A REPORT AND A RESOLUTION 1) AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO PREPARE AND SUBMIT THE CONSOLIDATED PLAN ANNUAL ACTION PLAN FOR HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2004-05 TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT, 2) ACCEPTING AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS TOTALLING \$17,641,406 FOR THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT, HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIP, EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANT AND HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR PERSONS WITH AIDS PROGRAMS. AND 3) AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO NEGOTIATE AND **AGREEMENTS** WITH CONTRACTORS SUBRECIPIENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2004-05 FOR THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT AND HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR PERSONS WITH AIDS PROGRAMS; AND A RESOLUTION TO AMEND RESOLUTION 76276 C.M.S. TO CHANGE THE NUMBER OF PROPOSALS EACH COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT BOARD CAN RECOMMEND FOR FUNDING TO THE CITY COUNCIL.

### **SUMMARY**

A resolution has been prepared for City Council to adopt the Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development Annual Action Plan for fiscal year 2004-05. The full draft Action Plan has been published and distributed as a separate document that is available in hard copy from CEDA, the City Clerk and at the Public Library, and also is on the City's web site at www.oaklandnet.com/government/hcd. The resolution also authorizes the City Manager to submit the plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and to accept and appropriate a total of \$17,641,406 in federal grant funds and reappropriate \$1,800,000 anticipated program income for FY 2004-05 for the following four formula grant programs:

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

HOME Investment Partnership (HOME)/American Dream Downpayment Initiative

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA), and

Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG).

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The resolution also authorizes the City Manager to enter into contracts with CDBG and HOPWA subrecipients.

A second resolution amends the number of proposals each Community Development District . Board may recommend for funding each year to City Council.

### FISCAL IMPACT

The first resolution accepts the following funds for the FY 2004-05 budget from the four federal grants and from program income (loan repayments) to be earned during the fiscal year. Specific projects have been recommended for funding from the four grants and are included in the Action Plan. There is no impact on other City funds.

The allocations that were included in the original FY 2003-05 Policy Budget that was approved in June 2003 contained estimated grant amounts. Since then, actual grant amounts have been announced by HUD, with slight reductions in the CDBG, HOME and HOPWA allocation, an increase in the ESG allocation, and the new ADDI program. The mid-cycle budget adjustments for FY 2004-05 will reflect the corrected amounts.



### **BACKGROUND**

The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) allocates federal funds to eligible localities for housing and community development activities. These funds are from HUD's Community Planning and Development (CPD) formula grant programs – CDBG, HOME, ESG and HOPWA. Federal regulations require jurisdictions participating in these programs to prepare a five-year Consolidated Plan to assess affordable housing and community development needs. The City submitted its second five-year Consolidated Plan on June 30, 2000. This Consolidated Annual Action Plan describes the actions that will be undertaken in FY 2004-05, to address the housing and community development priorities that were identified in the Five-Year Strategy for July 1, 2000 – June 30, 2005.

### **CDBG Process**

The recommendations for the CDBG program continue to be a result of input from the Community Development (CD) District Boards, the Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) and the City Manager. City Council members continue their participation in the deliberations in a variety of ways and there continues to be participation of residents.

In August 2003, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was issued for eligible economic development, neighborhood improvements/public services and housing activities. City Council members convened elections for CDBG District Boards and appointed 17 members to the CAC made up of representatives from the CDBG eligible communities.

The City Manager held a Town Hall Meeting on November 14, 2003, to discuss the consultant's evaluation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) FY 2002-03 projects and to obtain additional citizen comments and recommendations.

Based upon the continued needs of the community, the City Manager recommended to the City Council the percentage allocation for housing, economic development and neighborhood improvement/public service activities. On December 3, 2003, the City Council adopted an allocation of CDBG funds to provide specific percentages to each of four broad categories of uses.

When City Council approved the CDBG funding allocations in December 2003, HUD had not given the City of Oakland formal notice of the CDBG allocation for FY 2004-05, so the allocation for FY 2003-04 was used as the projected amount. The City of Oakland has received formal notification of the CDBG allocation for FY 2004-05 and there is a reduction of \$145,000 or 1.4%. The numbers above reflect the 1.4% reduction in each program area.

