RE: A Supplemental Report On The Report And Resolution 1) Authorizing The City

Administrator To Prepare And Submit The Consolidated Plan Annual Action Plan For Housing And Community Development For Fiscal Year 2009-2010 To The U.S. Department Of Housing And Urban Development, 2) Accepting And Appropriating Funds Totaling \$14,857,042 For The Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnership, Emergency Shelter Grant And Housing Opportunities For Persons With AIDS Programs, 3) Appropriating \$670,480 In Program Income And Any Amounts In Excess Thereof For Housing Rehabilitation Revolving Loan Fund, And 3)Authorizing The City Administrator To Negotiate And Execute Agreements With Contractors For Fiscal Years 2009-2011 For The Community Development Block Grant.

#### **SUMMARY**

This report provides additional information requested by the members of the Community and Economic Development Committee at the April 28, 2009 meeting regarding the Consolidated Annual Action Plan and the recommendation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding.
