- Increase Lifesaving for Shelter Animals




## Increased Accessibility to Services

Increased open hours:

- From 20 hours, 6 days per week
- To 42 hours, 7 days per week

Flexible appointments available

Increased Animal Control Hours from 11.5 to 14.5 per day (with standby for all other hours)



## Improvements to Animal Control Services: Training

- crisis intervention
- forensics
- digital evidence collection
- seizure of animals related to animal cruelty
- interrogation and interview techniques
- search warrants
- report writing


## **Animal Control Services**
