

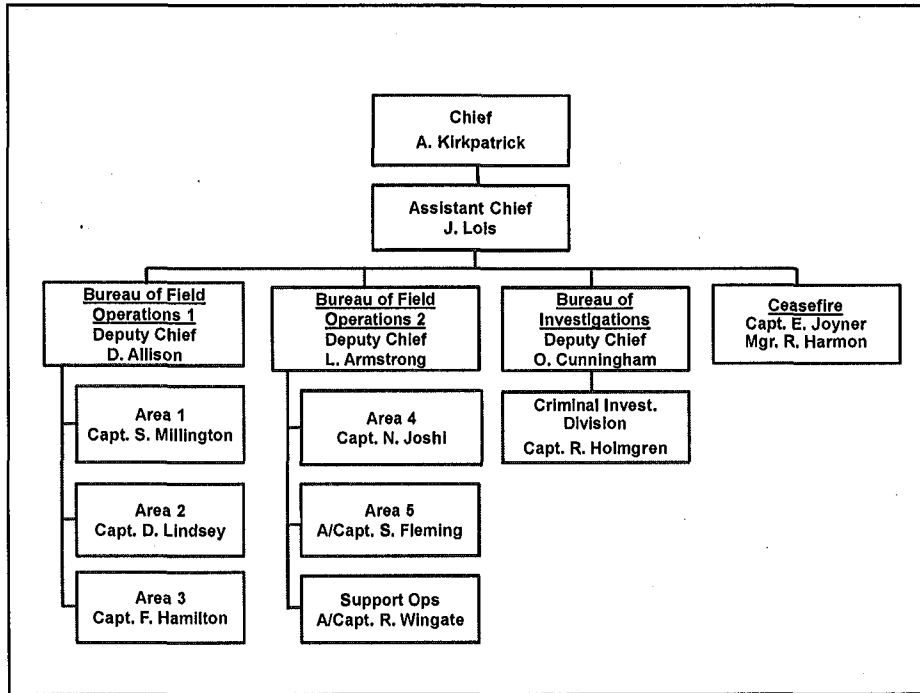

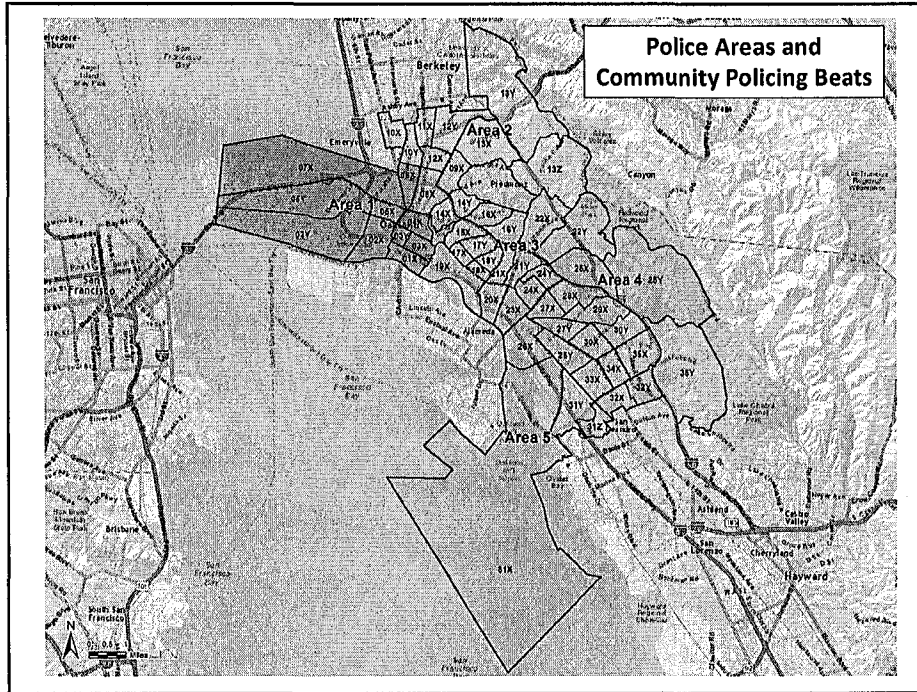

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Area 1: Robberies and Burglaries

- **Street-Level Robberies Are Up 26%:**
 - Around the BART stations (West Oakland)
 - Around the downtown Broadway corridor
 - Jack London Square and Chinatown
 - Specialized units arrested a robbery crew targeting the Chinatown area

