Neighbors for Racial Justice (N4RJ)

We are a group of Dimond residents who came together two years ago to educate and challenge ourselves and each other about the use of racial profiling on our list serves, by our police, in our institutions, and in our behavior.

Some of our actions include:

- 1. Becoming an official Neighborhood Action Group of the Dimond Neighborhood Crime Prevention Council.
- 2. Hosting two free screenings of the World Trust film, *Cracking the Codes: Unlocking the System of Racial Inequality* in the Dimond district. Close to 200 people showed up for one screening or the other.
- 3. Working to define racial profiling, especially as it applies to reporting and fighting crime in our own neighborhood. We want all neighbors to be safe from harm and we want effective methods of reporting crime that do not endanger people of color.
- 4. Vigiling in support of the #BlackLivesMatter movement at the corner of Fruitvale and MacArthur, Saturdays from 12 noon to 1. We connect with our neighbors to strengthen our voices in the work to be done against systemic racism.
