RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE REPROGRAMMING OF \$312,831 IN UNSPENT PROGRAM FUND BALANCES UNDER THE WINTER RELIEF PROGRAM, EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANT PROGRAM, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING GRANT PROGRAM, EMERGENCY HOUSING PROGRAM, AND

OTHER HOMELESS AND HUNGER PROGRAMS

SUMMARY

Staff requests that the City Council approve a resolution authorizing the City Administrator to reprogram \$312,831 in unspent program fund balances under the Winter Relief Program, Emergency Shelter Grant Program, Transitional Housing Grant Program, Emergency Housing Program, and other homeless and hunger programs, and authorize funds reprogramming for several eligible purposes, including two professional services contracts for jobs programs, contract amendments for planning and for costs associated with the Oakland Army Base Temporary Winter Shelter, the Henry Robinson Multi-Service Center and other transitional housing programs, lease payments for the East Oakland shelter, and interdepartmental funds transfers for transitional housing rehabilitation work, asbestos/lead paint surveys and property assessments.

FISCAL IMPACT

This report seeks authorization to reprogram previously appropriated funds, and there is no net fiscal impact. No new funds are to be allocated.

BACKGROUND

Funding for homeless programs is derived primarily from federal grants, such as the Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG), Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - which includes the Winter Relief Program (WRP), and the Supportive Housing Program (SHP). Additional funding comes from HUD-required City of Oakland matching funds designated as the Emergency Housing Program (EHP), Community Promotions Program for Service Organizations (CPPSO), Transitional Housing

Item No.___ Life Enrichment Committee April 12, 2005 Program match (THP Match) or dedicated budget allocations from the City of Oakland General Purpose Fund. HUD permits unexpended fund balances from its homeless assistance programs to be reprogrammed into other eligible homeless programs, with the exception of the SHP program. Unspent SHP balances must be returned to HUD at the end of each program year. Funds from other federal homeless assistance programs (ie., excluding SHP) can be reprogrammed only into other homeless assistance or hunger relief programs, consistent with the original intent of the grants. Unspent matching fund balances must also be reprogrammed into eligible homeless assistance programs or hunger relief efforts. In making recommendations for the reallocation of the unspent program fund balances detailed in this report, staff has carefully considered the eligibility constraints, priority needs and best programmatic uses of the funds.

KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

Funds appropriated to homeless and hunger programs often have unexpended fund balances at the end of each program year, for a variety of reasons. Most commonly, unspent funds represent a remainder from reimbursable costs for services in the ESG, WRP, CDBG, CPPSO and EHP programs. For example, an Emergency Shelter Grant contract to provide hotel/motel vouchers for homeless families will incur individual motel billings in the \$200 to \$2,500 range. A contract for the provision of move-in rental assistance can range from \$500 to \$4,000 for a single transaction. Often, the contract amount does not exactly match the amount of the billings, leaving a remainder. Unspent balances, typically in the range of \$200 to \$3,000, remain in these contracts at the end of the program year, and become available for reprogramming. Since there are typically 15 – 25 contracts each program year, and each contract will ordinarily have a remainder of unspent fund balances, it is common practice to accumulate all reprogrammable balances for a given program year and seek authorization from City Council to reprogram these balances at the same time. Therefore, routine program year balances for homeless assistance programs in the ESG, WRP, CDBG, CPPSO and EHP programs are not detailed in the reprogramming requests presented in this report.

Funds can also become available for reprogramming when contracts authorized by the City Council are never executed, as, for example, when a contractor goes bankrupt or is otherwise unable to provide services. Alternately, projects may be completed under budget, leaving funds available for reprogramming. The following reprogramming and contracting authorization requests are summarized in tabular form as Attachment A to this report. The following is a line-by-line analysis of each item.

Staff requests authorization to reprogram funds in the amount of \$5,000 from the 2003/2004 Winter Relief Program (CDBG) (originally authorized by Resolution 77313 C.M.S., dated July 11, 2002) to the Oakland Army Base Temporary Winter Shelter (authorized by resolution 78874 C.M.S., dated Oct. 19, 2004). Funds are needed to replace 100 beds that were the property of the previous program provider, and were removed when the provider was changed. The City had to purchase 100 new beds and reconstruct a temporary partition wall that separated male from female space. Staff also seeks authorization to amend the existing Winter Shelter operating contract with Phoenix Programs, Inc to increase the contract amount from \$313,933 to \$318,933. Note that Resolution 77313 authorized the Winter Shelter contract in the amount of \$281,000. However, the resolution also authorized the acceptance and appropriation of any additional funds that could be identified. Additional funds from the Oakland Army Base Reuse Authority (OBRA) (\$8,000) and ESG (\$24,933) (see Item 2 below) were subsequently identified and added to the contract, bringing the contract total to \$313,933. The requested reprogramming increases that amount by \$5,000, to \$318,933.

