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RECOMMENDED POSITION: SUPPORT

Summary of the Bill:

This bill would authorize county governments to issue identification cards to persons who can provide proof of identity and proof of residency within the county without regard to a person's gender or immigration status.

This bill would establish the Local Government Identification Act and authorize counties to establish municipal ID programs, modeled on the San Francisco Municipal ID Program.

These ID cards would contain verified information including the cardholder's name. photograph, and date of birth, and have an expiration date. The ID card would not identify the cardholder's gender.

To obtain a municipal identification card, persons would be required to complete an application provided by the county which must require documented proof of identity and documented proof of residency within the county.

The bill would require that counties keep confidential the name and other identifying information of persons applying for, and receiving, municipal identification cards. It would also provide applicants the opportunity to select privacy preferences.

This bill would authorize counties to assess a fee of no more than \$15 per card for persons over the age of 18 and a fee of no more than \$5 for minors and senior citizens. The fee must not exceed administrative costs reasonably associated with the production of the cards, and the board of supervisors must provide for a reduced application fee or a waiver of the application fee for low-income applicants who can provide proof of income

The bill would further provide that in a county that issues local government identification cards, every agency, department, and office of the county, and every city, and every agency, department, and office of the city, shall accept a municipal identification card for proof of identification or proof of residency, except where otherwise provided by law.

Positive Factors for Oakland

Many Californians are ineligible to receive an identification card or driver's license from the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) because of their status as an undocumented immigrant. Some transgender individuals, who publicly identify as a gender different than that on their driver's license or DMV ID card, are turned away or made uncomfortable when they try to use their ID.

Those individuals without legal, recognized, government-issued ID cards are unable to open bank accounts, prove age, prove residency, or otherwise demonstrate proof of identity when necessary. Without a government issued ID, individuals often fear calling the police to report crimes or cooperating with police on follow up investigations. Issuance of a government ID has already resulted in increased crime reporting in the two cities that have implemented a municipal ID program (New Haven, Ct and San Francisco.)

Studies have shown that possession of a government issued ID provides individuals with a level of security and willingness to report crimes, labor and housing violations—such as blighted properties, slum landlords, and workplace health, safety, and wage violations—to the appropriate authorities.

An act to add Chapter 17 (commencing with Section 26495) to Part 2 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the Government Code, relating to local government.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 772, as introduced, Ammiano. The Local Government Identification Act.

Existing law authorizes the Department of Motor Vehicles to issue an identification card to any person attesting to the true full name, correct age, and other identifying data as certified by the applicant for the identification card, and authorizes the department to refuse to issue an identification card under certain circumstances.

This bill would establish the Local Government Identification Act, which would authorize county governments to issue identification cards to persons who can provide proof of identity and proof of residency, as specified.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 17 (commencing with Section 26495)
- 2 is added to Part 2 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the Government Code,
- 3 to read:

Chapter 17. Local Government Identification Act

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26495. This act is known, and may be cited, as the Local Government Identification Act.

- 26495.1. A county may, pursuant to this chapter, issue local government identification cards to its residents, on a voluntary basis.
- 8 26495.2. As used in this chapter, unless the context indicates 9 otherwise, the following terms have the following meanings:
 - (a) "Clerk" means the office of the county clerk.
 - (b) "County" means a county or a city and county.
 - (c) (1) "Local identification card" means an identification card issued by the county that shall display, including, but not limited to, the following information:
 - (A) The cardholder's name.
 - (B) The cardholder's photograph.
 - (C) The cardholder's date of birth.
 - (D) An expiration date.
 - (2) The local government identification card shall not identify the cardholder's gender.
 - (d) "Resident" means a person who can demonstrate that he or she has been present in the issuing county for at least 15 continuous days, and who can provide a proof of residency, as provided in subdivision (c) of Section 26495.3.
 - 26495.3. (a) To obtain an identification card, a resident shall complete an application, provided by the county, which shall require proof of identity and proof of residence within the county. Upon receipt and verification of the proof of identity, pursuant to subdivision (b), and proof of residency, pursuant to subdivision (c), the clerk shall issue an identification card to the applicant.
- 31 (b) To establish identity, the applicant shall present either of the following:
- 33 (1) (A) One of the following documents, which shall contain both the applicant's photograph and the applicant's date of birth:
 - (i) A United States or foreign passport.
 - (ii) A driver's license issued by any state in the United States.
- (iii) A state identification card issued by any state in the UnitedStates.
- 39 (iv) A United States Permanent Residency Card, otherwise 40 known as a green card.

