Recommendation

Adopt resolution: Submitting to voters at November 5 General Election

- Issuance of \$182 M in General Obligation Bonds
- Fund infrastructure projects at
 - Oakland Museum of CA (OMCA)
 - Chabot Space & Science Center
 - Children's Fairyland
 - Peralta Hacienda Historical Park



Executive Summary

- 4 cultural institutions housed in facilities owned by the City of Oakland, with long-term leases and operating agreements with City
- All have aging facilities and infrastructure, with inventory or capital improvements needed.
- Institutions at these facilities have strong history and track record of community service & programming to diverse communities
 - All have valuable specialized exhibits, landscapes, education, and programming serving children, youth, and families.' OF

Background/ Legislative History

- 1960's: OMCA constructed through City of Oakland bond measure
- 2002: Measure G authorized issuance of \$59M for Oakland Zoo, OMCA, and Chabot Space & Science Center
- 2010: Measure C authorized Transient Occupancy Tax Surcharge ("hotel tax") to support operations of cultural institutions
- > 20 yrs since last capital improvement bond for cultural facilities

Analysis & Policy Alternatives

- 4 cultural institutions housed in facilities owned by the City of Oakland, with long-term leases and operating agreements with City
- All have aging facilities and infrastructure, with inventory or capital improvements needed
- All provide valuable exhibits, programming, education on science, history, arts, culture
- Total visitation at 4 facilities > 500,000 visitors annually, ~ ½ from schools

Analysis & Policy Alternatives, conti.

Types of facilities & capital improvement projects to be funded:

- improvement & rehabilitation
- preservation
- construction
- ADA access
- historic preservation
- safety and security

- visitor amenities
- educational facilities
- environmental sustainability
- exhibits and collections storage



Oakland Museum of California


- 7 acre indoor/ outdoor campus
- ~ 200K visitors/ yr
- 55 yr old building
- Garden, entrances across from Lake Merritt
- Collections of CA art, history, and natural sciences





Chabot Space & Science Center

- 14-acre campus, 150k visitors/yr
- 24 yrs at current facility (140 yr old institution)
- Planetarium, exhibits, observatory
- NASA partnership
- Workforce development to build equitable pathways into STEM careers in astronomy & aerospace





Children's Fairyland

- 74 yr old facility built by the
 Oakland Park & Recreation Dept
- 150K visitors/ yr
- 4 child-size rides and 40 exhibits
- Part of inspiration for Disneyland
- Keep vintage feel while modernizing





Peralta Hacienda Historical Park

- 6 acre site; 92K visitors/ yr
- >50 yr old park, museum, gardens, exhibits
- Ohlone and Californio origins of Oakland
- 2001 Park Master Plan





Polling Results

- Summer 2023, private poll commissioned by organizations
- 614 likely voters, at \$189M bond
- Approval rating of 69%
- 80% noted the need for safe and affordable spaces, especially for children and youth

Impact on facilities of bond measure

- Renovated theater, exhibit spaces, and facilities
- New and modernized educational learning spaces and youth center
- Improved climate resilience
- Sustainable green spaces in gardens and parks
- Enhanced safety and security of facilities



Impact on facilities with<u>out</u> bond measure

- Degraded infrastructure (building, water, electrical)
- Lack of ADA accessibility to critical areas
- Roof leaks, waterproofing failures result in damage to to facilities, collections, visitor safety risks, and closure
- Poor seismic protection lead to risk of damage to facilities, collections, closure
- Fire safety system weaknesses result in security risks to visitors





Fiscal Impact

- If voters pass bond measure, City authorize issuance of \$182M in General Obligation bonds to fund projects at 4 facilities
- 2022 General Obligation Bond policy- limits City's ability to issue bonds and requires older bonds retired before issuance of new bonds

Public Outreach/ Interest

- Private Poll
- Meetings with 4 cultural institutions
- Engaging public through legislative process (Rules Committee, City Council Meetings)



City Coordination

- City Council, City Administrator, Finance Department
- Reviewed by City Attorney
- Input from Mayor's Office and the 4 cultural institutions



Economic Impacts

- If bond measure is approved by voters, jobs for local construction companies, contractors, workers
- Generate tourism and visitation, education programming



Environmental Impacts

- Projects include energy efficiency, water sustainability, climate change resilience
- Many facilities & organizations provide ongoing environmental education and programming



Race and Equity Impacts

- All organizations have deep commitment to racial, soci-economic, and age diversity in all areas including:
 - on Boards and staff
 - visitors through content and accessibility (ex. free and discounted admission)



Race and Equity Impacts, conti.

- Snapshot of visitor/ user demographics
 - o OMCA:
 - 50% BIPOC (12% Black, 14% AAPI, 8% Latinx; 12% multiracial/ethnic); 43% HH income < \$100,000;
 - School population: 28% Oakland schools, 46% Title 1 schools w/ low-income families
 - Chabot Space & Science Center:
 - 41% BIPOC (10% Black, 19% AAPI, 8% Latinx; 17% multiracial/ethnic)
 - Workforce Development partnership w/ OUSD's linked learning program, from Title 1 High Schools

Race and Equity Impacts, conti.

- Snapshot of visitor/ user demographics
 - Children's Fairyland:
 - 64% BIPOC (4.5% Black, 49% AAPI, 3.5% Latinx, 11% multiple ethnicities); Reduced price admission by income
 - School population: 33% from OUSD, 88% of which enrolled in free or reduced price lunch program

Peralta Hacienda Historical Park:

- 95% BIPOC (19% Black, 14% AAPI including Laotian Mien, 51% Latinx including Mayan Mam); free education & youth programs
- School population: 3rd and 4th grade- 90% from OUSD, 75% from Title 1 schools

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
