Consulting Engineers
- 3. Harris and Associates
- 4. MACTEC

Four panelists from the Public Works Agency evaluated the teams. The panelists were selected to interview the consultant teams based on their knowledge of the Pavement Management System, the City's current inspection procedures, databases, and general knowledge of professional services contracts. The panelists evaluated the firms based on the following criteria:

- Relevant experience
- Qualifications of the project manager
- Cohesiveness and appropriateness of the project team
- Approach, understanding, and management of the project
- Quality and completeness of the presentation
- Responsiveness to questions

Based on the criteria, the interview panel ranked Berryman and Henigar as the most qualified firm to provide the Survey and Pavement Management Program Update. The following are the final scores for the top four ranked firms:

The Berryman and Henigar team has completed several similar projects throughout the Bay Area and is currently contracted by MTC to provide technical assistance to jurisdictions as part of the Pavement Management Technical Assistance Program (P-TAP). The GIS subconsultant for this project team has successfully integrated the latest version of the PMP and GIS for other jurisdictions and has just completed the City of Oakland's GIS parcel layer update.

The Berryman and Henigar team is comprised of 25% LBE and 25% SLBE which exceeds the City's requirements for each of these categories and received the maximum available LBE/SLBE preference points for their participation. Subsequent to the preliminary review, the City of Oakland's Contract Compliance Division determined that the Berryman and Henigar team complies with the Equal Benefits Ordinance. The Contract Compliance evaluation forms are provided in *Attachment A*.

The survey is scheduled to begin July 2005 and be completed within six months.

#### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This project will conduct street inspections and update the PCI for 750 centerline miles of streets within the City of Oakland and the link City's PMP to the GIS. These inspections will be used to manage the street resurfacing program, predict street maintenance and resurfacing needs, and predict the future condition of the City's street network based upon available funding. An up-to-date and accurate PMP is essential to ensure that the City's street resurfacing funds are used in the most cost effective manner.

#### SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

<u>Economic</u>: The funds spent, as part of this project, should turn over in the community to help stimulate the economic base. The results of this survey will help prioritize resurfacing projects, which will require contracting out to construction firms.

<u>Environmental</u>: The best management practices for street rehabilitation are to use available funding to preserve the streets in the better condition categories first and then resurface streets in the lower condition categories with any remaining funding. This is not only economical but also has an environmental benefit. Much less material is used for preventative maintenance than in street reconstruction. Streets that are maintained properly should create less waste than streets that are not maintained and require a full reconstruction.

<u>Social Equity:</u> The PMP proposes streets for resurfacing based mainly on the street condition or Pavement Condition Index. This ensures an objective criteria for street resurfacing Citywide.

#### DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

The PMP is the basis for the street resurfacing program. That program is used to ensure a safe travel path for vehicles, bicycles, and pedestrians.

#### RECOMMENDATION AND RATIONALE

Staff recommends that the City Council approve the resolution authorizing the City Administrator to enter into a professional services agreement with Berryman & Henigar for the Street Survey and Pavement Management Program Update in an amount not to exceed \$315,000.
