RE A Report And Resolution Authorizing The City Administrator Or Her Designee To

Extend The Townsend Public Affairs State Lobbyist Contract From April 31, 2013 To April 31, 2014 In An Amount Not To Exceed \$126,000 And The Townsend Public Affairs Federal Lobbyist Contract From May 31, 2013 To May 31, 2014 In An Amount

Not To Exceed \$72,000.

SUMMARY

This report requests that the City Council authorize a contract extension with Townsend Public Affairs for state representation in an amount not to exceed \$126,000 for a period not to exceed 12 months. This report also recommends that the City Council authorize a contract extension with Townsend Public Affairs for federal representation in an amount not to exceed \$72,000 for a period not to exceed 12 months.

FISCAL IMPACT

Funding for these contracts is available in the General Purpose Fund (1010), Non-Departmental Citywide Activities Organization (90591), Miscellaneous Contract Services (54919), and the Federal Lobbyist Project (P49400) and the State Lobbyist Project (P49300) The Professional Services Agreement with Townsend Public Affairs as the City's state lobbyist shall be for the period April 31, 2013 through April 31, 2014 and The Professional Services Agreement with Townsend Public Affairs as the City's federal lobbyist shall be from May 31, 2013 to May 31, 2014

BACKGROUND

FEDERAL FY 2011-2013

The City issued a request for proposals (RFP) on February 9, 2011 to secure a federal lobbyist After the RFP process was completed, Townsend Public Affairs was selected to represent the City as its federal lobbyist. Townsend's federal lobbyist contract was from June 1, 2011 until May 31, 2012 with a one year option to renew until May 31, 2013.

STATE FY 2011- 2013

The City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) in December 2005 to secure a legislative representative for the 2006 State legislative session. Through that process, the City Council retained the services of Townsend Public Affairs (hereinafter TPA) to represent Oakland for the period of April 5, 2006 to January 5, 2007. Resolution No. 80459 extended the existing contract to December 5, 2007. In November 2007, the City Council passed Resolution No. 80999 which extended the contract with TPA through June 30, 2008 which continued on a month to month basis until October 31, 2008.

On May 19, 2009, the Council adopted a resolution awarding a contract to TPA, after issuing another Request for Proposal (RFP), to serve as the City's State Legislative Representative for the period of November 1, 2008 through October 31, 2010, a period of two years, in an amount of One Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$130,000 00) per year, for a total amount not to exceed Two Hundred Sixty Thousand (\$260,000), and authorizing the City Administrator, without further Council action, to exercise an option to renew the contract for a third year under the same terms, conditions, and price, for a total amount not-to-exceed three hundred ninety thousand dollars (\$390,000 00) for three years

On October 20, 2010 the City Administrator authorized an amendment of TPA's original agreement dated November 1, 2008 and extended it from October 31, 2010 to October 31, 2011 The contract was extended again until October 31, 2012 with an option to renew on a month to month basis for six months until April 31, 2013.

KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

Townsend Public Affairs has served as the City of Oakland's state lobbyist since 2006. As the state lobbyist for Oakland, Townsend has successfully worked in partnership with the Mayor, City Council, and the City Administration to pass important legislation and secure funding to accomplish the goals of the City. To date, Townsend has secured \$ 79,708,845 for the City of Oakland in State hinding

Townsend Public Affairs has served as the City of Oakland's federal lobbyist since 2011. Townsend and its team have worked in partnership with the City of Oakland for nearly two years. They are very familiar with the needs of the community of Oakland and the inner workings of our government.

State Legislative Highlights

2011

In 2011, TPA worked with the elected City leaders and staff to develop and advocate for several major City initiatives through legislation, grants and the state budget. To provide a quick summary of the highlights, please note the following

- Staffed two Oakland-sponsored bills that were sent to the Governor for signature AB 184 (Swanson) on behalf of the City of Oakland This bill gives local governments the authority to loan money to homeowners for seismic safety improvements. The bill makes seismic retrofits more affordable by providing homeowners with a financing option that removes much of the upfront expense. AB 184 enjoyed bi-partisan support in the Legislature and was one of the first bills signed by Governor Jerry Brown
- AB 90 (Swanson) on behalf of the City of Oakland This bill within the definition of criminal profiteering activity, includes any crime in which the perpetrator induces, encourages, or persuades, or causes through force, fear, coercion, deceit, violence, duress, menace, or threat of unlawful injury to the victim or to another person, a person under 18 years of age to engage in a commercial sex act, and specifies that the proceeds shall be deposited in a Victim-Witness Fund. This bill was signed into law
- 3. SB 555 (Hancock) This bill adds the acquisition, installation, and improvement of energy efficiency, water conservation, and renewable energy improvements that are affixed to the types of facilities that a community facilities district (CFD) may finance, or refinance, regardless of whether the buildings or property are privately or publicly owned. This bill was signed into law
- 4 Secured \$6 million in park related funding TPA worked closely with the City to submit multiple Proposition 84 Parks grant applications and secured awards for Durant Mini Park and the Golden Gate Recreation Center