Beginning in November, the District Boards reviewed proposals received for CDBG funding in response to the annual Invitation to Submit Proposals, and advised the Citizen Advisory Committee representatives on their recommendations. The Citizen Advisory Committee recommended to the City Manager those proposals that should be funded. The City Manager's final recommendations to the City Council are discussed below in the Recommendations section of this report.

During the review of proposals, the Community Development District Boards held a number of evening meetings to accommodate citizen review and recommendations for FY 2004-05 CDBG funding. Each district board reviewed the proposals, the results of the evaluation conducted by Gibson and Associates, and heard presentations from persons requesting funds to formulate its recommendations.

The CAC held four (4) meetings this year as part of their review process. The first was a training and orientation session with a presentation of the consultant's evaluation. The second was a hearing of the Housing and Economic Development proposals. The CAC decided not to hold a meeting to hear the Neighborhood Improvement/Infrastructure and Public Service proposals. The third and fourth meetings were to formulate and ratify their recommendations for FY 2004-05 CDBG funding.

### **CAC Recommendations**

The CAC's recommendations for FY 2004-05 CDBG funding were formulated after receiving the recommendations from the CD District Boards, consideration of the presentations made by each organization that requested funds in response to the Request for Proposals (RFP), a review of the evaluation of projects conducted by Gibson and Associates. The CAC wishes it to be noted that:

- 1. The CAC accepted/approved the recommendations of the local boards with regard to 29 single district programs or services in the Neighborhood Improvements/Public Services category. Some groups provide services in only one district while others operate over several districts or citywide. The districts made funding recommendations for four (4) programs providing economic development services. Several City Social Services received funding recommendations.
- 2. The CAC accepted/approved, the recommendations of the local boards with regard to the majority of Citywide programs or services (about 37 proposals mainly economic development and housing). These recommendations allocated about \$717,757 from City-operated housing and economic development programs to community based nonprofits



that provide services in the areas of fair housing, housing service and economic development assistance, in addition to the \$840,868 recommended by City staff.


- 3. After careful consideration of the current CDBG Public Participation process, the CAC made the following recommendations to improve the process:
  - CDBG staff should work with CD District Boards to ensure submission of all required recommendations per timeline.
  - CDBG staff should schedule an additional meeting for the CAC to discuss the process for making funding recommendations.
  - CDBG staff should communicate to applicants for funding from the Housing and Economic Development allocation the need to do a presentation before all seven CD District Boards. In addition, CDBG staff should inform all applicants that they will not be considered for funding if a presentation is not done before the district(s) they are applying to for funding.
  - CDBG staff should change the number of copies of proposals distributed to CD District Boards for the review process.
  - CDBG staff should provide electronic storage for each district so that members of the boards can view/print documents eliminating the need to produce and distribute hard copies.
  - CDBG staff should increase the number of proposals that each CD District Board can recommend for funding.
  - CDBG staff should stagger the terms for the CD District Board members.

CDBG staff will review all the above recommendations from the CAC to determine if they are feasible and report back at a future date.

At this time, however, staff is recommending to amend Resolution No. 76276 C.M.S. that states each CD District Board may recommend no more than eight proposals for funding each year to the City Council. Staff recommends using a sliding scale based upon each District's funding allocation to determine the number of proposals each District recommends for funding to the City Council. The sliding scale is as follows:

District Funding Allocation	Number of Proposals
\$100,000 to \$250,000	no more than eight (8) proposals
\$250,000 to \$350,000	no more than ten (10) proposals
\$350,000 to \$450,000	no more than twelve (12) proposals

Staff also recommends that each CD District may not recommend funding less than \$15,000 to a project unless the amount of the applicant's request is less than \$15,000. The basis for this recommendation is that it is not cost effective to develop and implement a contract that is less than \$15,000.



### City Manager's Recommendations for CDBG Funds

The City received applications for more than 47 different programs (some of which entailed multiple applications for multi-district funding) for a total of more than \$7,675,507 in CDBG funds for Public Services and Neighborhood Improvements. This is three times the \$2,263,010 that was allocated to these areas by the City Council. The District Councils and the CAC were charged with selecting from among these applications to allocate limited funds among competing priorities. Attachment A contains a matrix listing all projects that applied for funding in FY 2004-05, including the amount requested, FY 2003-04 awards and FY 2004-05 recommendations by the Community Development Districts, the Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) and the City Manager.