Staff requests authorization to reprogram funds in the amount of \$24,933 from the Emergency Shelter Grant (Resolution 78623 C.M.S., dated June 15, 2004) to the Oakland Army Base Temporary Winter Shelter (OABTWS) (Resolution 78874 C.M.S., dated Oct. 19, 2004) in the name of Phoenix Programs, Inc. These funds are normally part of Oakland's annual contribution to the OABTWS from the ESG program. Staff requests authorization to reprogram funds in the amount of \$39,426 from the Jobs Consortium CDBG Public Services appropriation (Resolution 78558 C.M.S., dated June 1, 2004; third-party grants itemized in Attachment D of Agenda Report) to Goodwill Industries and requests authorization to enter into a new contract for the same amount with Goodwill Industries. Jobs Consortium recently concluded negotiations with HUD regarding reconciliation of past fiscal issues. These negotiations were facilitated by a multi-jurisdictional working group comprised of HUD, the City of Oakland, City of Berkeley, OBRA, Alameda County and other stakeholders concerned about the possible loss of this critical job training and placement program for the homeless. As a result of negotiations, a bailout program was established, requiring Jobs Consortium to turn its programs over to Goodwill Industries. Funds became available for reprogramming in 2002 due to the organizational failure of Amassi, Inc. and their inability to provide services, which resulted in termination of the assessment contract. The contract with Debbie Grieff Consulting was originally entered under City Administrator authority in the amount of \$14,999 for provision of planning and HUD grants development projects. Staff requests authorization to add an additional scope of services to the current consultant contract to update the City of Oakland

Continuum of Care Plan, and to assist in the development of a new "pipeline process" for supportive housing as part of the Oakland Multi-Plan process. The purpose of the pipeline process would be to create a coordinated funding strategy that would ensure a steady creation of quality, permanent supportive housing projects in Oakland. Since the new scope of services builds directly on the prior work and maintains the continuity of the planning process, staff recommends that the contract be extended without an RFP process. Authorization is requested to increase the amount of the existing \$14,999 contract with Debbie Greiff Consulting by \$13,742 to \$28,741.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic:

Programs and services for the homeless and low-income persons, including the working homeless, provide a stable environment that permits them to more readily access employment opportunities.

Environmental:

Programs and services for the homeless facilitate cleanup of homeless encampments and the accompanying environmental degradation caused by the proliferation of litter, debris, human wastes and other negative environmental impacts caused by those living on the streets or in other places not intended for habitation, by providing to homeless people an alternate place to sleep.

Social Equity:

The expenditure of City funds upon and/or to benefit the neediest in the community provides for the most basic of human needs and assists the homeless to become reintegrated into society.

DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

Programs providing services to the homeless population are available and accessible to seniors and persons with disabilities. Some of these programs are for the general homeless or near homeless population and not specifically targeted to the senior population.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND RATIONALE

Staff requests that the City Council approve a resolution authorizing the City Administrator to reprogram \$312,831 in unspent program balances under the Winter Relief Program, Emergency Shelter Grant Program, Transitional Housing Grant Program, Emergency Housing Program, and other homeless and hunger programs, and authorize associated contracts, contract amendments and administrative adjustments as specified in this report.

ACTION REQUESTED OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Approve the attached resolution reprogramming unspent hunger and homeless program balances to fund other eligible homeless and hunger programs and services.



RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE REPROGRAMMING OF \$312,831 IN UNSPENT PROGRAM BALANCES UNDER THE WINTER RELIEF PROGRAM, EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANT PROGRAM, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING GRANT PROGRAM, EMERGENCY HOUSING PROGRAM, AND OTHER HOMELESS AND HUNGER PROGRAMS

WHEREAS, the City received and allocated funds awarded to the City by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under its 2003/2004 Winter Relief Program (WRP) grants under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program as authorized per Oakland City Council Resolution No. 77313 C.M.S., passed on July 23, 2002; and

WHEREAS, the 2003/2004 Winter Relief Program year has been closed out with a balance of \$30,000 available (2108.G168610) for reprogramming to eligible homeless programs: and

WHEREAS, the Oakland Army Base Temporary Winter Shelter (OABTWS) (authorized by Resolution 78874 C.M.S., dated Oct. 19, 2004) is in need of funds in the amount of \$5,000 to purchase 100 beds and erect a retaining wall between the male and female spaces of the shelter; and