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(v) A consular identification card.

- (vi) A photo identification card issued by another county to its residents or nationals.
 - (B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A), if the applicant is under 13 years of age, the applicant may alternatively present a certified copy of a United States or foreign birth certificate.
- (2) (A) Two of the following documents, at least one of which shall display the applicant's photograph and date of birth:
- (i) A national identification card with a photograph of the applicant, the applicant's name, address, date of birth, and the date the identification expires.
 - (ii) A foreign driver's license.
 - (iii) A United States or foreign military identification card.
- (iv) A current visa issued by a government agency.
- (v) A United States Individual Taxpayer Identification Number authorization letter.
- (vi) An identification card issued by an educational institution, including an elementary, middle, secondary, or postsecondary school, in this state.
- 20 (vii) A certified copy of a United States or foreign birth 21 certificate.
 - (viii) A social security card.
 - (B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A), if the applicant is under 13 years of age, the applicant may alternatively present an official medical record or official school record to establish identity under this section. One of the two forms of identification presented shall display the applicant's date of birth.
 - (c) (1) To establish residency, each applicant shall present one of the following items, which shall include both the applicant's name and a residential address located within the county:
 - (A) A utility bill dated within the last 30 days.
 - (B) A written verification issued by a homeless shelter that receives county funding confirming at least 15 days' residency within the last 30 days.
 - (iii) Written verification issued by a hospital, health clinic, or social services agency that receives county funding confirming at least 15 days' residency within the last 30 days.
- 38 (iv) A local property tax statement or mortgage payment receipt dated within the last 30 days.
 - (v) A bank account statement dated within the last 30 days.

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(vi) Proof of a minor currently enrolled in a public school within the county.

- (vii) An employment pay stub dated within the last 30 days.
- (viii) A jury summons or court order issued by a state or federal court dated within the last 30 days.
- (ix) An automobile, health, homeowner's, life, or renter's insurance bill dated within the last 30 days.
- (x) A marriage certificate, along with documents bearing the name of the applicant's spouse.
- (2) The board of supervisors may, by ordinance, provide that an applicant that is under 13 years of age and cannot provide any of the evidence set forth in subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1), a parent or legal guardian may verify the applicant's residency, if that parent or guardian would be eligible for a municipal identification card.
- (d) The board of supervisors may, by ordinance, authorize the clerk to accept alternative forms of proof of identity, pursuant to subdivision (b), or proof of residency, pursuant to subdivision (c), if the alternate forms of proof of identity meet any of the following conditions:
 - (1) The proof of identity is issued by a governmental entity.
- (2) The proof of identity is issued by an entity that takes reasonable steps to verify the identity or residence of the individual to whom the item is issued.
- (3) The proof of identity is of a type that is normally accepted as proof of identity or proof of residency in the ordinary course of business.
- (e) An application submitted on behalf of a minor shall be completed by the minor's parent or legal guardian.
- (f) (1) The clerk shall keep confidential the name and other identifying information of persons applying for, and receiving, municipal identification cards. The clerk shall not keep a record of the applicant's residential address.
- (2) The application shall include an option for the applicant to select his or her privacy preferences.
- 36 26495.4. The board of supervisors may adopt rules and 37 regulations, consistent with this chapter, to implement, and, to 38 administer the implementation of, this chapter.
 - 26495.5. The board of supervisors may impose a fee of not more than fifteen dollars (\$15) per card for persons over 18 years

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of age, and a fee of not more than five dollars (\$5) per card for minors and seniors who present proof of age in a form to be determined by the board. The fee shall not exceed administrative costs reasonably associated with the production of the cards, and the board shall provide for a reduced application fee or a waiver of the application fee for low-income applicants who can provide proof of income.

26495.6. In a county that issues local government identification cards, every agency, department, and office of the county, and every city, and every agency, department, and office of the city, shall accept a municipal identification card for proof of identification or proof of residency, except where otherwise provided by law.