### Public Services/Neighborhood Improvement Programs

The City Manager recommended funding the Public Services and Infrastructure/Neighborhood Improvement Programs at the amounts recommended by the CAC and the District Boards.

### **Housing Programs**

The City Manager's recommendations for Housing Programs differ from those of the CAC. The CAC did not recommend allocation of any District funds toward Housing Programs. Instead, it recommended reducing the allocations to City-operated programs by \$391,101 and allocating those funds to community-based nonprofits to carry out housing activities. Reducing such funding would impact programs that improve homes occupied by seniors and low income families. Significant staff reductions for operating these programs were a part of the FY 2003-05 City budget. This further reduction would result in either eliminating the Emergency Home Repair Program or two (2) FTE's with associated service reduction in Housing Loan Programs.

The Gibson report recommended changes to the provision of housing services to renters. In response, staff initially allocated \$400,000 to cover a range of housing related services. While there is a consortium of service providers proposing to work as a collaborative, the approach to provide the services and work as a collaborative needs further development. Therefore, staff recommends (a) that the agencies continue to receive \$390,072, their current level of funding (less the 1.4% reduction), with some reallocation since one of last year's recipients did not apply, rather than the CAC recommended funding level, and (b) that further work be done on the development of a true collaborative.

### **Economic Development Programs**

The City Manager's recommendations for Economic Development Programs differ from those of the CAC. The CAC recommended that funding for ongoing City Economic Development activities be reduced by \$326,656 to provide grants to four community based organizations; Spanish Speaking Unity Council, OCCUR, Southeast Asian Community Center and Women's Initiative for Self Employment to operate economic development programs. These programs are recommended for funding from the District funding allocations, rather than funding from the



economic development allocation. Awarding additional funding from the economic development allocation would reduce the level of economic development services provided by the City. (See Attachment A for information that is more detailed)

The CAC recommended the amount of \$11,761,000 for FY 2004-05 CDBG funding. The City Manager also recommended \$11,761,000 FY 2004-05 CDBG funding. The recommendations and final amounts are detailed on an attached chart (see Attachment B). Table 3 of the Annual Action Plan includes more detailed project information on each of these projects.

A list of all projects proposed to be funded from CDBG and HOPWA funds is also attached to this report. It corresponds to attachments to the resolution that list the projects that require agreements with third-party contractors and subrecipients and authorizes specific contract and contract amounts (see Attachment C).

### **HUD-Required Citizen Participation Process for Consolidated Plan**

In addition to the City's process described above for developing CDBG allocations, HUD regulations require that at least two public hearings be held during each Consolidated Plan program year cycle. The public hearings must include an assessment of housing and community development needs, a review of past program performance, and review and comment of the proposed Action Plan. At least one of these hearings must be held before the proposed plan is published for comment.

- A public hearing was held at the City Council meeting on December 16, 2003 to review and consider FY 2002-03 performance, to assess community needs, and to discuss allocation of funds among program areas and recommend priorities for program funding.
- A Public Hearing will be held Tuesday, May 18, 2004 in the City Council Chambers. A
  notice was published in the Oakland Tribune, Post and El Mundo newspapers April 17
  and 18, 2004 announcing the availability of the draft Plan and the date, time and purpose
  of the Public Hearing.

In addition, as described above, there has been substantial community input into the recommendations regarding the allocation of CDBG funds and the organizations recommended to carry out those activities.

### KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

### Consolidated Plan Priorities and Strategies

The City's Five-Year Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development, adopted in June 2000, includes an extensive community profile that describes the City's needs for community and economic development, affordable housing, and housing and services for the homeless. The Plan also includes a set of priorities and strategies for addressing those needs. As adopted by the City Council, the City's priorities are as follows:



### Housing

- Preservation and Expansion of the Supply of Affordable Housing
- Assistance to First Time Homebuyers
- Encouragement of Housing Rehabilitation and Neighborhood Improvement
- Provision of Rental Assistance for Extremely Low Income Families
- Prevention and Reduction of Homelessness
- Expansion of Housing Opportunities for Seniors and Persons with Special Needs.

