A Report And A Resolution 1) Authorizing The City Administrator To Prepare And Submit The Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan For Housing And Community Development For Fiscal Year 2009-2010 To The U.S. Department Of Housing And Urban Development, 2) Accepting And Appropriating Funds Totaling \$14,857,042 For The Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnership, Emergency Shelter Grant And Housing Opportunities For Persons With AIDS Programs, 3) Appropriating \$670,480 In Program Income And Any Amounts In Excess Thereof For Housing Rehabilitation Revolving Loan Fund, And 3) Authorizing The City Administrator To Negotiate And Execute Agreements With Contractors For Fiscal Years 2009-2011 For The Community Development Block Grant.

#### SUMMARY

A resolution has been prepared for City Council to adopt the Consolidated Plan for the Housing and Community Development Annual Action Plan for fiscal year 2009-2010. The full draft Action Plan has been published and distributed as a separate document that is available in hard copy from CEDA, the City Clerk and at the Public Library, and also is on the City's web site at www.oaklandnet.com/government/hcd. The resolution authorizes the City Administrator to submit the plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and to accept and appropriate a total anticipated amount of \$14,857,042 in federal grant funds; however this amount may require adjustments when final awards are announced by HUD, and appropriate \$670,480 in anticipated program income for FY 2009-2010 for the following four formula grant programs:

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA), and Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG).

The resolution also authorizes the City Administrator to enter into contracts for FY 2009-2011 with CDBG and HOPWA subrecipients for those programs and projects in the amounts identified in the Annual Action Plan for FY 2009-2010. Per Council Resolution 79191 C.M.S., program income generated from the repayment of housing rehabilitation loans is to be allocated to a revolving loan fund for housing rehabilitation activities.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The resolution accepts and appropriates funds for the FY 2009-2010 budget from the four federal grants and from program income (loan repayments) to be earned during the fiscal year. Specific projects have been recommended for funding from the four grants and are included in the Action Plan.

Over the past several years, the CDBG grant has been reduced by 22%. In past years these reductions have been absorbed by increased program income. However, program income has dramatically declined due to the downturn in the housing market.

The grant funds will be appropriated into HUD-CDBG (Fund 2108), HUD-HOME (Fund 2109); and HUD-HOPWA and HUD ESG (Fund 2999). Within each of these Organizations there are a variety of Project Numbers and Account Names. Please refer to *Attachment A* for a list of all Projects Recommended for Funding from the four grants.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) allocates federal funds to eligible localities for housing and community development activities. These funds are from HUD's Community Planning and Development (CPD) formula grant programs – CDBG,

HOME, ESG and HOPWA. Federal regulations require jurisdictions participating in these programs to prepare a five-year Consolidated Plan to assess affordable housing and community development needs. The City submitted its third five-year Consolidated Plan on June 30, 2005. This Consolidated Annual Action Plan describes the actions that will be undertaken in FY 2009-2010 to address the housing and community development priorities that were identified in the Five-Year Strategy for July 1, 2005 – June 30, 2010.

#### **HUD-Required Citizen Participation Process for Consolidated Plan**

HUD regulations require that at least two public hearings be held during each Consolidated Plan program year cycle. The public hearings must include an assessment of housing and community development needs, a review of past program performance, and review and comment of the proposed Action Plan. At least one of these hearings must be held before the proposed plan is published for comment.

 A public hearing was held at the City Council meeting on March 31, 2009 to review and consider FY 2007-08 performance, to assess community needs, and to discuss allocation of funds among program areas and recommend priorities for program funding for the FY 2009-2011 cycle.

A Public Hearing will be held Tuesday, May 5, 2009 in the City Council Chambers. A notice was published in the Oakland Tribune, Post and El Mundo newspapers April 19 and 21, 2009 announcing the availability of the draft Plan and the date, time and purpose of the Public Hearing.

