# RESPONSES TO CITY COUNCIL QUESTIONS FROM THE JUNE 10, 2004 SPECIAL SESSION ON THE FY 2004-05 MIDCYCLE BUDGET

QUESTION: [Councilmember Brunner]

Provide a 10-year history of fund balance, revenues, and expenditures for the Landscaping and Lighting Assessment District (LLAD - Fund 2310).

<u>RESPONSE</u>: LLAD fund balance, revenue, and expenditure data are provided in the attachments as follows:

### QUESTION: [Councilmember Quan]

Does the LLAD sunset? Since the LLAD assessment revenues have been flat since FY 1993-94, have landscaping and lighting service levels changed? What are we not doing?

<u>RESPONSE</u>: No, the LLAD does not sunset. However, each year the City Council is required to issue an Engineer's Report, adopt a series of resolutions, and conduct a public hearing in order to levy the assessments for the following year.

It is true that LLAD assessment rates have been unchanged since FY 1993-94 while the cost of doing business — maintaining the City's parks and open space, and lighting — has increased over the same time period. This funding gap has resulted in the need to gradually reduce costs, as well as subsidize costs using other funding sources.

For example, 76 FTE Gardener II and III positions were budgeted in the City's FY 1990-1991 budget (across all funds), while only 59 FTE Gardener II and Gardener Crew Leaders are included in the FY 2003-05 Adopted Budget. Furthermore, in the FY 2003-04 adopted budget, about \$2 million in non-LLAD funding was approved for the Park Maintenance division to avoid further reductions in staffing.

Compounding the increased costs, the City has added or enhanced many parks, park facilities, and open space since 1993 – primarily supported by various state, regional, and local bond measures. This has increased the level of required park maintenance services, such as weeding, litter removal, irrigation repair, and funding for utilities.

In short, the City has managed to maintain services with the available resources. However, the maintenance levels have been diluted meaning that, while no specific service has been discontinued, all services are provided with less frequency. OPR has made a concerted effort to mitigate the impact on service levels – for example, by hiring less costly part-time staff to work during the busy summer season.

#### QUESTION: [Councilmember Brooks]

Provide a breakdown of revenues and expenditures for the ABAT, also known as the "Deemed Approved Program." Provide justification for the proposed \$1,500 permit fee included in the Master Fee Schedule.

<u>RESPONSE</u>: For FY 2004-05, ABAT estimated revenues are \$458,282 (after the fee change), and the budgeted expenditures are \$359,190. FY 2004-05 budgeted positions include 1 Police

Officer, 1 Police Services Technician II, 1 Administrative Analyst II, and 0.30 Deputy City Attorney, for a total of 3.30 FTEs.

The Police Department also indicates that other ABAT staff (not included in the separate ABAT project) are budgeted for FY 2004-05; these include a Police Officer, Police Services Technician II, and a Sergeant. These additional staff bring the total number of FTEs related to the ABAT program to 6.30. With these additional staff, the total FY 2004-05 expenditures for ABAT are projected at \$621,000.

The Police Department has indicated that the permit fee increase from \$600 to \$1,500 will enable the Department to more fully recover the actual costs of this program (which include the 3.0 FTEs not allocated to the separate ABAT project).

**QUESTION:** [Councilmembers Brooks and Brunner]

Provide an analysis of reimbursable overtime in the Police Department.

<u>RESPONSE:</u> Data on Police overtime expenditures and reimbursements for FY 2003-04 are provided in <u>Attachment B.</u>

### QUESTION: [Councilmember Brunner]

Provide a supplemental report regarding the Police Department's overtime for the next year. Is the overtime budget sufficient? What must be done to stay within the FY 2004-05 budget?

**RESPONSE**: See Attachment C for a report from the Police Department.

#### QUESTION: [Councilmember Quan]

Provide a breakdown of costs to hire new officers versus providing the programs on overtime.

<u>RESPONSE</u>: A Police Officer at Step 3 costs \$68.51 per hour, including applicable benefits and retirement, and excluding premium pay, incentive pay, and initial recruitment and training costs. An overtime hour paid in cash costs \$49.33. The difference is \$19.18, or 28 percent savings. The details are provided below.

## QUESTION: [Councilmember Brunner]

Revise Attachment H in the June 10, 2004 report to include all Youth-Related Services, including Oakland Fund for Children and Youth (OFCY), Headstart, etc.

<u>RESPONSE</u>: The attachment has been revised to incorporate the requested information and is now included as <u>Attachment D</u>.

QUESTION: [Councilmember Brunner]

Highlight all significant changes in Master Fee Schedule and explain the changes.

<u>RESPONSE:</u> Attachment E provides a listing of significant changes to the current fees and charges, with explanations.

QUESTION: [Councilmember Nadel]

In the Master Fee Schedule (page 45, Item B. 2. a.), the Parks Use Permit Fee for 1 to 99 persons is proposed at \$50.00/day. Can we exclude parties of 1 to 15 from the \$50.00/day fee?

<u>RESPONSE:</u> All Oakland parks are open and available for any member of the public to enjoy, within certain limits. For 25 or fewer patrons, a permit is not required and users may use areas in the park on a first-come, first-serve basis. However, if a patron would like to secure a guaranteed spot at a particular site on a particular day, they must obtain a park use permit to reserve that park site. When patrons call, they are told that if they have 25 or fewer people attending, they can simply claim the spot on a first-come, first-serve basis without obtaining a permit. However, park site reservations obtained through a permit will have priority over first-come, first-serve patrons. The Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR) recommends an increase of the fees to \$50 to more adequately cover the staff time involved in processing a permit to guarantee a reserved park site.