WHEREAS, the Phoenix Supportive Housing Program (SHP) (authorized by Resolution 78637 C.M.S., dated June 14, 2004) is in need of \$25,000 to make up an MOU shortfall, by providing a case management coordinator position to provide intake services and referrals to the Henry Robinson Multi-Service Center's Drop-In Program and Emergency Housing Program; and

WHEREAS, the City received and allocated funds awarded to the City by HUD under its 2004/2005 CDBG program as authorized per Oakland City Council Resolution No. 78588 C.M.S., passed on June 1, 2004; and funding in the amount of \$39,426 was awarded to Jobs Consortium, Inc. for a job training program; and

WHEREAS, the City did not enter into a contract with Jobs Consortium due to contractor inability to deliver services, and the 2004/2005 CDBG public services program year has been closed out with a balance of \$39,426 available (2108.H77500) for reprogramming to eligible public services programs: and

- WHEREAS, the City received and allocated funds awarded to the City by HUD under its 2004/2005, Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) program as authorized per Oakland City Council Resolution No. 78623 C.M.S., passed on June 15, 2004, and funding in the amount of \$12,967 was awarded to Jobs Consortium, Inc. for a job training program; and
- WHEREAS, the City did not enter into a contract with Jobs Consortium due to contractor inability to deliver services and the 2004/2005 ESG program year has been closed out with a balance of \$12,967 a vailable (2108.H77500) for reprogramming to eligible public services programs; and
- WHEREAS, Jobs Consortium has agreed to turn its ESG-funded and CDBG-funded programs over to Goodwill Industries, Inc., and has requested that the City transfer committed CDBG and ESG funds that also act as contingent matching funds for a HUD Supportive Housing Program (SHP) jobs program grant over to Goodwill Industries, Inc.; and
- WHEREAS, the City received and allocated funds awarded to the City by the HUD under its 2004/2005, ESG program as authorized per Oakland City Council Resolution No. 78623 C.M.S., passed on June 15, 2004 and funding was appropriated to Operation Dignity, Inc. to operate the Oakland Army Base Temporary Winter Shelter (OABTWS); and
- WHEREAS, the City did not contract with Operation Dignity to operate the OABTWS, and the City has instead contracted with Phoenix Programs, Inc. to operate the OABTWS and the City desires to transfer the 2004/2005 Emergency Shelter Grant program year balance of \$24,933 (2103.G168030) from Operation Dignity, Inc. to Phoenix Programs, Inc. to operate the OABTWS; and
- WHEREAS, the City received and allocated funds awarded to the City by HUD under its 2003/2004 ESG program, and funding was appropriated as authorized per Oakland City Council Resolution No. 77313 C.M.S., passed on July 23, 2002; and
- WHEREAS, the 2003/2004 ESG program year has been closed out with a balance of \$65,484 available (2103.G168020) for reprogramming to eligible public services programs: and
- WHEREAS, the East Oakland Community Project Families in Transition/Scattered Sites (FIT/SS) Supportive Housing Program (SHP) and Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing Project (MCTHP) (authorized by Resolution 78637 C.M.S., dated June 14, 2004) are in need of \$65,484 to be used for direct client support by case management coordinator assisting with client intake services and referrals; and
- WHEREAS, the City allocated General Purpose Funds to support the HUD-required matching funds for the 2001/2002 Transitional Housing/Families In Transition Program (THP/FIT) as authorized per Oakland City Council Resolution No. 76583 C.M.S., passed on July 17, 2001; and
- WHEREAS, the 2001/2001 THP program year has been closed out with a balance of \$47,826 available (2103.G168020) for reprogramming to eligible transitional housing programs; and

- **WHEREAS**, the City desires to perform structural repairs at a City-owned transitional housing facility at 73rd Ave. at an estimated cost of \$47,826; and
- WHEREAS, the City authorized (Resolution 76662 C.M.S., Aug. 28, 2001) a professional services contract with Episcopal Charities, Inc. for agency fiscal assessments; and
- WHEREAS, the Episcopal Charities contract has been closed out with a balance of \$13,742 available (2826.P184410) for reprogramming to eligible homeless programs: and
- WHEREAS, the City desires to add \$13,742 to an existing contract with Debbie Grieff Consulting to provide Oakland Continuum of Care Plan Development, Multi-Plan Development, and other services; and
- WHEREAS, funding was allocated for the City's 2000/2001 THP HUD-required match, funded under the CDBG program, and funding was appropriated as authorized per Oakland City Council Resolution No. 75887 C.M.S., passed on July 18, 2000; and
- WHEREAS, the City has agreed to pay the month-to-month lease costs for the East Oakland Community Project lease, and I ease payments in the amount of \$9000 are needed to pay the lease through the end of fiscal year 2004/2005; and