Additionally, meetings were held monthly within the seven Community Development Districts to solicit input on funding specific District Programs.

#### KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

### Consolidated Plan Priorities and Strategies

The City's Five-Year Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development, adopted in June 2005, includes an extensive community profile that describes the City's needs for community and economic development, affordable housing, and housing and services for the homeless. The Plan also includes a set of priorities and strategies for addressing those needs. As adopted by the City Council, the City's priorities are as follows:

#### Housing

- Preservation and Expansion of the Supply of Affordable Housing
- Assistance to First Time Homebuyers
- Encouragement of Housing Rehabilitation and Neighborhood Improvement
- Provision of Rental Assistance for Extremely Low Income Families
- Prevention and Reduction of Homelessness
- Expansion of Housing Opportunities for Seniors and Persons with Special Needs.

#### Homelessness

- Provide outreach and information/referrals to both sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons, enabling them to access the full range of services of the Continuum of Care.
- Maintain and expand, where possible, the existing inventory of emergency shelter beds and hotel/motel vouchers, and implement a winter shelter program.
- Maintain and expand, where possible, the current number of transitional housing units.
- Maintain and expand, where possible, the current inventory of permanent supported housing.
- Expand programs aimed at Homeless Prevention.
- Provide housing and supportive services to persons with HIV/AIDS who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless

#### **Non-Housing Community Development**

#### Economic Development

The City's economic development programs are designed to address community needs that include (1) job opportunities for Oakland's unemployed, underemployed and economically disadvantaged residents, (2) private investment to strengthen the tax base and stimulate commercial activity, and (3) blight and chronic vacancies in the City's twenty-five neighborhoods.

#### Specific goals include:

- Attract, retain, and expand job opportunities
- Stimulate private investment to foster Oakland's business growth
- Revitalize neighborhood commercial areas

- Link economic development job opportunities with local job training and placement resources for Oakland's low and moderate income residents
- Redevelop Oakland's vacant and underutilized industrial and commercial areas
- Create sustainable development projects.

### Public Services and Infrastructure (Neighborhood Improvements)

- Social Services for Seniors, Youth and Childcare
- Hunger Relief
- Domestic Violence
- Employment, Education and Job Training
- Legal Services
- Substance Abuse Intervention and Treatment
- Infrastructure/Neighborhood Improvements
- Other Social Services

#### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

#### Description and Summary of Proposed Annual Action Plan

Staff has prepared a draft Annual Action Plan, now under consideration, which addresses the use of Federal grant funds for the second year of the City's third five-year Consolidated Plan. This document contains specific actions and projects for FY 2009-10 designed to:

- Increase and maintain the supply of affordable supportive housing for low-income and special needs populations, including the homeless.
- Create a suitable living environment through neighborhood revitalization and improvements in public facilities and services.
- Expand economic opportunities for lower income households.

The Annual Action Plan describes actions to be undertaken to address the housing and community development priorities identified in the five-year Strategy. These include housing activities to address the provision of affordable housing to low income families, rehabilitation of the existing housing stock, emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons and activities that will be undertaken to prevent homelessness. Non-housing community development includes economic development and public services/infrastructure (neighborhood improvements).

The City anticipates it will receive the following Federal grant awards for FY 2009-10:

Community Development Block Grant	\$8,326,488
HOME	4,305,431

An additional \$670,480 in program income will be received from housing loan repayments and loan fees that will go into the revolving loan fund, for a total of \$15,527,522 available for allocation.

In accordance with the allocations established by the City Council and consistent with the priorities in the Consolidated Plan and the requirements of the Federal grant programs, these funds will be used to address the following priority needs:

- \$7,401,574 from CDBG and HOME to fund housing activities (includes approximately \$427,816 for HOME program administration, coordination and monitoring).
- \$2,225,123 from HOWPA (\$1,854,400) and ESG (\$370,723) to serve the homeless and persons at risk of homelessness, including persons with HIV/AIDS (includes approximately \$55,624 for administration and monitoring for the HOPWA and ESG programs).
- \$1,114,303 from CDBG for economic development activities.
- \$1,633,999 from CDBG for Public Services and Neighborhood Improvements.
- \$1,847,523 from CDBG for program administration, accounting and audit functions, planning, monitoring and evaluation, and citizen participation.

