#### Crime Strategies Areas I, II and III

#### June-August 2008 - Area 1 Strategies

Crime strategies for Area 1 have targeted gun violence and robbery activities.

#### Shootings/Homicides

Gun violence dramatically increased from mid June through July (+126% increase). Following, there was a significant decrease in the month of August (-75% reduction) in Police District 1 (West and Downtown Oakland).

The increase began after the conclusion of Operation Nutcracker<sup>1</sup> and was attributed to continued gang violence on Beat 6 (Ghost Town) and Beat 2 (Lower Bottom and Acorn) located in West Oakland. In an effort to reduce gun violence, the following strategies were deployed:

- Patrol officers were and continue to be assigned to West Oakland neighborhoods, with a specific focus on the Ghost Town and Acorn areas, seven days a week during the afternoon to early morning hours. The officers engage in high visibility and proactive enforcement. The goal is to become familiar and identify persons involved in or associated with criminal activity and to follow up with appropriate enforcement action. Neighborhood Enhancement Team (NET) Officers have also concentrated with the same focus in the Lower Bottom area;
- Staff has continued to work with enhanced Measure Y funded outreach programs in violent neighborhoods. Healthy Oakland is a new outreach provider and has provided street outreach in West Oakland. In addition, outreach has been provided at Midnight Basketball events;
- Staff has continued to work with the Criminal Investigations Division (CID) and Targeted Enforcement Task Force (TETF) to identify those involved with gun violence and develop strategies to reduce the violence;
- The California Highway Patrol has conducted high visibility traffic enforcement operations in the Ghost Town, Acorn and Lower Bottom areas;
- Staff utilized bicycle patrols and surveillance operations to deter and arrest persons engaged in criminal activity;
- Officers have been directed to engage in daily foot patrol in areas marred by gun violence;
- Staff has been working with the three management groups in the Acorn area to improve communication, enhance security, and strengthen neighborhood relationships between the three communities; and

An Oakland Police Department investigation, in collaboration with 16 other law enforcement agencies, of a West Oakland gang conducted in June 2008 in an effort to end years of deadly violence and terror linked to the gang. A series of early morning raids were conducted and arrests were made.

Staff has continued to work with a Service Delivery System (SDS) team to focus
inter-agency City services on the Ghost Town area. In addition, the Support
Operations Division (SOD) has assigned traffic officers, Police and Corrections
Team (PACT), Alcohol Beverage Action Team (ABAT), and Abandoned Auto
personnel to the area.

#### Robberies

Street and commercial robberies increased in Police District 1 from May to June (+29%) while decreasing in Police District 2 (North Oakland) (-20%). In July, robberies continued to increase in West Oakland (+8%) while North Oakland suffered a dramatic surge (+126%). August brought a significant decrease in robberies area wide (-32% and -41% respectively in West Oakland and North Oakland). Robbery hot spots included the Telegraph Avenue corridor (starting in the 2300 block of Telegraph to the 4500 block), the San Pablo corridor (from City Hall to 35th St.) and the downtown area. Takeover robberies in North Oakland fueled a climate of fear throughout the entire area. The following strategies were implemented as robbery trends increased:

- Undercover surveillance operations were conducted by both Patrol and criminal investigators;
- Increased targeted bicycle patrols in the downtown and North Oakland area;
- Parked police vehicles in commercial areas as a deterrent;
- Officers engaged in foot patrol during business lunch, dinner and closing times in commercial areas;
- Designated a team of officers to provide high visibility enforcement during afternoon and evening hours in North Oakland;
- Worked with the Neighborhood Services Division in creating a pamphlet on reducing robberies. Neighborhood Service Coordinators went business-tobusiness meeting merchants and distributing the pamphlets.
- Problem Solving Unit developed and put into action a comprehensive plan to address robberies in the Telegraph Ave. corridor. The plan utilizes the SARA<sup>2</sup> method of problem solving and a partnership with the SDS team.

#### **Enforcement Efforts**

The following statistics were generated during the months of June, July, and August by Area 1 officers:

- Hundreds of hours spent by officers on foot patrol
- 260 felony arrests
- 493 misdemeanor arrests
- 2145 citations issued
- 1893 field contact reports completed

#### Results

Anecdotal information contends that citizens noticed the increases in gun violence and robberies in June and July. Although the numbers decreased in August, the community is still concerned with violent crime. Going into the month of September, the Department will continue to assess crime patterns and trends and adjust strategies accordingly.

