A SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT ON THE OAKLAND COMMUNITY ACTION PARTNERSHIP'S 2006 FUNDING ALLOCATIONS AND PROJECTED PROGRAM OUTCOMES, AND A REVISED RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO 1) APPLY FOR, ACCEPT AND APPROPRIATE A TWO-YEAR GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,361,186 IN COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT (CSBG) FUNDS FROM THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY SERVICES AND DEVELOPMENT (CSD) TO THE CITY OF OAKLAND'S FEDERALLY DESIGNATED COMMUNITY ACTION AGENCY IN THE AMOUNT OF \$680,593 ANNUALLY FOR CALENDAR YEARS 2006 AND 2007; AND 2) ENTER INTO AGREEMENTS WITH ANTI-POVERTY SERVICE PROVIDERS FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2006

SUMMARY

This supplemental report and revised resolution responds to the Life Enrichment Committee's request at its February 14, 2006 meeting to provide the list of organizations, programs, and their projected outcomes approved by the Oakland Community Action Partnership tripartite Administering Board to receive funding for calendar year 2006, and amend the previous proposed resolution to reflect Council's authorization for the City Administrator to 1) apply for, accept and appropriate a two-year grant in the amount of \$1,361,186 in Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds from the State of California, Department of Community Services and Development (CSD) to the City of Oakland's federally designated Community Action Agency in the amount of \$680,593 annually for calendar years 2006 and 2007; and 2) enter into agreements with anti-poverty service providers for calendar year 2006.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Oakland's CSBG grant is administered by the Department of Human Services through the Community Action Partnership Administering Board. Unlike other funding governance structures, federal regulations mandate that a public "entity shall administer the Community Services Block Grant program through a tripartite board that fully participates in the

Item: 5-25 City Council February 21, 2006 development, planning, implementation, and evaluation of the program(s) to serve low-income communities" (Public Law 105-285, SEC. 676B). The City of Oakland's 15 member tripartite Administering Board is comprised of one-third community members who are democratically elected through the Community Development District Boards for a total of seven members (7), five (5) are City of Oakland elected official or their designees, and three (3) members represent other groups and interests that serve Oakland's low-income community. This Board's authority to render funding allocations is documented in the Council approved Community Action Partnership Administering Board's bylaws (2001) under Article III, Section D: Powers of the Administering Board.

For calendar year 2006, the following activities and outcomes have been approved by the OCAP Administering Board to receive funding:

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The Life Enrichment Committee requested that the supplemental report address service outcomes of the programs funded in calendar year 2006, and that annual CAP reports to Council address the program results. The Committee also requested that staff provide a revised resolution to reflect Council's authorization for the City Administrator to enter into agreements with funded anti-poverty service providers for calendar year 2006; and that a paragraph in the previously drafted resolution exempting staff from returning to Council for subsequent renewal of CSBG funding be stricken. Staff has revised the resolution and eliminated said paragraph.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO 1) APPLY FOR, ACCEPT AND APPROPRIATE A TWO-YEAR GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,361,186 IN COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT (CSBG) FUNDS FROM THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY SERVICES AND DEVELOPMENT (CSD) TO THE CITY OF OAKLAND'S FEDERALLY DESIGNATED COMMUNITY ACTION AGENCY IN THE AMOUNT OF \$680,593 ANNUALLY FOR CALENDAR YEARS 2006 AND 2007; AND 2) ENTER INTO AGREEMENTS WITH ANTI-POVERTY SERVICE PROVIDERS FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2006

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland has received Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funding since 1971; and

WHEREAS, federal regulations mandate that an "entity shall administer the Community Services Block Grant Program through a tripartite board [Oakland's Community Action Partnership Administering Board] that fully participates in the development, planning, implementation, and evaluation of the program(s) to serve low-income communities" (Public Law 105-285, SEC. 676(B); and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland Community Action Partnership (OCAP) was awarded a two-year grant in the amount of \$1,361,186 in renewal funding from the Federal Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program with an annual allocation of \$680,593 from the State of California Department of Community Services and Development (CSD) for Calendar Years 2006 and 2007; and

WHEREAS, in order to minimize any program and/or fiscal impacts to local jurisdictions, the State of California Department of Community Services and Development has issued a two-year contract to the Oakland Community Action Partnership through Contract Number 06F-4703; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland, on behalf of the OCAP, is willing to apply for, accept and appropriate the aforementioned grant in the amount of \$1,361,186 for the program year January 1, 2006 through December 31, 2006 and January 1, 2007 through December 31, 2007, under provisions of the Community Services Block Grant; and

WHEREAS, the grantor agrees to pay all central services overhead costs associated with administering the grant; and

S-25 Ora/council WHEREAS, these funds will be used to provide support and services to Oakland's low-income citizens in moving toward self sufficiency as outlined in the state approved 2006-2007 City of Oakland Community Action Plan; and

WHEREAS, services provided will be in accordance with both Federal and State subcontractor provisions, regulations, and guidelines for eligible activities under the Community Services Block Grant; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the City Administrator or her designee is hereby authorized to apply for, accept and appropriate a two-year grant in the amount of \$1,361,186 in Community Services Block Grant funds for OCAP programming for calendar years 2006 and 2007, and any additional CSD funding that may become available without returning to Council; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the City Council hereby authorizes the City Administrator or her designee as agent for the City to negotiate and execute agreements for calendar year 2006, without returning to Council, with anti-poverty service providers for the purpose of providing services to eligible clients in the City of Oakland, and to conduct all negotiations, execute and submit all documents, including but not limited to applications, agreements, amendments, modifications, payment requests, terminations and related actions which may be necessary; and be it further

RESOLVED: That said agreement(s) shall be approved as to form and legality by the Office of the City Attorney and placed on file in the Office of the City Clerk.
