## **SUMMARY**

In 2005, under the Jerry Brown administration, a comprehensive study of the local food system was commissioned through the Mayor's Office of Sustainability ("Food Systems Assessment: Toward a Sustainable Food Plan", Unger and Wooten, 2006). One of the recommendations of the study was the need for an independent Food Policy Council to identify "policies and actions that would provide significant improvement to Oakland's food system."

In 2006 the Oakland City Council allocated \$50,000 in seed money to explore the development of a Food Policy Council (80332 C.M.S., December 19, 2006) and in 2008 the City Council authorized a grant agreement with Food First, Inc. to incubate and establish an <u>independent Oakland Food Policy Council</u> (81297 C.M.S., May 20, 2008). The OFPC was not established as a City agency, board or commission, nor does it have adjudicatory or regulatory powers. The OFPC was intended as an independent, community-based advocacy body, staffed, funded and operated through the non-profit sector.

One of the deliverables of the Food First grant agreement was the development of a strategic plan by the Oakland Food Policy Council. The attached document, entitled "Transforming the Oakland Food System: A Plan for Action" constitutes the Oakland Food Policy Council's Strategic Plan for 2010/2011.
