Fiscal Year 2023-2025 Grant Agreements

Department of Violence Prevention

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Resolution Request

- Execute grant agreements with non-profit organizations and public agencies to deliver violence prevention and intervention services for the period of October 1, 2023, to June 30, 2025, (7 quarters) for a total amount of \$28,087,500.
- Allow grant agreements to be extended to September 30, 2025, (1) quarter) for an additional amount of \$4,012,500 if funding is available.

Impacts of Resolution

- Establishes a **two-year funding cycle** for DVP grants that begins on October 1st and ends on September 30th.
- Aligns the DVP's funding cycle with the City of Oakland's biennial budget but staggers it by 3 months so that DVP grants are always awarded based on a finalized City of Oakland budget.
- Reduces workload burden on City staff and staff at funded agencies.

Impacts of Resolution

- Preserves FY22-23 funding levels for violence prevention and intervention strategies that are most likely to reduce violence/trauma and that lack alternate funding sources.
- Eliminates funding for employment services and the mini grants program.
- Adds funding for three gender-based violence (GBV) specialists in the School Violence Intervention and Prevention Program so that all 7 high schools served have a full-time GBV specialist.

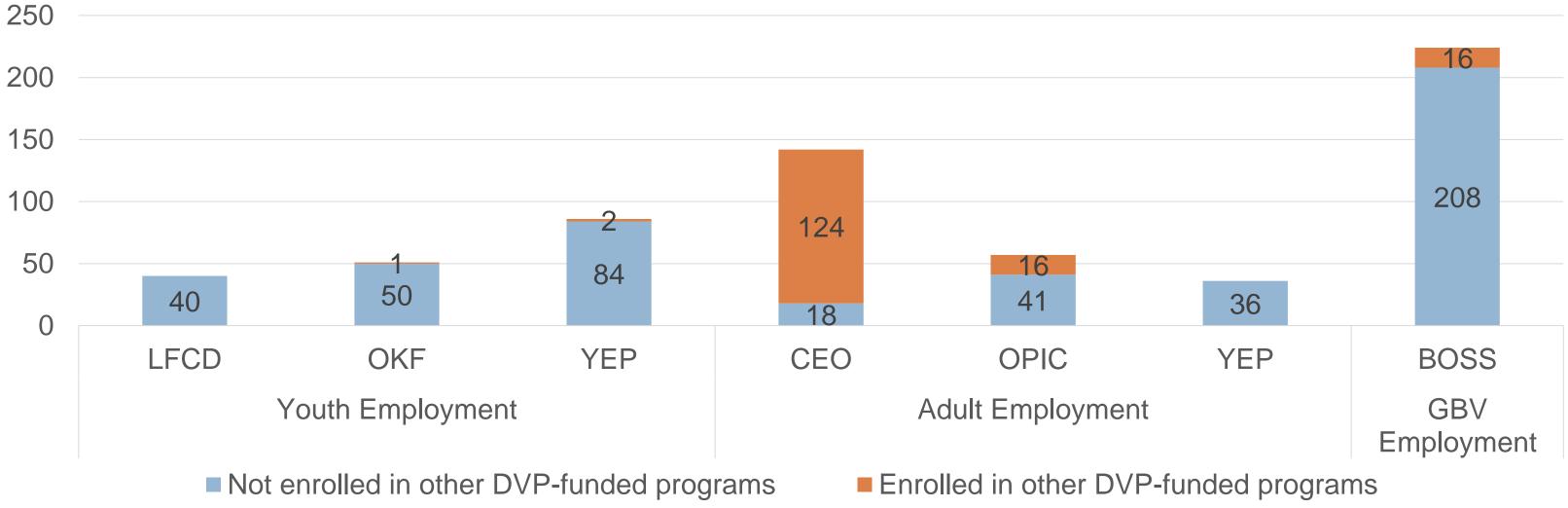

Individuals served through DVP employment grants were primarily <u>not</u> enrolled in other DVP services in FY22-23, as intended.



- DVP clients have a range of social-service needs that are not funded by the DVP, including mental health services and housing. Life coaches and family coaches work closely with clients to help them access needed services.
- The City will continue administering \$11.5 million in grants for adult employment.
- Employment is a likely recipient of private and philanthropic funding.
 - Council President Bas is convening a meeting with the Oakland Fund for Public Innovation to discuss a coordinated, citywide fundraising effort for employment services.
 - The Oakland Thrives Leadership Council and Blue Meridian Partners will invest \$100 million in East Oakland over the next 5 years, which will include \$5 million for work experience and entry-level jobs.

- The DVP's mini grants program awards \$5,000 to \$15,000 to individuals and small organizations to implement activities related to changing community norms around violence.
- Activities funded through mini grants have an inherently limited impact due to their low funding amount.
- Activities funded through mini grants are less directly related to reducing gun violence, sex trafficking, and school-based violence than other funded activities.