2012

In 2012, TPA worked with the elected City leaders and staff to develop and advocate for several major City initiatives through legislation, grants and the state budget. To provide a quick summary of the highlights, please note the following

- 1 Staffed Oakland's top legislative priority bill, AB 57 (Beall) Metropolitan Transportation Commission This bill, which was signed into law, increases the membership of MTC to 21 by adding two new voting members, the Mayor of Oakland and the Mayor of San Jose
- 2 Staffed another priority bill, AB 2610 (Skinner) which revises the requirement of existing law providing 60 days' notice to instead provide, in the case of a month-to-month lease or penodic tenancy, for 90 days' notice for tenants in a foreclosed property
- Worked closely with the City and East Bay legislators to navigate the beginning of RDA dissoltition to insure priority projects remain intact and moving forward.
- 4 Helped secure over \$200,000 in CIP funds from the 2012 Safe Routes to Schools (SR2S) Grant -Construct curb ramps and bulb outs near Parker Elementary

TPA worked with the elected City leaders and staff to develop, advocate and secure several major City initiatives through vanous means, including legislation, grants and working directly with the Governor's Office Please note the following state legislative efforts and highlights

- Staffed five Oakland-sponsored bills that passed the Legislature and were sent to Governor Brown for his consideration
 - AB 48 (Skinner): Large Capacity Magazines Signed into law
 - AB 180 (Bonta): Gun registration Vetoed
 - AB 767 (Levine) Stolen Vehicles Signed into law (This measure was originally introduced as AB 1324 (Skinner/Bonta))
 - SB 254 (Hancock): Mattress Recycling Signed into law
 - SB 613 (DeSaulnier): Bay Area Toll Authority Signed into law
- Monitored over 100 bills, which were identified as important to the legislative agenda of the City of Oakland Specifically, TPA advocated on the City's behalf for 41 bills on which the City took either a support or an oppose position Of these measures, 11 were signed into law by the Governor, 7 were vetoed by the Governor, and 23 bills were held in the Legislature for potential consideration in 2014
 - TPA's advocacy efforts included working in concert with the Office of the Mayor, the Office of the Council President, City Staff, State legislators, legislative committee members and staff, and the Governor's Office
- Partnered with the Assistant City Administrator to overturn a decision by the Department of Finance on RDA dissolution TPA successfully overturned and reallocated over \$1.7 million dollars in post-RDA funds for the Low and Moderate Income Housing Project staff on the Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule
- In tandem with the Mayor's Office, Office of the City Manager, City Attorney's Office and the master developer of the Oakland Army Base, TPA worked closely with the Governor's Office, Senator Hancock, Assembly Member Skinner, Assembly Member Bonta and the Department of Finance to overturn a previous decision by the Department of Finance and reallocated over \$44 million dollars for the Oakland Army Base project Additionally, numerous land parcels were also transferred back to the project to ensure the project moves forward
- Through its efforts in statewide public safety initiatives, TPA arranged for the City and the Police Chief to participate as a member of the working group formed by the Senate Democrats to develop a comprehensive package of gun safety bills
- As a result of the effort listed above, the Chief and Assistant Chief provided testimony to legislative committees on four separate occasions to help advance these measures

through the legislative process and secure their passage TPA arranged for testimony, drafted speaking points, and staffed the Chief and Assistant Chief at the committee hearings

- Organized a meeting between the Mayor, Public Works Staff, Caltrans and the California Transportation Commission to address flooding problems near Interstate 880 and the 23rd/29th Avenue off ramp TPA then helped drive the follow-up and resolution for the project
- Worked closely with the offices of Assembly Member Bonta and Assembly Member Skinner, the Mayor's Office, and the Oakland Police Department to get additional CHP support to address public safety in the City
- Provided City staff support, updates, and strategic advice as the City fought to keep its Enterprise Zone intact
- Served as a key member of a state wide coalition that completely drafted and rewrote the medicinal cannabis guidelines to provide statewide regulations, while ensuring the proposal would be in the best interest of the City and residents
- Worked closely with the East Bay Legislative delegation, a large coalition of businesses, labor, and environmental groups to amend AB 1273 (Ting) which added protections to the San Francisco bay and waterfront
- Sent weekly legislative updates and bill matrices to the Mayor, City Council and Administration These updates included specific bills we were working on for the City along with bills we suggested the City watch, support or oppose The legislative categories included Public Safety, Planning, Housing and Land Use, Infrastructure, Environment, Energy and Sustainability, Economic Development, Youth, Constitutional changes, and Miscellaneous
- Identified and then notified the City of funding opportunities to help support City priorities TPA would also provide additional support, including helping draft applications, working with the State agencies, securing letters of support, and other advocacy methods, when deemed appropriate by the City
- Provided City Council staff training on the State Legislative Process