### Homelessness

- Provide outreach and information/referrals to both sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons, enabling them to access the full range of services of the Continuum of Care.
- Maintain and expand, where possible, the existing inventory of emergency shelter beds and hotel/motel vouchers, and implement a winter shelter program.
- Maintain and expand, where possible, the current number of transitional housing units.
- Maintain and expand, where possible, the current inventory of permanent supported housing.
- Expand programs aimed at Homeless Prevention.
- Provide housing and supportive services to persons with HIV/AIDS who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless

### **Non-Housing Community Development**

### Economic Development

The City's economic development programs are designed to address community needs that include (1) job opportunities for Oakland's unemployed, underemployed and economically disadvantaged residents, (2) private investment to strengthen the tax base and stimulate commercial activity, and (3) blight and chronic vacancies in the City's twenty-five neighborhoods.

### Specific goals include:

- Attract, retain, and expand job opportunities
- Stimulate private investment to foster Oakland's business growth
- Revitalize neighborhood commercial areas
- Link economic development job opportunities with local job training and placement resources for Oakland's low and moderate income residents



- Redevelop Oakland's vacant and underutilized industrial and commercial areas
- Create sustainable development projects.

### Public Services and Infrastructure (Neighborhood Improvements)

- Social Services for Seniors, Youth and Childcare
- Hunger Relief
- Domestic Violence
- Employment, Education and Job Training
- Legal Services
- Substance Abuse Intervention and Treatment
- Infrastructure/Neighborhood Improvements
- Other Social Services

### **Evaluations**

The City contracted with the Oakland-based consulting firm of Gibson & Associates to conduct evaluations of 24 programs assisted with CDBG funds in FY 2002-03. These programs had the highest funding levels, histories of unresolved issues or newly funded in 2002-03. Council accepted recommendations made in the evaluation report on December 16, 2003. Council also recommended continuing evaluation services to evaluate 18 programs assisted with CDBG funds in FY 2003-04.

### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

### Description and Summary of Proposed Annual Action Plan

Staff has prepared a draft Annual Action Plan, now under consideration, which addresses the use of Federal grant funds for the fifth year of the City's second five-year Consolidated Plan. This document contains specific actions and projects for FY 2004-05 designed to:

- Increase and maintain the supply of affordable supportive housing for low-income and special needs populations, including the homeless.
- Create a suitable living environment through neighborhood revitalization and improvements in public facilities and services.
- Expand economic opportunities for lower income households.

The Annual Action Plan describes actions to be undertaken to address the housing and community development priorities identified in the five-year Strategy. These include housing activities to address the provision of affordable housing to low income families, rehabilitation of the existing housing stock, emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons and activities that will be undertaken to prevent homelessness. Non-housing community



development includes economic development and public services/infrastructure (neighborhood improvements).

The City will receive the following Federal grant awards for FY 2004-05:



An additional \$1,800,000 in program income will be received from housing loan repayments and loan fees, for a total of \$19,441,406 available for allocation.

In accordance with the allocations established by the City Council and consistent with the priorities in the Consolidated Plan and the requirements of the Federal grant programs, these funds will be used to address the following priority needs:

- \$10,506,317 from CDBG and HOME to fund housing activities (includes approximately \$486,650 for HOME program administration, coordination and monitoring).
- \$2,375,672 from HOWPA (\$2,006,000) and ESG (\$369,672) to serve the homeless and persons at risk of homelessness, including persons with HIV/AIDS (includes approximately \$38,609 for administration and monitoring for the HOPWA and EST programs.
- \$2,834,726 from CDBG for economic development activities.
- \$2,230,541 from CDBG for Public Services and Neighborhood Improvements.
- \$1,494,150 from CDBG for program administration, accounting and audit functions, planning, monitoring and evaluation, and citizen participation.

In addition to the funding listed above, the Resources section of the Action Plan describes other Federal and non-Federal resources (State and local funding as well as private resources), that are reasonably expected to be made available or leveraged during the program year. The Action Plan includes both a general description of strategies and planned actions, and detailed information on each activity proposed for funding



### New Homeownership Program

Congress has recently authorized a new homeownership program known as the American Dream Downpayment Initiative (ADDI). For FY 2004-05, the City will be receiving an allocation of funds from both the FY 2003 and FY 2004 Federal budgets, for a total of \$438,234.

