




Rent Adjustment Program (RAP)

The RAP unit enforces the City of Oakland's Rent Adjustment and Just Cause for Eviction Ordinances and provides mediation, legal petition hearings, housing counseling and education to tenants and property owners.

Community Development and Engagement (CDE)

The CDE unit invests in Oakland's housing stability and anti-displacement services. It also acts as a program administrator and grant manager for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and other HUD resources.





Preservation

Housing Preservation Services (HPS)

HPS administers programs to acquire, rehabilitate, and promote health & habitability among Oakland's existing housing stock.








Key Performance Metrics (KPMs)







Division	Service/Function
Aging & Adult Services (AA&S)	Services support independence, safety, health, and active living for seniors. Alongside community partners, Seniors receive nutrition, care management, job training, volunteering, recreation and transportation assistance, case management focused on mental health, wellness support and healthcare enrollment assistance; Operate 4 Oakland Senior Centers; Staffs Mayor's Commission on Aging
Oakland Community	Alleviating poverty and working toward institutional change to enhance the ability of low-income residents to achieve self-sufficiency in Oakland and throughout Alameda County (excluding the City of Berkeley). Priority focus areas include family self-sufficiency, entrepreneurship/job training and employment placement, low-income housing, community economic development, supportive services, civic engagement, advocacy, and capacity building. Staffs AC-OCAP Administering Board

HSD Service Summary 2 of 4

Division	Service/Function
Children & Youth Services – Office Fund for Children & Youth; Youth Commission	Funds community-based programs and services that provide critical support to Oakland's most vulnerable children, youth and families to support 4 strategic goals: 1) healthy development of young children, 2) children's success in school from elementary to high school/post secondary student success, 3) youth development & violence prevention and 4) successful transitions to adulthood; Staffs <i>Planning and Oversight Commission and Youth Advisory Commission</i>
Community Homelessness Services (CHS)	Strengthens Oakland's homelessness safety net services and works with partners to provide housing services for homeless and at-risk populations. Services include Emergency Housing Program, Winter Relief Program, Emergency Winter Shelter, Homeless Mobile Outreach Program, Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA), and more. Formerly Community Housing Services; liaises with MACRO program.

HSD Service Summary 3 of 4

Division	Service/Function
Early Childhood & Family Services (Head Start)	Free early childhood education program that promotes school readiness for children from birth to age five. Program also offers family services to low-income Oakland residents, including health service,; nutrition services & food distribution, mental health & disability services, and mobile classroom Intensive early childhood services. Staffs Advisory Board and Parent Policy Council
Resiliency in Communities after Stress & Trauma (ReCAST)	Promotes resiliency, healing, belonging, joy, and equity for Oakland's high-risk youth and families, focusing on those most affected by the interrelated challenges of violence, civil unrest, and trauma, including trauma resulting from the disparate impact of traumatic events. Implement trauma-informed capacity building across City agencies and local service provider networks.


HSD Service Summary 4 of 4

Division	Service/Function
Administration	Provides executive support to all HSD divisions; coordinates and monitors Department's legislative work; plans and executes special projects that extend beyond the scope of other HSD divisions; provides contract coordination and monitoring for HSD divisions, which includes 55% of all City grants; conducts all Department personnel and recruitment functions for 293+ employees; and monitors department data collection and analysis.
Fiscal & Budget	Manages HSD budget and fiscal functions, grant coordination and oversight for 55% of the City's grants, regulatory direction as well as monitoring and compliance advisory; and provides purchasing, accounts payable and accounts receivable services to all 6 HSD Divisions.

HSD's Intersection with other Departments

- Community Homelessness Services (CHS) partners with Housing & Community Development (HCD) to apply for shelter and housing grants to increase capacity for the City's emergency and transitional shelter programs; CHS is also active with the Emergency Encampment Team (EMT) to support homeless encampment interventions
- HSD Staff partners with the Department of Race and Equity to improve programmatic efforts towards inclusiveness and eliminating racial disparities
- Resiliency in Communities After Stress and Trauma (ReCAST) offers Trauma-Informed Mental Health Resilience trainings to City-wide, frontline workers including Dept. of Violence Prevention, Oakland Police Dept., Oakland Public Library, and more
- **Head Start** and the **Children's Initiative** in an effort to prioritize city partnerships and advance opportunities to address emergent gaps and unmet needs, be responsive to shifts in the funding landscape and further alignment within the ecosystem of programs, services and activities that promote positive outcomes for Oakland's children, youth and their families.

HSD's Intersection with other Departments (cont.)

- Children & Youth Services (CYS) collaborates with Oakland Parks, Recreation & Youth Development (OPRYD), Department of Violence Prevention (DVP), Office of Employment & Workforce Development (OEWD) Workforce Development Board (OWDB)
- ASSETS Senior Employment Program partners with Oakland Parks, Recreation & Youth Development (OPRYD), Oakland Libraries, Public Works, and Mayor's office to provide on-the-job training for the Senior Aides (and has hired some as employees)

HSD: Challenges & Opportunities

CHALLENGES OPPORTUNITIES

STAFFING & OPERATIONAL EFFICIENCY

- Elevated vacancy levels
- Current staff absorbing tasks carried over from vacant positions
- Delays in contract execution, resulting in delayed service implementation and timely payments to vendors
- Lack of formal training and support with city process, such as contracts & purchasing

PARTNERSHIPS & ADVOCACY

- Collaboration with C.B.O.'s to increase advocacy & community resiliency projects
- Improve strategic partnerships with Alameda County Social Services agency (when HSD Director is hired)

FUNDING & RESOURCE CONSTRAINTS

- Over-reliance on one-time limited duration funding
- Ongoing reductions of City funds

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT & CAPACITY BUILDING

 Oakland ReCAST deepen partnerships across East and West Oakland to strengthen community resilience to create a more trauma-informed and responsive network of services