#### Alameda County Safe House Sobering Center

In April 2008, OPD began utilizing the Safe House Sobering Center. The Safe House is a non-secure facility that provides a voluntary, short-term (four to six hours) stay for 50 adult men and women in order to allow the effects of alcohol intoxication to subside so they may regain legal levels of functionality; it does not accept subjects solely under the influence of other drugs at this time. The Safe House provides a referral service to an adjacent detox center (Cherry Hill Detox). OPD is in the process of establishing procedures for utilizing the detox center. The Safe House does not track how many subjects take advantage of long term treatment.

From April to July only two subjects were delivered to the Safe House. The low numbers were attributed to confusion with Safe House admitting standards (i.e., minimum blood alcohol content levels) and the time involved in driving and admitting subjects—the Safe House is located in San Leandro.

In August, OPD contacted the Safe House Director to improve OPD use of the facility. Aside from clarifying admitting standards, an agreement was reached. The Safe House agreed to make pick ups in Oakland as well as administer the BAC test. The results are promising: seven subjects were delivered to the Safe House during the month of August and it is anticipated this number will increase going forward.

#### NCPC Meeting Attendance

Area 1 personnel are required to attend one community meeting every quarter. Area 1 was in 100% compliance for the first two quarters of 2008. The third quarter ends on September 31, 2008 and 100% compliance is expected. In addition to attending NCPC meetings during the third quarter, Area 1 officers participated in National Night Out in August.

#### June-August 2008 – Area 2 Strategies

Crime strategies for Area 2 have been targeting robbery prevention.

#### Shootings/Homicides

There was a 44% decrease in Area 2 gun violence from May to June and it has continued to decrease. There was a 33% decrease from June to July and a 50% decrease from July to August. There was an overall decrease of 81% as compared to May.

For the year there has been an overall reduction of 33%, as compared to last year. Gun related violence can generally be attributed to the Latino gangs in Area 2. The following strategies were in place during this reporting period:

- Patrol officers and Problem Solving officers working on projects in traditional gang neighborhoods. This includes working with several City Agencies such as Public Works, Code Enforcement, Traffic Engineering, Parks and Recreation. OPD also collaborated with Mr. Arturo Sanchez from the City administrator's Office on problem prosperties that could be addressed trhough the Public Nuisance ordinance. The gang locations that have been identified are also a priority for the Service Delivery System team in Area 2.
- Worked closely with the Gang Unit, Parole and Probation to identify gang members that are in violation of their parole and probation conditions.
- Used motorcycles in identified gang hot spots, to issue traffic citations and also walking in neighborhoods.
- Worked closely with Measure Y Outreach workers to identify "at risk youth" and provide them with guidance and help to break the cycle of gang life.
- Worked closely with Neighborhood Service Coordinators to set up training for parents to help identify children who possibly may be involved in gangs.

#### Robberies

Robberies in Area 2 are down 1.47% overall; however, robberies with firearms have increased by 24%. Street robberies continue to be a concern in Area 2, with 159 being committed from July 1<sup>st</sup> to August 31st. During this same time period most of the robberies occurred on the following beats:

- 15X 19
- 19X 24
- 23X 29
- 20X 21

The majority of the robberies committed were street robberies. The victims were alone and were approached by one to two suspects who demanded and robbed them of back packs, i-Pods, and money. Key thoroughfares in Area 2 continue to be the main venue where the robberies take place. During the time period there were eight "restaurant take

over robberies" in the Area. The following strategies and plans have been implemented and used to combat the robberies:

- Officers identified and "Adopted" a restaurant on their beat and conduct security checks as time permits.
- Undercover surveillance operations were conducted by both Patrol and criminal investigators;
- Increased targeted bicycle and motorcycle patrols along International, Foothill and MacArthur Boulevard;
- Parked police vehicles in commercial areas as a deterrent;
- Directed officers to walk the beat during business lunch, dinner, and closing times in commercial areas;
- Designated a team of officers to provide high visibility enforcement during afternoon and evening hours in the Area;
- Worked with the Neighborhood Services Division to create a pamphlet on reducing robberies. Neighborhood Service Coordinators went business-tobusiness meeting merchants and distributing the pamphlets.