Worked with City to Establish State Legislative Proposals

• Efforts to reduce human trafficking at massage parlors. The City has been a leader in efforts to reduce sexual exploitation and to reduce human trafficking. The goal of this

legislation would be to give the City additional enforcement tools to address the proliferation of human trafficking that occurs at massage parlors

- Robberies/Assaults linked to Smart Phones The era of "smart phones" has unequivocally made all of our lives a bit easier and most people carry their phones with them everywhere they go This practice, unfortunately, has become a target for thieves. In order to ensure that the residents of Oakland can feel completely safe using their smart phones in public a legislative initiative would be crafted to help limit the use of smart phones on the secondary market. The goal of this legislation would be to remove the profit motive for those who would attempt to steal smart phones.
- Illegal Dumping/Blight Enforcement As Oakland and other cities work towards their zero
 waste goals, some communities are burdened and negatively impacted by illegal dumping
 The dumping harms the quality of life in these neighborhoods while attracting more
 problems The goal of this legislation would be to provide more tools for local government
 to take on this challenge
- Medicinal Cannabis Statewide Regulations A comprehensive, thorough approach to statewide medicinal cannabis guidelines is needed, while at the same time allowing existing, approved dispensaries to continue to operate and show the federal government that California has clear guidelines. The goal of this initiative is to provide regulations that allow existing dispensaries to operate, and to set up an entire system statewide.
- Economic Dévelopment Tidelands Trust The City will explore the impacts of the public trust doctrine on Jack London Square
- Economic Development Coliseum City and the Oakland Army Base project Due to the loss of redevelopment hinding, a new form of economic development is needed to attract additional support to large scale developments. As the City moves forward with the build out of Coliseum City and the Army Base, some form of tax increment funding will likely be needed. The goal of this proposal would be to develop a new finding model which local governments could utilize in the development of large scale projects with broad community support.
- Illegal gambling parlors/Sweepstakes issue Some small business owners are trying to get around local zoning regulations and are opening online gambling establishments via software called sweepstakes The goal of this initiative would be to provide greater support for local government and regulations from the State

- TPA worked directly with the Mayor's Office and Oakland Police Department to apply for, advocate on behalf of, and ultimately secure \$4,515,703 from the FY13 Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) Grant Our efforts also included working with the COPS office and staff before the solicitation was released
- Worked to secure additional time, and keep the finding in place, for the City's FEMA-Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA)-Domain Awareness Center (DAC) award in the amount of \$2,900,000 The Port had not acted quickly enough so the City needed more time to advance the project and through our efforts an extension was secured and the City was not required to return the original finding
- Organized advocacy trips to Washington DC for the Mayor, Police Chief, and Assistant Police Chief. These efforts included securing meetings, developing and providing background on various agencies and staff, providing each agency a pre-meeting preparing on the City's needs, staffing the City during all meetings, and working with the City and each agency to ensure proper follow up on action items
- 4 Provided support and strategy as the City resolved matters with the US Army over past cleanup efforts at the Oakland Army Base TPA also worked with the office of Senator Feinstein on this matter
- Worked with Congresswoman Lee's office and the Department of Education regarding the City's Safe Passages grant application TPA was able to secure reviewer comments to pre-applicants and worked to help submit a full application
- 6. Updated the offices of Senator Boxer, Senator Feinstein and Congresswoman Lee on our opposition to the Farm Bill and its impact on Oakland

The City of Oakland's legislative agenda for 2014 will reflect the adopted priorities of the City Council and the Mayor. The strategic agenda includes advocating for legislation, regulations, and funding that is consistent with the City's adopted goals. TPA has included input from the Office of the Mayor, City Council, and City Staff. This report is compiled into three sections.

At the December 5th, 2013 Rules Committee meeting, the Committee also directed TPA to coordinate with the advocacy firms representing Alameda County, Oakland Unified School District and Port of Oakland to ensure coordination and unified efforts

Federal and State Legislative Priorities for Monitoring and Recommended Action

The following legislative themes have been identified by the Mayor, Councilmembers, and City staff as priorities. TPA maintains a constantly updated matrix of state bills for the City of Oakland, providing additional analysis and information to inform the development of a position by the city. If legislation is introduced that impacts any of the priorities, staff will be asked to analyze and evaluate the need for City Council action. The City Council may choose to take a position on a measure, continue to monitor without a position, or determine if any further response or reaction is needed. TPA will monitor legislative activity in the following areas.

