RESOLUTION APPROVING IMPLEMENTATION OF RESIDENTIAL PERMIT PARKING ON STONEWALL ROAD FROM CLAREMONT AVENUE TO NO. 175 STONEWALL ROAD, CLAREMONT AVENUE FROM STONEWALL ROAD TO TANGLEWOOD ROAD, AND TANGLEWOOD ROAD FROM CLAREMONT AVENUE TO BERKELEY CITY LIMT

#### **SUMMARY**

A resolution has been prepared approving the implementation of Residential Permit Parking (RPP) on Stonewall Road from Claremont Avenue to No. 175 Stonewall Road, Claremont Avenue from Stonewall Road to Tanglewood Road, and Tanglewood Road from Claremont Avenue to the Berkeley City Limit as shown in the shaded area of Exhibit A, attached. RPP has been proposed in the areas according to the petition process contained in the City Ordinance No. 10689 C.M.S. All the requirements for implementing RPP have been satisfied.

Initiation of the RPP program resulted from the problem parking activities of the students from the University of California, Berkeley, and area business employees and patrons. The parking problem is compounded by many of the area residents owning more than one car, and, in addition, some of the residential properties do not have an off-street parking facility. The proposed RPP will relieve the area residents from long-term parking that is generated by the nonresidents.

# FISCAL IMPACT

The cost to install RPP signs on the subject street segment is estimated at \$3,000.00. Funds are available in the Neighborhood Traffic Safety Program budget. The revenue expected from sales of 42 maximum permits is \$1,050.00 for the first year and \$630.00 for each subsequent year. The revenue will be deposited into the General Purpose Fund (1010) Residential Parking Permits Account (42416), Treasury Organization (08721). Also, annual parking enforcement cost is estimated at \$22,000.00. Revenue from enforcement is expected to partially offset this cost.

Funding for the initial implementation of the RPP is available in the Transportation Services Organization #92246, Neighborhood Traffic Calming Project #C159610, Program NB33, Fund 2230 (State Gas Tax).

### BACKGROUND

RPP alleviates parking congestion in residential neighborhoods caused by non-residents such as commuters, students, employees, and shoppers. Upon establishing RPP on a street, signs are installed limiting on-street parking to either two or four hours, except for vehicles displaying residential parking permits, which are available for purchase to eligible addresses on the street. In order for RPP to be considered, a minimum of three contiguous blocks must be proposed, a petition containing signatures representing at least 51% of the addresses on each block must be obtained (30% in high-density residential areas), the parking occupancy on each street must be at least 75%, and the streets must be zoned residential for at least 80% of their lengths. In addition, it is required that a public hearing be held as part of the process.

Area residents submitted a petition containing signatures representing 89% of eligible addresses along Stonewall Road from Claremont Avenue to No. 175 Stonewall Road for consideration of RPP late in 2004. For both Claremont Avenue from Stonewall Road to Tanglewood Road, and Tanglewood Road from Claremont Avenue to Berkeley City Limit, petitions containing signatures representing 100% of eligible addresses were submitted. Parking surveys conducted indicated that 100% of the parking spaces are occupied on a typical weekday along the three street segments.

A public hearing with 15 attendees was held on February 8, 2005, at No. 2 Stonewall Road. After the public hearing, the residents of Upper Stonewall, between No. 175 and the dead end circulated a petition to exclude themselves from the RPP program, and as a result the limiting address for the proposed RPP program along Stonewall Road is at No. 175.

The proposed RPP is consistent with the City Council and Mayor's Goal 2D:

Build Community and Foster Livable Neighborhoods by providing for clean, well-maintained and accessible streets and sidewalks.

Staff recommends approval of the resolution.

#### KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

Passage of the resolution on the proposed segments of Stonewall, Claremont and Tanglewood will allow RPP to become implemented. The heavy on-street parking within the proposed RPP blocks along the proposed area is due to the parking activities of the University of California, Berkeley students and staff, and area business employees and patrons. On streets where RPP has been implemented, the program has generally been effective in alleviating parking congestion for area residents.

# SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

<u>Economic</u>: No significant economic opportunities are envisioned as the result of implementing RPP.

# Environmental:

The proposed RPP is expected to discourage some drivers from parking on the proposed street segments, thereby reducing vehicle emissions.

# Social Equity:

RPP is already approved for the street surrounding the proposed block. Approval of this proposal will create equity in parking policy throughout the area.

#### DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

The proposed RPP will provide more opportunities for disabled and senior citizens to find available parking closer to their homes. Vehicles displaying a disabled placard will be exempted from the time restriction.

# RECOMMENDATION AND RATIONALE

Staff recommends approval of the resolution establishing RPP on Stonewall Road from Claremont Avenue to No. 175 Stonewall Road, Claremont Avenue from Stonewall Road to Tanglewood Road, and Tanglewood Road from Claremont Avenue to the Berkeley City Limit in accordance with the procedures of the City Ordinance No. 10689 C.M.S., in order to alleviate the parking congestion presently experienced by the area residents.


