RE: **Ordinance Authorizing A Fiscal Year 2008-09 Increase To A Special Tax Imposed For Emergency Medical Services In Accordance With The Emergency Medical Services Retention Act of 1997 (Measure M), And Setting June 17, 2008 As The Date For A Public Hearing**

SUMMARY

Attached for City Council consideration is an ordinance authorizing a FY 2008-09 adjustment, consistent with the Consumer Price Index (CPI), to the special parcel tax for the Emergency Medical Services Retention Act of 1997.

In June 1997, the electorate of Oakland approved, by more than a two-thirds majority, the Emergency Medical Services Retention Act of 1997, Measure M. The measure imposed a parcel tax for the purpose of raising revenue necessary to retain and enhance emergency dispatch and medical services in the City of Oakland, and replaced funding from a previous assessment imposed by the City that was invalidated by Proposition 218. The Measure M legislation authorizes the City Council to increase the tax rates by a cost-of-living factor beginning in Fiscal Year 1998-99 and continuing each fiscal year thereafter. A 3.3 percent increase to Measure M special parcel tax rates is proposed for FY 2008-09, consistent with the CPI increase for the San Francisco Bay Area during 2007.

A public hearing on the proposed ordinance to increase the Measure M special parcel tax is scheduled for June 17, 2008 after 5:00 p.m.

FISCAL IMPACT

The FY 2008-09 estimated revenue from Measure M (Fund 2412) is \$1.68 million, including the proposed rate increases. The proposed annual rate increase of 3.3 percent translates to approximately \$53,280 of the total FY 2008-09 estimated revenue.

BACKGROUND

Beginning FY 1998-99 and continuing each fiscal year thereafter, the Measure M legislation allows the City Council to adjust the tax rates in accordance with the CPI for the immediate San Francisco Bay Area. At no time, however, may the rates be increased by more than 5.0 percent of the tax rates imposed by ordinance during the immediate preceding fiscal year.

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The following table summarizes the historical tax rate increases that have been authorized pursuant to City Council action since the legislation was enacted:

KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

The proposed ordinance applies an adjustment of 3.3 percent to the current Measure M special parcel tax amount, effective July 1, 2008. This increase is per the actual change in the San Francisco Bay Area CPI during 2007. The proposed increase applies on a fiscal year basis (i.e., July 1st –June 30th).

The following table summarizes the impact of the proposed increases by parcel type:

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the proposed ordinance authorizing a 3.3 percent increase, consistent with CPI, in the tax imposed pursuant to the Emergency Medical Services Retention Act of 1997.



**ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING A FISCAL YEAR 2008-09
INCREASE TO A SPECIAL TAX IMPOSED FOR EMERGENCY
MEDICAL SERVICES IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE
EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES RETENTION ACT OF 1997
(MEASURE M)**

WHEREAS, in 1997 the voters of Oakland approved Measure M, a special tax to fund emergency medical services; and

WHEREAS, Measure M imposed a special tax on all parcels in the City of Oakland, except where the parcels are otherwise exempt from taxation by Section 3 of the Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, Measure M provided that beginning in fiscal year 1998-99 and each fiscal year thereafter, the Oakland City Council may increase the tax only upon a finding that the cost of living in the immediate San Francisco Bay Area, as shown by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for all items, has increased since the 1997 index year; and

WHEREAS, Measure M provided that any tax rate adjustment imposed by the City Council pursuant to the ordinance shall not exceed five percent of the tax rate imposed during the immediately preceding fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on this ordinance to increase the Measure M special parcel tax was held on June 17, 2008 after 5:00 p.m. in City Hall, One Frank H. Ogawa Plaza, Oakland, California; now, therefore,

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OAKLAND DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1. The Oakland City Council hereby finds that the Consumer Price Index for all items in the San Francisco Bay Area was 209.2 for calendar year 2006 and that the Consumer Price Index for calendar year 2007 was 216.0.

2. The cost-of-living in the immediate San Francisco Bay Area as shown by the Consumer Price Index, has increased 3.3 percent between calendar year 2006 and calendar year 2007.

3. The Measure M special tax rate upward adjustment shall be 3.3 percent, effective July 1, 2008, pursuant to the Measure M requirement that the rate increase equal the annual CPI increase for the San Francisco Bay Area, and at no time may the increase exceed 5.0 percent of the tax rates imposed by the Ordinance during the immediately preceding fiscal year.

4. The following rate structure will be imposed on parcels within the City of Oakland effective July 1, 2008 for FY 2008-09:

**ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AN INCREASE TO A SPECIAL TAX IMPOSED
FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES IN ACCORDANCE WITH
MEASURE M APPROVED BY VOTERS IN 1997**

NOTICE AND DIGEST

This Ordinance authorizes an increase to a special tax imposed by the Emergency Medical Services Retention Act of 1997 (Measure M), which was submitted to the voters by Resolution No. 73311 C.M.S. and approved by the voters in June 1997. The Act allows rates to be adjusted for changes in the Consumer Price Index, in an amount not to exceed five percent (5%), as provided in Section 4 of the Resolution. The proposed changes are a total increase of 3.3 percent for FY 2008-09. Effective July 1, 2008, the Single Family Residential rate would increase from \$11.34 to \$11.70, the Multiple Unit Residential rate (2 to 4 units) would increase from \$22.67 to \$23.41, the Multiple Unit Residential rate (5 or more units) would increase from \$56.67 to \$58.52, the Commercial rate would increase from \$22.67 to \$23.41, the Industrial rate would increase from \$45.33 to \$46.82, the Rural rate would increase from \$11.34 to \$11.70, and the Institutional rate would increase from \$11.34 to \$11.70.