QUESTION: [Councilmember Quan]

In the Master Fee Schedule (pages 53-54), explain the large increases in camp fees.

<u>RESPONSE:</u> For Recreation Center Day Camps, OPR recommends increasing the high end of the fee range from \$100 to \$200. This increase is necessary to cover the costs of the more comprehensive day camp programs where activities include field trips, specialist instructors, etc. OPR recommends keeping the low end of the fee range at \$25 for programs providing a more limited range of activities.

Also included in this section are fees for Feather River Camp programs, such as Kamp Kidd, Camp Sierra, Family Camps, etc., which are currently offered through Camps-in-Common, an outside service provider. The fees shown for these camp programs were set by Camps-in-Common and extracted from its brochures. They are included in the Master Fee Schedule for informational purposes only; in much the same way fee information is provided for the Oakland Zoo and Children's Fairyland, also non-City service providers.

### ACTION: [City Council]

In the Master Fee Schedule (page 62), the proposed increase to the fee called "Appeal of the Tree Removal Permit to City Council" from \$50 to \$449 per appeal was <u>removed</u> from the proposed ordinance by motion and vote of the City Council. The City Council also requested justification for the fee increases, at the same meeting.

<u>RESPONSE</u>: The \$449 tree-removal appeal fee applies ONLY to <u>development-related</u> appeals that involve <u>protected</u> trees. The fee was instituted in 1980 under OMC 12.36 and was originally set at \$50; it has not been increased in the 24 years since. The proposed fee amount is set in accordance with the fee that the Community and Economic Development Agency (CEDA) charges for appeals or changes that require an administrative report to Council. These types of tree appeals also require an administrative report to Council and, therefore, take considerable staff time. One recent example involved an appeal by the developer on Contra Costa Road that

required considerable staff time to resolve. The fee increase would help offset <u>some</u> of the staff costs involved.

## **QUESTION:** [Councilmember Quan]

Of the \$400,000 appropriated in FY 2003-04 for the Middle School Program, how much will be left for FY 2004-05? What has been accomplished so far? What efforts can be done or continued with the remaining dollars?

<u>RESPONSE:</u> There will be no remaining funds for FY 2004-05. The Middle School Sports Program was budgeted for one year, October 2003 through June 2004, with after-school sports programs at 14 Public Middle Schools and 3 Alternative Schools. OPR programmed and monitored staff hours, number of school teams, officials, uniforms and awards according to the funds that was allocated by the Council for FY 2003-04.

Regarding the Middle School Sports program's accomplishments to date, because the Council funded this program, there were significant increases in participation this year from 1,200 students in FY 2002-03 to 2,500 students in FY 2003-04. Student athletes participated in Middle School programs such as Volleyball, Flag Football, Basketball, Softball, Cheerleading, Ultimate Frisbee and Track & Field. Also, the program provided schools with the opportunity to have an unlimited number of teams and participants for each grade level. For example, Montera, Bret Hart and Frick Schools each had 2 girls' teams, and Lowell had 3 girls' teams representing their respective schools.

Additionally, students were required to have and maintain a minimum GPA of 2.0 to register and fully participate (that is, play in team games) in the program. Students with less than 2.0 GPA could participate in team practices and exercises, but could not play in the team games held on Saturdays — played before their family and friends. Border-line student athletes were able to maintain or increase their GPAs in order to continue their participation in the program. Of 99 ineligible students with less than 2.0 GPA, 54 improved their GPAs in the second academic marking period — to attain eligibility and full participation in the program.

No efforts to continue the program into FY 2004-05 are planned at this time because there are no funds remaining. The programs ended June 1, 2004.

FY 2004-05 Police Overtime Budget and Expenditures

#### SUMMARY

The Oakland Police Department will end FY 2003-04 approximately \$2.9 million over budget in the General Fund overtime category, of which approximately \$1.0 million will be reimbursable (the largest segment being approximately \$0.95 million in Raiders / A's / Warriors games and other events at the Oakland Coliseum. See Attachment B.). Despite two consecutive years of overtime spending reductions, OPD still projects that the Department may go over budget next fiscal year by approximately \$1.4 million.\* This overage, however, will be balanced through position freezes and flexible deployment (see below).

#### **ANALYSIS**

The OPD General Fund overtime budget has experienced ten consecutive years of red ink with deficits ranging from \$7.3 million in 1999 to a projected \$2.9 million in 2004. This is due in large part because the Department has not experienced adequate savings in labor to offset overtime-spending deficits since 1999.

Plans to reduce overtime spending in FY 2004-05 are being prepared, including an internal freeze on vacant sworn positions through December 2004, service changes, and flexible deployment. Flexible deployment was broached in the current fiscal year but halted when the Oakland Police Officers Association (OPOA) filed an immediate dispute resolution grievance. Pending a favorable outcome of this issue, OPD will implement flexible deployment, which should save the Department in excess of \$1 million annually.

\* Calculation: the \$2.9 million current year deficit will grow to \$3.2 million next fiscal year due to MOU increases. This amount is reduced by \$600,000 in current year unfunded VRP, plus a savings of \$1 million in flexible deployment, plus other savings of approximately \$200,000 in additional overtime cuts for a net of \$1.4 million.