- **Auto Burglaries Are Down 1%:**
 - Beats 1, 2, 3, and 4
 - Vehicles had valuable items in plain sight
 - NSCs and Ambassadors diligently leafletting areas impacted
 - Nine suspects arrested after undercover officer viewed multiple auto-burglaries in Jack London Square
 - Ghost Town Gang members identified as burglary suspects in L.A. County and multi-jurisdictional investigation is actively being conducted to take them into custody

Area 1: Shootings and Homicides

- Shootings in beats 2 and 6 stem from two geographic areas that have historically feuded.
- Special Resource Units are very familiar with the primary offenders in feuds and actively monitor them.
- Random non-retaliatory shootings occurred on beat 7.
- Ceasefire strategy is being implemented for the groups that continue to engage in gun violence.
- Homicides down 29%, which is a significant decrease for West Oakland.

Area 4: Homicides

- There were 14 homicides this year...up 25% for the quarter and down 22% year to date.
- 9 of the 14 homicides have been solved and arrests have been made
- Great collaboration between street teams, investigations, and outreach partnerships

Area 4: Shootings Excluding Homicides

- Shootings are down 4% percent for this quarter and down 17% YTD
- Most shootings are gang/group-related
- Custom notifications (as part of Ceasefire) issued to suspects
- Targeted and continuous enforcement on specific individuals, not neighborhoods

Area 4: Rapes

- No serial rapist, rapes not connected
- Most incidents involved suspects known to the victim
- Many incidents were domestic in nature
- Few incidents appear to be associated with prostitution

Area 4: Robberies

- Robberies were down 19% for this quarter and 13% YTD
- Dedicated foot patrols strategically deployed in high robbery areas
- Business districts are prone to robberies and auto burglaries
- Community outreach and education

Area 4: Robbery Trends

- Victims are typically on foot or getting in or out of a vehicle
- Multiple suspects with series
- Physically searching victims during robberies
- Targeted Items:
 - Money

- Primary Areas:
 - Beat 23 (Fruitvale BART Station, Fruitvale Village, and surrounding areas)
 - Beat 24 (north of Foothill Blvd. between Fruitvale and High St.)
 - Beat 27
- Locations:
 - In front of residences

 - Sidewalks – talking on cell phones

Area 4: Burglaries

- Burglaries, as a whole (residential, auto, other) are down 19% for this quarter and up 1% YTD
- Auto burglaries main reason for burglary increase
- Residential burglaries are significantly down by 22% YTD
- Suspect profiles in residential and auto burglaries
- Target locations are the business districts

Area 4: Vehicle Theft

- Vehicle thefts are down 31% for this quarter and down 22% YTD
- Use of technology to apprehend suspects and recover vehicles

Area 5: Homicides and Shootings Enforcement Efforts

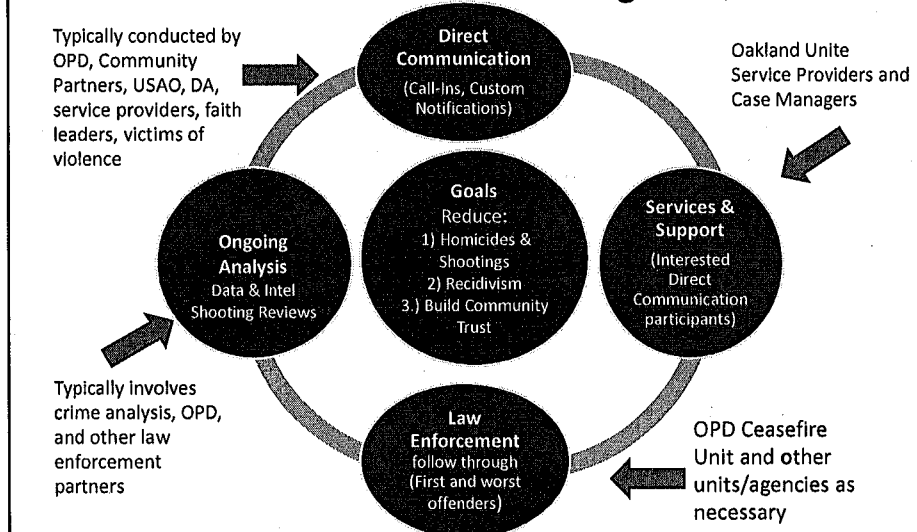
- Widen the focus of Special Resource Section (SRS) to include non-gang/group related shootings in support of the Criminal Investigations Division (CID).
- Ceasefire Team re-deployed back to Area 5 to support and assist with enforcement of identified gang members/groups.
- Redistribute intelligence and information regarding known gang/group members/associates to patrol teams (Early Tac/Late Tac) for precision based enforcement.