ADDI funds are governed by many of the same requirements as the HOME program. The maximum amount that can be provided to a first time homebuyer is the greater of \$10,000 or 6 percent of the purchase price of the home. Because these amounts are not sufficient in themselves to provide homeownership opportunities, staff proposes to use these funds to augment the existing Mortgage Assistance Program (MAP), which currently provides loans up to \$50,000. The ADDI funds would be targeted to households with incomes less than 50 percent of median income, who currently are not well served by the MAP program. The additional ADDI funds would be used to provide opportunities to lower income groups, rather than to provide additional funds to those income levels already well-served by the existing homebuyer program.

As required by the statute and regulations, the ADDI program will include coordination with the Oakland Housing Authority (OHA) to promote homeownership opportunities for qualified public housing residents, including using ADDI funds in conjunction with OHA's Section 8 homeownership program. The ADDI program will also include counseling and homebuyer education to ensure that families assisted with these funds are qualified and capable of acquiring and maintaining ownership housing.

### Process for Public Review and Comment

Copies of the draft Plan were available beginning Tuesday, April 20, 2004 for a 30-day comment period and have been placed on file at the main branch of the Oakland Public Library and are available from both the Community & Economic Development Agency and the Office of the City Clerk. Notices have been distributed to a variety of nonprofit housing organizations, homeless service providers, public agencies and commissions, and other interested parties.

Written public comments will be accepted by the Community & Economic Development Agency through Friday, May 21, 2004. Staff will then revise the documents consistent with such comments and City Council direction, and will include a summary of all written comments received and a discussion of how such comments were included, or an explanation as to why such comments were not included in the final documents.

### SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

<u>Economic</u>: Several grants will fund and support organizations that provide economic development, public facilities, infrastructure and social services for low and moderate income communities.

Environment: The CDBG provides funding for services to rehabilitate blighted or substandard housing, remove hazards such as lead-based paint and other health and building safety issues that



help preserve existing City housing stock and improve the environment. The CDBG also provides funding for the Residential Lending Program which administers the housing rehabilitation programs. Staff encourages construction contractors, property owners and housing developers to make substantial use of recycled content building materials, energy-conserving building designs and appliances, and water conserving fixtures and landscaping.

<u>Social Equity</u>: Services provided benefit the neighborhoods, low-moderate community, elderly and disabled and contribute to the safety, security and well-being of homeowners.

### DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

These grants, loans and services have a positive impact on the quality of life for all citizens. Funding is proposed for the Access Improvement and Minor Home Repair programs. These programs provide funds to assist property owners to make modifications that make units accessible to the elderly and persons with disabilities and provide services to very low to low-income senior homeowners to readily address minor home repairs. HOME funds are used to develop affordable housing, including units for seniors and accessible to persons with disabilities. CDBG funds are also used to fund fair housing agencies that assist seniors and persons with disabilities. No other disability or senior access issues have been identified.

### RECOMMENDATION AND RATIONALE

The Annual Action Plan includes the City's applications for the four formula grant programs. Specific awards of funds under the HOME program will be made in response to separate Requests for Proposals later in the year, with final approval by the City Council. The Council approved contracts allocating ESG funds for two years in 2002 and this plan confirms those allocations. HOPWA funds are distributed by formula to Alameda County and Contra Costa County, which in turn allocate those funds competitively.

### Recommendations for City Council Action

Staff recommends that the City Council:

- Direct staff to receive and review public comments on the draft Annual Action Plan for Fiscal Year 2004-05
- Direct staff to prepare and submit the final plan by May 24, 2004
- Appropriate FY 2004-05 grant receipts for the CDBG, HOME, HOPWA, and ESG programs
- Approve the City Manager's recommendations for CDBG funding
- Authorize the City Manager to enter into contracts with CDBG and HOPWA subrecipients and to prepare and submit to HUD any minor amendments to the Action Plan that are necessary to carry out these programs.
- Amend Resolution No. 76276 C.M.S. to change the number of proposals each CD District Board may recommend for funding each year to the City Council.



### ACTION REQUESTED OF THE CITY COUNCIL

The Community and Economic Development Agency requests that the City Council accept the recommendations described in this report and adopt the resolutions.