- Public Safety- Measures relating to gun and ammunition access, efforts to provide local law enforcement with additional support, and incentives for re-entry programs
- Economic Development- Measures providing for new tax increment financing opportunities, and efforts to encourage local manufacturing, light industrial and bioscience opportunities
- Infrastructure-Measures affecting hinding for roads and transit oriented developments
- Planning, Housing and Land Use- Measures affecting local control over affordable housing
- Environment, Energy and Sustainability- Measures pertaining to clean energy efforts, graffiti abatement, reducing waste, and other environmental impacts of local agencies
- Youth- Measures providing education or employment opportunities for youth and resolving issues pertaining to the final audit for Oakland Unified, absenteeism and drop outs
- Constitutional Modifications- Measures which would impact local governments, such as lowering the voter threshold to 55% for various bond issuances and local taxes
- Miscellaneous- Any other measure or budget action which could potentially impact the operations of, or services provided by, the City, and support to make local government whole from past budget actions

Funding Opportunities and Requests

TPA will continue its proactive efforts to immediately notify the City once various finding opportunities are announced. In addition to the specific hinding opportunities listed below, we will keep the City informed of any potential hinding opportunities throughout the year. City staff will work with the City Council to prioritize projects submitted to the state for funding and TPA will advocate for those approved projects as appropriate. TOTAL CONTRACT **AMOUNT** OF AND WAIVING ADVERTISING AND THE REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS/OUALIFICATIONS PROCESS FOR EACH CONTRACT

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland desires to complement its state advocacy efforts in the Cahfornia State Legislature and with the Governor and its federal legislative advocacy efforts in the United States Congress and Executive Branch, and

WHEREAS, the City desires to assemble and organize pertinent information, facts and data relating to legislative matters affecting the City and its interests and to present and disseminate such information to legislative bodies, executive officials of the state and federal government and other bodies, commissions, committees and organizations, and

WHEREAS, the services above primarily involve state and federal legislative and administrative advocacy and the assistance of individuals in such matters who will best serve the interests of this City, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to request for proposal/qualifications process, in 2009 the Council awarded a contract to Townsend Public Affairs to serve as the City's state legislative lobbyist from November, 2008 through October 31, 2012 (Resolution No 82022), and m 2011 the Council approved an extension until April, 2013 (Resolution No 83660), and

WHEREAS. pursuant to request for proposal/qualifications process, in 2011the Council awarded a contract to Townsend Public Affairs to serve as the City's federal legislative lobbyist from May, 2011 through May, 2013 (Resolution No 83395), and

WHEREAS, staff recommends that it is in the City's best interest to waive the advertising and request for proposal/qualifications process and approve extensions for the contracts with Townsend Public Affairs for state and federal lobbyist services because it is necessary to maintain lobbyist services while the City conducts advertising and solicits proposals for the issuance of new contracts for these services, and

WHEREAS, Oakland Municipal Code Section 2 04 051 authorizes the City Council to waive the advertising and request for proposal/qualifications process upon a finding that it is in the City's best interests to do so, and

WHEREAS, staff recommends extending Townsend's state lobbyist contract from April 3, 2013 to April 3, 2013, for which they be paid an amount not to exceed \$126,000, and

WHEREAS, staff recommends extending Townsend's federal lobbyist contract from May 31, 2013 to May 31, 2014, for which they be paid an amount not to exceed \$72.000, and

WHEREAS, funding for these contracts is available in the General Purpose Fund (1010). Non-Departmental Citywide Activities Organization (90591), Miscellaneous Contract Services (54919) Federal Lobbyist Project (P49400) and the State Lobbyist Project (P49300) and

WHEREAS; the City Administrator has detennined that the aforementioned contracts are of a professional and temporary nature and shall not result in the loss of employment or salary by any person having permanent status in the competitive service, now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council finds and determines, based on City Administrator's report and information above that the aforementioned contracts with Townsend Public Affairs are of a profession all and temporary nature and shall not result in the loss of employment or salary by any person having permanent status in the competitive process, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Council approves extension of the contract with Townsend Public Affairs for state lobbying work from April 30, 2013 to April 30, 2014 for an amount not to exceed \$126,000, for a total contract amount to \$711,000, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Council approves extension of the contract with Townsend Public Affairs for federal lobbying work from May 31, 2013 to May 31, 2014 for an amount not to exceed \$72,000, for a total contract amount of \$216,000, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That, based on the City Administrator's report and information above and pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code Section 2 04 051, the City Council hereby finds and determines that it is in the best interests of the City to waive the advertising and request for proposal/qualifications processes for the state lobbyist and federal lobbyist contracts and extend Townsends lobbyist contracts, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That said agreements shall be approved as to form and legality by the Office of the City Attorney and placed on file at the Office of the City Clerk