- Peak times:
 - Between 6:00 pm - midnight
- Common items taken:
 - Electronics

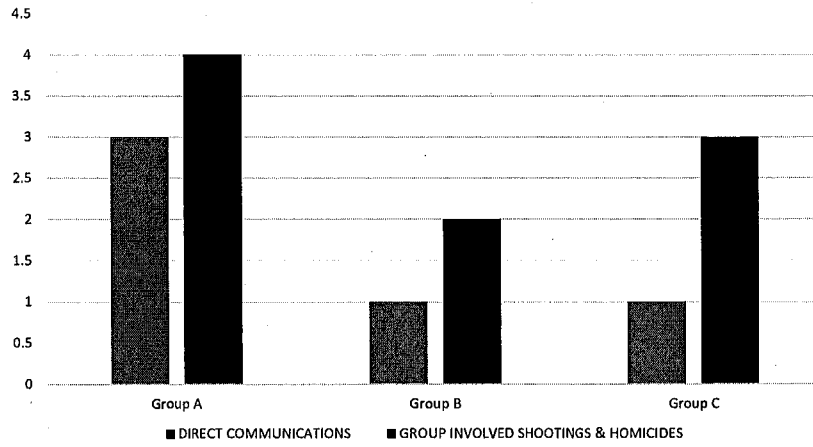

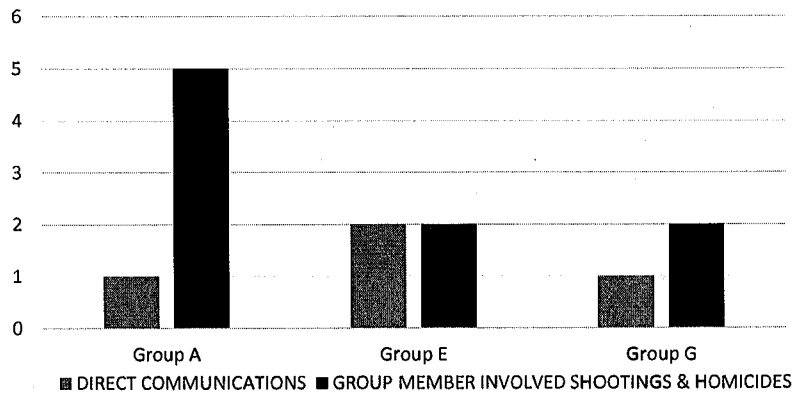

October 2017 Direct Communications & Top Group Member-Involved Shootings & Homicides*



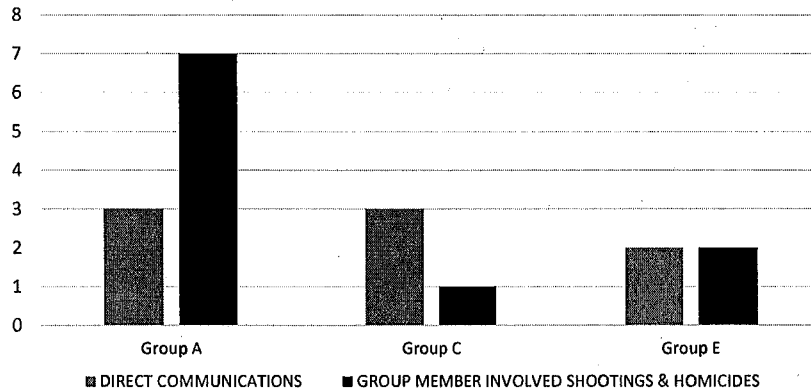

Evaluation Update

- Mathematica Policy Research leads the overarching Measure Z service evaluation that begin in 2017
- First report went to Safety and Services Oversight Committee in November and to Public Safety Committee in February
- Report focuses on adult life coaching and employment strategies; findings include:
 - Programs are serving people at the center of violence;
 - Services are consistent with best practices; and
 - Both strategies decreased short-term arrests for violence
- Second evaluation report will focus on individual agency progress and come to Committee in the spring
