Appropriate Said Funds to the Police Department

SUMMARY

A resolution has been prepared authorizing the City Administrator, on behalf of the City of Oakland, to accept and appropriate grant funds in the amount of \$50,000 from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, FY 2009 Gang Resistance Education and Training (GREAT) program. The proposed program period is October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010.

FISCAL IMPACT

It is anticipated that the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, will approve the Police Department's FY 2009 GREAT application and award the City of Oakland \$50,000 in Federal grant funds. Revenues and appropriations will be allocated in the Federal Grant Fund (2112), Youth and Family Services Division Org. (102350), Youth and Family Services Division Program (PS03), in a Project Account to be determined. The program will be managed by the Youth and Family Services Division Commander. There is no match requirement. Expense allocations are as follows:

BACKGROUND

Police Officers from the Oakland Police Department will teach the U.S. Department of Justice approved GREAT curriculum during 13, single-period classes throughout calendar year 2009-2010. The curriculum will be presented to students in fifth through seventh grades in several pre-selected middle and elementary schools. These schools are:

- Berkley Maynard Academy
- Bret Harte Middle School
- Frick Middle School
- Fruitvale Middle School
- Peralta Creek Middle School
- Alliance Academy
- Huerta (Dolores) Learning Academy
- Emerson Elementary School
- Grass Valley Elementary School
- Parker Elementary School

KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

The success of the GREAT program is founded on a mutual commitment by law enforcement and education agencies to help students achieve success:

- 1. Provide children with the skills necessary to combat the pressures that set the stage for gang involvement
- 2. Offer children accurate knowledge about gang involvement
- 3. Equip children with the skills to resolve conflicts peacefully
- 4. Assist students in the understanding of and need to identify and set personal goals.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The GREAT program is a structured, school-based program implemented in areas where gang activity either exists or is emerging. The curriculum is taught by certified uniformed police officers to fifth, sixth, and seventh grade students. The type and location of program-sponsored field trips and the number of students attending each outing will be determined by the sworn personnel administering the GREAT program and school-site personnel.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR, ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF OAKLAND, TO ACCEPT AND APPROPRIATE GRANT FUNDS IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000) FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS, BUREAU OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE, FY 2009 GANG RESISTANCE EDUCATION AND TRAINING (GREAT) PROGRAM, AND APPROPRIATE SAID FUNDS TO THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that grant funds in the amount of \$50,000 will be awarded by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, for continued implementation of the Gang Resistance Education and Training (GREAT) program by the Police Department; and

WHEREAS, these federal grant funds are earmarked to provide gang resistance education to 5th, 6th and 7th grade students enrolled at elementary and middle schools, and

WHEREAS, funding for the GREAT program will assist in the Police Department's goal of decreasing incidents of youth-based violence and other delinquent activities; and

WHEREAS, the City Council previously authorized acceptance of similar grant funds by Resolution No. 81220 C.M.S. dated April 15, 2008, Resolution No. 79274 C.M.S. dated June 7, 2005, Resolution No. 78895 C.M.S. dated November 16, 2004, Resolution No. 77698 C.M.S. dated March 18, 2003, and Resolution No. 77013 C.M.S. dated March 12, 2002; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council hereby authorizes the City Administrator or his designee to accept grant funds in an amount not to exceed \$50,000 in grant funds from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, and to increase revenues and appropriate said budget to the Police Department; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That grant funds shall be maintained in the Federal Grant Fund (2112), Youth and Family Services Division Org. (102350), Youth and Family Services Division Program (PS03); in a Project Number to be established; and be it
