As Director of NHLP's Rural Housing Service Initiative, provide training and technical support to public interest attorneys and housing counselors on legal requirements and foreclosure avoidance tools in the U.S.D.A.'s Rural Housing Service, single-family programs. Activities include national survey on topic and development of all training materials for initiative.

As Director of NHLP's Predatory Lending Initiative, work jointly with National Consumer Law Center to provide training nationally to community groups, housing authority staff, governmental officials, housing counselors, attorneys and others on spotting and avoiding predatory home mortgage schemes and understanding the legal remedies available to those embroiled in such, including fair housing claims. Promote development of local and regional resources to combat predatory lending in the home mortgage market, with a special focus on the Bay Area of California. Activities include development of all training materials for initiative.

As Director of the Section 8 Homeownership Initiative, provide training nationally to housing and redevelopment officials, consumer agencies, and other organizations regarding the nature of this program, its requirements, and a wide variety of practical realities and concerns in implementation. Provide technical assistance nationally to such groups on a day to day basis. Track and comment on federal policies associated with this program. Plan and conduct seminars, in-person trainings and teleconferences. Disseminate information on latest developments via articles and a national listsery. Activities include development of training materials for initiative.

In addition, as Staff Attorney, conduct research and provide technical assistance in additional, specialized subject areas, including voucher utilization, source of income discrimination, and credit discrimination. In all subject areas, draft articles for national publication, provide technical support to public interest attorneys, governmental staff, private attorneys and other advocates nationally on a wide array of federally subsidized housing policies and programs, and related issues. Staff California state-wide tousing by dine and engage in administrative activities, including managing student interviewing and hiring throughout the year, research for fundraising purposes and various other ad hoc committees. Took lead on organizing NHLP's 2004 Housing Justice Network Conference.