26495.7. This chapter shall not be construed to replace or supplant any other existing requirements for issuance of other forms of identification in connection with any city, county, state, or federal benefits and services.

AB 772 - THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT IDENTIFICATION ACT

Problem

Existing state and federal law establishes provisions for state issued identification cards that require documentation of a person's gender and legal immigration status.

Many Californians are ineligible to receive an identification card or driver's license from the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) because of their status as an undocumented immigrant. Some transgender individuals, who publicly identify as a gender different than that on their driver's license or DMV ID card, are turned away or made uncomfortable when they try to use their ID.

Those individuals without legal, recognized, government-issued ID cards are unable to open bank accounts, prove age, prove residency, or otherwise demonstrate proof of identity when necessary.

Although some local governments have expressed that undocumented immigrants and transgender people should have proof of identification that accurately represent them, state law is silent.

Summary

This bill would authorize county governments to issue identification cards to persons who can provide proof of identity and proof of residency within the county without regard to a person's gender or immigration status.

Previous Legislation

Because existing law requires proof of legal residency or citizenship to receive a DMV-issued ID card or driver's license, several bills have been introduced in past legislative sessions to

allow undocumented immigrants to qualify for driver's licenses. The most notable of these attempts have been introduced by Senator Cedillo. The senator has introduced variations of this concept 9 times.

Various iterations of this bill, which has been reintroduced this year as SB 60, have passed in both houses of the legislature but were vetoed by the Governor.

In his veto message on SB 60 (Cedillo, 2008), Governor Schwarzenegger explained, "I have previously stated that the ability to verify documents used to establish an identity must include a way to determine whether an individual is who he or she purports to be."

Existing Law

Current law provides that DMV shall "require every applicant for an original driver's license or identification card to submit satisfactory proof that applicant's presence in the United States is under federal law." In addition, existing law provides that "the department shall require every application for a driver's license to contain the applicant's social security number and any other number or identifier determined to be appropriate by DMV."

Additionally, the federal REAL ID Act requires license applications require documentation verifying the gender and legal immigration status of any applicant.

This Bill

- The application shall include an option for the applicant to select his or her privacy preferences.
- The board of supervisors may adopt rules and regulations consistent with this chapter to implement and to administer the implementation of this chapter.
- A fee of no more than \$15 per card for persons over the age of 18 and a fee of no more than \$5 for minors and senior citizens. The fee shall not exceed administrative costs reasonably associated with the production of the cards, and the board shall provide for a reduced application fee or a waiver of the application fee for low-income applicants who can provide proof of income.
- In a county that issues local government identification cards, every agency, department, and

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF ASSEMBLY BILL 772 (AMMIANO) "LOCAL GOVERNMNET IDENTIFICATION ACT," WHICH WOULD AUTHORIZE COUNTIES TO ESTABLISH MUNICIPAL ID PROGRAMS

WHEREAS, many people in Oakland and around the state—including but not limited to immigrants, children and students, the homeless and indigent, the disabled and elderly, runaway youth and adult survivors of domestic violence, and others—currently suffer from the lack of official identification, which restricts their access to law enforcement, financial institutions, jobs, housing, and home and workplace protections; and

WHEREAS, many marginalized communities lack a valid form of identification and without identification are afraid to report crimes to the police; and

WHEREAS, those who lack a valid form of identification are also often afraid to report labor and housing violations—such as blighted properties, slum landlords, and workplace health, safety, and wage violations—to the appropriate authorities; and

WHEREAS, without appropriate identification, it is difficult to open bank accounts, and immigrants carrying large amounts of cash are therefore specifically targeted for robbery and other violent crimes; and

WHEREAS, lack of a valid form of identification translates into limited access to financial institutions and fear of police and other city officials, thus resulting in decreased participation in the formal city economy and other civic matters; and

WHEREAS, AB 772 will make it easier for all Californian's to participate in local and regional commerce—by opening a bank account, establishing credit, and accessing loans and the housing market; and

WHEREAS, AB 772 will fill a void by providing an official form of personal identification for the many residents who currently lack one; and

WHEREAS, AB 772 will facilitate participation in civic activities; and

WHEREAS, the Oakland City Council will be considering the implementation its own municipal ID ordinance on May 26th; and