In addition to the funding listed above, the Resources section of the Action Plan describes other Federal and non-Federal resources (State and local funding as well as private resources), that are reasonably expected to be made available or leveraged during the program year. The Action Plan includes both a general description of strategies and planned actions, and detailed information on each activity proposed for funding

#### **CDBG Process**

The recommendations for the CDBG program continue to be a result of input from the Community Development (CD) District Boards, and the City Administrator. City Council members continue their participation in the deliberations in a variety of ways and there continues to be participation of residents.

In December, 2008 a Request for Proposals (RFP) was issued for eligible District Funded economic development, neighborhood improvements/public services and housing activities.

Beginning in February, 2009 the District Boards reviewed proposals received for CDBG funding. During the review of proposals, the Community Development District Boards held a number of evening meetings to accommodate citizen review and hear presentations from persons requesting funds, prior to formulating their recommendations. The District Boards recommended to the City Administrator those proposals that should be funded. The City Administrator's final recommendations to the City Council are listed on *Attachment B*.

Based upon the continued needs of the community, the City Administrator recommended to the City Council the percentage allocation for housing, economic development and neighborhood improvement/public service activities. On March 31, 2009, the City Council adopted an allocation of CDBG funds to provide specific percentages to each of five broad categories of uses.

#### **Process for Public Review and Comment**

Copies of the draft Plan were made available beginning Tuesday, April 8, 2009 for a 30-day comment period and have been placed on file at the main branch of the Oakland Public Library and are available from both the Community & Economic Development Agency and the Office of the City Clerk. Notices have been distributed to a variety of nonprofit housing organizations, homeless service providers, public agencies and commissions, and other interested parties.

Written public comments will be accepted by the Community & Economic Development Agency through Tuesday, May 5, 2009. Staff will then revise the Annual Action Plan consistent with such comments and City Council direction, and will include a summary of all written comments

received and a discussion of how such comments were included, or an explanation as to why such comments were not included in the final Annual Action Plan.

#### SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

**Economic:** These projects will expand the affordable housing inventory in Oakland and generate construction and professional services jobs.

**Environment:** These recommended projects will address such issues as removal of blight, and abatement of environmental hazards such as lead-based paint and other building conditions of the foreclosed properties. The developers will encourage contractors to use green building techniques, including energy-efficient design, use of recycled building materials, and water-conserving fixtures and landscaping.

**Social Equity:** By definition, these projects are targeted to improving conditions for low and moderate income communities. Through the NSP, Oakland's neighborhood-level environment will be improved by rehabbing foreclosed and sometimes blighted properties with new homes and residents. The proposed projects will provide affordable rental and ownership housing for low and very low-income individuals and families.

#### DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

Many of the grants and loans funded by federal housing and community development grant funds are used to provide housing, facilities and services for senior citizens and persons with disabilities. All new housing constructed with federal funds must provide accessibility features for persons with disabilities.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS AND RATIONALE

Staff is recommending the following:

- Staff receive and review public comments on the draft Annual Action Plan for FY 2009-10
- Staff prepare and submit the final plan by May 15, 2009 to HUD.
- Appropriate FY 2009-10 grant receipts for the CDBG, HOME, HOPWA, and ESG programs.
- Appropriate Program Income totaling \$670,480 and appropriate any CDBG Program Income in excess of \$670,480, and any HOME Program Income from repayment of housing rehabilitation loans, to Housing Rehabilitation Programs.
- Approve the City Administrator's recommendations for CDBG funding.



