RE: A Report Evaluating the Preliminary Results of the Stimulus Grant Applications Submitted to the State and Federal Governments by the City of Oakland; Including a List of all Applications (Awarded and Not Awarded), Date of Award, Amount of Award and Analysis of Applications Not Awarded Funding

SUMMARY

This report provides information on the preliminary results of the City's grant applications submitted to the State and Federal governments for funding opportunities under the American Recovery and Revitalization Act of 2009 (ARRA).

FISCAL IMPACT

This is an informational report, there are no fiscal impacts.

KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

The City has received to date \$60,622,434 in grant awards through its efforts on the ARRA. In addition, the Port of Oakland, the Oakland Housing Authority, and other organizations serving the Oakland community have also received funding through the ARRA. See Attachment A for a list of applications, award status, and amount of award.

Analysis of Applications:

The ARRA competitive grants given both the level of national attention and community need are highly competitive grant applications. Federal officials have reported unprecedented levels of applications submitted for the grant opportunities. For example, the COPS Recovery Act program received 7,272 applications requesting a total of \$8.3 billion, while it was able to only fund 1,046 applications totaling \$1 billion.

Regarding the competitive Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance grant, the City submitted applications for three categories: Comprehensive Community-Based Approaches to Preventing and Reducing Violent Crime, Enhancing Forensics and Crime Scene Investigations, and Hiring of Civilian Law Enforcement. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) received 3,578 applications and made 120 awards totaling \$125,250,000.

Item #:____ ORA/City Council November 17, 2009 For the Comprehensive Community-Based Approaches to Preventing and Reducing Violent Crime category, \$24,029,128 was awarded to 20 applicants. One applicant in California received an award—the Institute for Public Strategies based in San Diego for border-related violence prevention efforts. For the Enhancing Forensics and Crime Scene Investigations category, \$8,313,977 was awarded to 12 applicants, none based in California. For the Hiring of Civilian Law Enforcement category, \$22,747,487 was awarded to 33 applicants, including the following in California: California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, City of Bakersfield, City of Ceres, City of Santa Rosa, City of Torrance, City of Watsonville, City of West Covina, and the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Office. 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FY 2009 Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Competitive Grant Program Funding Results

Scope of Program:

The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) is pleased to announce the release of funding results for the FY09 Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Competitive Grant Program. The purpose of this program is to: create and retain jobs. In addition to creating and retaining jobs, applicants were to: replicate or expand comprehensive community-based models and data-driven strategies to prevent or reduce violent crime through multi-jurisdictional task forces, intelligence-led policing, and comprehensive anti-gang initiatives; provide comprehensive offender reentry assessments and community supervision; establish new mortgage fraud investigation and prosecution units and task forces; support law enforcement agencies with civilian crime analysts, dispatchers, and community service officers; provide resources for forensic analysis and crime scene investigations; provide comprehensive services to child abuse victims, case management services, and clinical social worker expertise to enhance victims resources and services; establish or expand problem-solving courts such as drug courts, reentry courts, family courts, and neighborhood prosecution units; and implement nationwide training and technical assistance programs aimed at building capacity among criminal justice practitioners in specific areas, as well as developing statewide criminal justice plans using evidence-based practices and data-driven strategies. The solicitation for funding was released on March 19, 2009 and closed April 27, 2009 for Training and Technical Assistance (T&TA) and for site-based grants to all eligible applicants which included states, units of local government, and Indian tribes or tribal organizations and national, state, or local public and private entities, including for-profit (commercial) and nonprofit organizations, faith-based and community organizations, and institutions of higher education.

Review Process:

BJA is committed to ensuring a fair and consistent process for awarding grants. BJA reviews applications to make sure that the information presented is reasonable, understandable, measurable, and achievable, as well as consistent with program and legislative requirements as stated in the solicitation. Applications are screened initially to determine whether the applicants meet all eligibility requirements. Only applications submitted by eligible applicants that meet all other requirements (such as timeliness, proper format, and responsiveness to the scope of the solicitation) will be evaluated, scored, and rated by a peer review panel. A peer reviewer is an expert in the field of the subject matter of a given solicitation. Peer reviewers' ratings and any resulting recommendations are advisory only. In addition to peer review ratings, considerations may include, but are not limited to, underserved populations, geographic and topical diversity, strategic priorities, past performance, fiscal integrity and financial capability of applicants, and available funding. Absent explicit statutory authorization or written delegation of authority to the contrary, all final grant award decisions will be made by the Assistant Attorney General, Office of Justice Programs.

Funding Sought and Awarded:

BJA received 3,578 applications of which 2,623 applications met the basic minimum requirements and were sent forward for peer review. An application was excluded at BMR if it was missing major components of the application; did not follow the application guidelines; was outside the scope of the category under which it was submitted; was not an eligible applicant for the category; or was not providing nationwide delivery of training and technical assistance (Category VIII only). The 2,623 applications sent to peer review represent a total funding request of \$2,702,144,077.

BJA made five Training and Technical Assistance for a total of \$4,500,000, and 115 site-based award for a total of \$120,750,000 in funding.

Based upon the level of funding available, BJA made awards to approximately 3.3 percent of the applications received.

Feedback and Technical Assistance for Unfunded Applicants:

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Applicants who did not get funding under the solicitation will receive written notification. The email will include written comments from the peer reviewers about the applicant's submission, if the applicant was eligible and submitted a responsive application.