#### **Enforcement Efforts**

The following statistics were generated during the months of June and July by Area 2 officers:

- Hundreds of hours spent by officers on foot patrol
- 162 felony arrests
- 169 misdemeanor arrests
- 929 citations issued
- 475 field contact reports completed
- 11 firearms recovered

#### Results

Area 2 personnel will continue to focus efforts on robberies and gangs. We will continue to partner with the Neighborhood Crime Prevention Councils and the business community to work on education and prevention.

#### June-August 2008 - Area 3 Strategies

Crime strategies for Area 3 have targeted shootings and robberies.

#### Shootings/Robberies

In May shootings in Area 3 decreased 34% and robberies decreased 15%, but through June, July, and August shootings increased 8% and robberies increased 40%.

There appears to be no consistent explanation for the number of shootings other than poor or nonexistent conflict resolution skills between victims and perpetrators. In viewing crime statistics for these events, it was noticeable that a large number of the shootings in District 5 occurred along Bancroft Ave. and in the Seminary Ave. Corridor. In District 6, shootings concentrated on MacArthur Blvd between 82<sup>nd</sup> Ave. and 85<sup>th</sup> Ave and between 100<sup>th</sup> Ave. and 106<sup>th</sup> Ave. Shootings also increased in the area of 90<sup>th</sup> Ave. between International Blvd. and Bancroft Ave. The Oakland Police Department's Crime Analysis Unit and Area 3 Command Staff determined that the majority of shootings changed from Sunday, Tuesday, and Friday to Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. The bulk of the shootings occurred between the hours of 9:00 pm to 3:00 am.

Robberies continue to be crimes of opportunity. A majority occured on the major thoroughfares, mainly on International Blvd. between High Street and Seminary Ave., and between 82<sup>nd</sup> Ave. and 98<sup>th</sup> Ave. These robberies spike between the hours of 8:00 pm and 3:00 am.

Area 3 deployed the following crime reduction strategies:

- Officers engaged in daily proactive enforcement and preventive patrols in shooting and robbery hotspots as identified in the Area 3 Six-Week Operational Period<sup>3</sup>:
- One Patrol team on each day and night shift was placed on special assignment in these areas (activities included surveillances, service of search warrants, walking patrols, probation/parole searches, arrests, and issuing of citations);
- On a weekly basis, Violence Suppression overtime paid for one sergeant and six officers to conduct targeted enforcement;
- Problem Solving Officers closely scanned these areas for opportunities to initiate new projects and to dedicate additional time on existing projects;
- Crime Reduction Team officers, who were not engaged in training new officers, were placed on Special Assignment between 8:00 pm and 12:00 am to carry out robbery suppression operations;
- Measure Y's Violence Prevention Coordinator performed street outreach with an emphasis on contacting and offering prevention/intervention resources to individuals who loiter in and around MacArthur Blvd;
- Officers engaged in Weed and Seed directed enforcement operations along International Blvd. between 82<sup>nd</sup> Ave and 98<sup>th</sup> Ave;
- Neighborhood Services Coordinators, Problem Solving Officers, along with other City Staff completed two Action Clean-Up Days – one in PSA 6 on International Blvd and the other in PSA 5 on MacArthur Blvd;
- Problem Solving Officers patrolled on bicycles as an deterrent and enforcement mechanism; and

 Problem Solving Officers and the Special Victims Unit undertook prostitution operations along International Blvd.

In accordance with the Negotiated Settlement Agreement, it should be noted that officers have until September 31, 2008, to attend a community meeting. All NCPC meetings were attended by at least one Area 3 officer. As of this writing, Area 3 has 26 officers.

#### Detoxification/Treatment Center Transports

Area 3 did not transport anyone to the Detoxification or Treatment centers.

#### Results

As stated previously, in spite of the enforcement efforts (enumerated above) in the months of June, July, and August Area 3 shootings and robberies increased by 8% and 40%, respectively.

Going forward, Area 3 will utilize additional strategies to suppress crime and identify patterns and trends. These strategies will be assessed and adjusted as needed:

- Quality of Life Sweeps;
- Mobile Command Post deployments;
- DUI check points;
- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) evaluations;

- Business inspections;
- Special Enforcement Operations;
  Misdemeanor Prosecution Program; and
- Evaluations of existing Oakland Municipal Codes.
