RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO

ACCEPT AND APPROPRIATE THE SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM FOURTH CYCLE STATE FUNDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$441,045 FOR PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS AT VARIOUS

SCHOOL LOCATIONS

SUMMARY

A resolution has been prepared authorizing the City Administrator or her designee to accept and appropriate state funds from the Safe Routes to School Program (SR2S) Fourth Cycle in the amount of \$441,045.

The SR2S funds will be used for the design and construction of pedestrian safety improvements at seven intersections located along suggested routes to three elementary schools, one elementary and middle school, and one high school throughout the City. The improvements include installation of a new traffic signal at the intersection of Foothill Boulevard/40th Avenue and new sidewalk "bulb-outs" at the intersections of: 1) East 12th Street/37th Avenue; 2) Foothill Boulevard/9th Avenue; 3) Foothill Boulevard/10th Avenue; 4) High Street/Courtland Avenue; 5) Market Street/Brockhurst Street; and 6) Market Street/33rd Street. Attachment A shows the schools corresponding to each improvement. The SR2S funds will also be used for the production and distribution of multi-lingual educational brochures for public outreach.

This project is consistent with the following City Council Budget Priorities:

Make Oakland a Safe City by improving the perception of safety.

Improve Oakland Neighborhoods by improving traffic, bike, and pedestrian safety.

FISCAL IMPACTS

Approval of this resolution will accept and appropriate \$441,045 for the SR2S Fourth Cycle project. These funds will be placed in the California Department of Transportation Fund (2140) Project G254110.

Funding in the amount of \$100,000 for the required local match is available in Fund 2162, Project G181810. These funds were allocated from the Transportation Development Act (TDA) through Resolution No. 77748, approved on April 15, 2003.

The required allocations for Contract Compliance and Public Art will be set-aside in the appropriate accounts upon approval of this resolution.

Implementation of these infrastructure improvements will increase annual maintenance costs by \$3,500. These costs will be brought forward to the City Council during the FY 2005-07 budget development process for consideration.

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BACKGROUND

As part of the passage of Assembly Bill 1475, the SR2S Program was established in 1999 to provide for design and construction of pedestrian and bicyclist safety improvements along routes to schools. Senate Bill 10 was enacted in 2001 to extend the program until January 1, 2005. For Cycle Four, Fiscal Year 2003-2004, the City of Oakland was awarded \$441,045. The program reimburses a maximum amount of \$450,000 for any single project. The local agency must provide a minimum local match of 10 percent of the total cost of the project.

Over the last several years, the City of Oakland, in conjunction with school officials, neighborhood organizations, and diverse groups, has been addressing and mitigating pedestrian and bicyclist safety issues at various school locations on a citywide basis. With federal funds in the amount of \$459,000 obtained from the 1999-2000 SR2S Program (First Cycle) and \$449,523 obtained from 2001-2002 SR2S Program (Second Cycle), the City installed new traffic signals, in-pavement crosswalk flashers, sidewalk bulb-outs, and pedestrian signal heads. The City continues to pursue education and enforcement resources in addition to engineering solutions to improve pedestrian and bicyclist safety.

In May 2003, the Public Works Agency's Transportation Services Division (TSD) submitted the application for the SR2S Program Fourth Cycle. Caltrans awarded the City an amount of \$441,045 in federal funds, which became available on November 24, 2003. Acceptance and appropriation of the funds will allow TSD to establish a new project and commence with design.

KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

The primary goal of this project is to improve pedestrian access and safety for students walking to and from schools. The schools and locations were selected from a list of twelve schools that experienced the most pedestrian-related accidents within one-quarter mile from campus.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project consists of the following improvements:

- 1. A new traffic signal at the intersection of Foothill Boulevard/40th Avenue;
- 2. New sidewalk bulb-outs at the intersections of East 12th Street/37th Avenue, Foothill Boulevard/9th Avenue, Foothill Boulevard/10th Avenue, High Street/Courtland Avenue, Market Street/Brockhurst Street, and Market Street/33rd Street.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: None.

Environmental: The proposed new traffic signal will reduce congestion and pollution by improving traffic circulation.

Social Equity: The proposed improvements will provide greater accessibility and safety to pedestrians. Senior citizens, persons with disabilities, and students will greatly benefit from these improvements.

DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

The improvements will comply with all requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and improve access for students, and senior and disabled citizens by installing curb ramps and audible pedestrian signal heads.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND RATIONALE

Staff recommends approval of the resolution to accept and appropriate funds from the Safe Routes to School Program (SR2S) Fourth Cycle in the amount of \$441,045. The project will improve pedestrian access and safety throughout the City.

ACTION REQUESTED OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Staff requests that Council approve the resolution.