RESOLUTION 1) AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO PREPARE AND SUBMIT TO THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT THE CONSOLIDATED PLAN ANNUAL ACTION PLAN FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009-2010; 2) ACCEPTING AND APPROPRIATING GRANT FUNDS TOTALING \$14,857,042 FOR THE HOME, EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANT, HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR PERSONS WITH AIDS, AND THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAMS; 3) APPROPRIATING \$670,480 IN PROGRAM INCOME AND ANY AMOUNTS IN EXCESS THEREOF FOR HOUSING REHABILITATION LOANS; AND 4)AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO NEGOTIATE AND EXECUTE AGREEMENTS WITH CONTRACTORS FOR FISCAL YEARS 2009-2011 FOR THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that the City of Oakland prepare and submit a Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan as a condition for receiving federal funds for housing and community development activities; and

WHEREAS, the Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan should be submitted to HUD by May 15, 2009, but no later than the end of the City's current fiscal year; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has published a draft of the Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan and has provided for a public comment period of 30 days according to HUD requirements; and

**WHEREAS**, the City desires to accept anticipated grants from HUD for the following programs in the following amounts as identified in the Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan:

Community Development	
Block Grant (CDBG)	\$8,326,488
HOME	4,305,431
Emergency Shelter Grant	370,723
HOPWA	1,854,400

- WHEREAS, the grant funds will be appropriated into HUD-CDBG Fund (2108), Fund (2109); and HUD-HOPWA and HUD ESG Fund (2999);and
- WHEREAS, the seven Community Development District Boards have held meetings to consider funding requests and have made recommendations for funding; and
- WHEREAS, a public hearing will be held May 5, 2009, to solicit public comment on the proposed Consolidated Plan including consideration of the categorical allocation of CDBG funds to programs and projects for FY 2009-10; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council finds the agreements with contractors/sub recipients are for services of a professional or specialized nature; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council finds that these agreements shall not result in the loss of employment or salary by any person having permanent status in the competitive service; now therefore, be it
- **RESOLVED:** That the City Council hereby authorizes and directs the City Administrator, and/or his or her designee, to prepare the final Consolidated Plan, consistent with the draft Action Plan and related documents, and consider public comments received; and be it
- FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Council hereby authorizes and directs the City Administrator, and/or his or her designee, to take any actions necessary to execute and submit the documents mentioned above to HUD and any other materials that may be required to secure HUD approval of the City's Consolidated Plan; and be it
- **FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City Council hereby accepts and appropriates the HUD funds totaling \$14,857,042 and authorizes the City Administrator or her designee to amend the appropriated amounts for FY 2007/08 to reflect actual grant receipts for the programs identified in the final Consolidated Plan; and be it
- **FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City Council hereby appropriates CDBG Program Income totaling \$670,480 to a revolving housing rehabilitation loan fund and appropriates any Program Income in excess of \$670,480 to Housing Rehabilitation Programs to allow for additional funding of loans or grants; and be it
- **FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City Council hereby appropriates any HOME Program Income received to date and in the future from repayment of housing rehabilitation loans to Housing Rehabilitation Programs; and be it
- FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Administrator or his or her designee is authorized to negotiate and execute agreements with third-party contractors and sub recipients for those programs and projects in the amounts identified in the final Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan for FY 2009-2010 Community Development Block Grant, Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS, Homeless Families Support Network/Supportive Housing, Matilda Cleveland Transitional Housing and the Families In Transition/Scattered Sites Transitional Housing programs, as listed on Attachments to this Resolution; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City Administrator is hereby authorized to approve any amendments to the Consolidated Plan, and any amendments, modifications or extensions of FY 2009-11 agreements, with the exception of the allocation of additional funds, and take any other action with respect to the agreements consistent with this Resolution and its basic purpose; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That prior to execution, agreements shall be reviewed and approved as to form and legality by the Office of the City Attorney, and copies filed with the Office of the City Clerk.
