Subject: UPDATE - 2007 State Government Advocacy Priorities for the City of Oakland

This 2007 state government advocacy agenda was developed by City staff in conjunction with Townsend Public Affairs, Inc. (TPA) incorporating feedback from the Mayor, City Council, City Attorney, and Department Heads of the City of Oakland. This memo is to provide an update on all legislative, regulatory, budget, and funding opportunities that were part of the original City agenda or have been added to the agenda de facto by recent action of the Council, Mayor, or City Attorney. The format of the memo parallels that of the original advocacy agenda, broken into the following three sections:

- 1. The first focuses on <u>Legislative & Regulatory Priorities</u>, beginning with top priorities that were identified based on major issues we are forecasting for Sacramento in the current legislative session that are important to Oakland. This section includes a **State Budget Update** and concludes with an extensive **Legislative Priority Watch List**.
- 2. Second, is the section on the <u>Development of Legislation</u>, or legislative proposals that the City is sponsoring or developing. These are major issues for Oakland that the City would like to take a leadership role in pursuing as individual proposals or as significant amendments to existing proposals.
- 3. The third and final part of the agenda addresses **Funding Priorities**. At this point in the year, one major funding program has been announced that two more are in process.

LEGISLATIVE & REGULATORY PRIORITIES:

IMPLEMENTING LEGISLATION FOR THE 2006 STATEWIDE INFRASTRUCTURE BONDS:

We have briefed the City on all bond funding implementation legislation and related budget matters. We have been in on-going preliminary discussions with members of the Bay Area delegation, State Legislative leadership, the Governor's office, and the League of California Cities regarding the implementation of bond funds. To move forward with a coordinated advocacy strategy in Sacramento, we worked with City staff to develop policy and project priorities for all potential bonds funds and implementing legislation. These priorities and positions were recently adopted by the City Council and we can now begin actively supporting and opposing specific language and appropriation plans for the various proposals.

All viable bond implementation legislation is currently in the Appropriations committees in both houses. Bond implementation legislation must make it out of Appropriations by the June 1 committee deadline. With the announcement of the May Revise on Monday, May 14, budget hearings will now focus on the May Revise, and help determine final allocation of bonds funds in this year's budget. It remains to be seen if the allocations and implementing language will then wait for conference committee processes later this year or be done as part of trailer legislation to the state budget when it is passed prior to the beginning of the next fiscal year on July 1, 2007. These decisions will ultimately be made by negotiations between the Governor and Legislature, and particularly the Legislative Leadership, over the coming month and a half.

On the first round of funding from Proposition 1B, the \$4.5 billion Corridor Mobility Improvement Act funding, though the City of Oakland could not be a recipient as the funding was routed to regional transportation agencies, we worked closely with the City of Oakland in advocating with the MTC and AC-CMA to secure funding for regional projects that would benefit the City. In the final allocation of funding, Northern California received \$1.8 billion, of which the Bay Area received \$1.28 billion (not \$1.5 million as in the e-mail below), of which Alameda County including Oakland received \$400 million, by far the most successful showing for a region when compared to the share that we would get based on population and the initial staff recommendations, which had the Bay Area, for example, receiving only \$600 million

CALIFORNIA ENTERPRISE ZONE PROGRAM:

Though the City has yet to take any positions on the various different legislative proposals with regards to Enterprise Zones and potential additional tax credits, we have been keeping the City staff updates regularly on both the legislation and regulatory processes surrounding Enterprise Zones.

LEGISLATIVE PRIORITY WATCH LIST:

The following topics are of importance to the City of Oakland and any legislation related to these topics is immediately added to the schedule of legislation and regulatory actions that TPA tracks for the City of Oakland. Once added to the list, the City may choose to take a position in support, opposition, or watch, and determine if any further response or reaction is needed. Attached please find a comprehensive legislative matrix with the 188 bills related to the legislative issues listed below. The attached comprehensive matrix, which is regularly updated, has been shared with staff to request input regarding bills on which the City would like to take a position

- State Budget: Monitor and advocate for the City in the state budget process, including all relevant trailer bills. (An update is provided below).
- Redevelopment and Eminent Domain: Advocate for the City regarding proposals to modify redevelopment agency and eminent domain law.

- Transit Oriented Development: Support legislation that appropriates funds and/or offsets the cost for Transit Village planning, implementation, and construction, particularly replacement parking at the villages in the process of development and construction.
- **Urban Infill:** Support specifically defined CEQA exemption legislation without compromising environmental due diligence.
- Flood Control and Storm Water Fees: Support legislation that would allow local governments more flexibility to achieve reductions in storm water and urban runoff pollution.
- **Incentives for Green Business:** Support legislation to create incentives for green business including energy and environmental technology and recycled material product development.
- Crime and Violence Prevention: Support legislation that appropriates funds for violence prevention programs, which includes, but is not limited to, youth empowerment and afterschool program-related legislation.
- **Utility User Taxes**: Monitor legislation that addresses utility users taxes relative to intrastate, interstate and/or international telephone, cellular or wireless communication services.
- Affordable Housing: Support legislation that expands affordable housing opportunities.
- Funding Priority for Housing Element Compliance: Support legislation that links a jurisdiction's eligibility for state funding to compliance with housing element policies.
- Residential Care Facilities: Support legislation that would grant the City more local control
 over certain residential care facilities. Oakland is the site of a disproportionate share of
 transitional housing. Some facilities are poorly run, causing problems for the neighborhoods
 in which they operate. The City of Oakland has limited control over their regulation and with
 more control could ensure that these facilities operate safely and effectively.
- Oakland Unified School District: Advise the Council of opportunities to support legislation to improve the quality of public education in Oakland schools and ensure local control.
- Franchise Tax: Oppose legislation that hampers the City's ability to generate franchise taxes. TPA will advise the Council on developments related to implementation of AB 2987.

General Legislative Update: To date, the City of Oakland has taken positions on the following bills and is analyzing in partnership with TPA numerous others for their potential impact on the City:

Whereas AB 77, AB 21, AB 444, SB 2, AB 45, SB 46, and the Cal Works issue all fall within the scope of the original advocacy agenda voted on by the City, AB 57, AB 1648, and SB 1019 have all been added to the agenda. It should also be noted that the position taken on SB 46 was accompanied by position on certain policy priorities with regards to implementation of Proposition 1C that can be utilized for the City to advocate a position on any related Proposition 1C implementing legislation such as AB 1053 (Núñez) and AB 29 (Hancock), though the City still may chose to take a formal position on those bills as well.

The first major legislative deadline of the year occurred on April 27th, when fiscal bills had to be out of policy committees. Hundreds of bills have now been shelved for a year, but thousands of others are still alive in the process. Below are the major legislative deadlines which occur in the near future.

- May 11th Last day for policy committees to hear non-fiscal bills.
- June 1st Last day for fiscal committees (Appropriations) to pass bills.
- June 8th Last day for bills to pass out of their house of origin.
- June 15th Constitutional deadline for passing the budget.
- July 1st First day of fiscal year 2007/08
- July 13th Last day for fiscal bills to pass out of policy committees.
- July 20th August 20th Legislature on Summer Recess.

We continue to advocate the City's position on those bills on which it has taken a formal position, and engage in constant, on-going monitoring, information gathering, and updating regarding other legislation of interest so as to be prepared to anticipate and advocate on all matters of relevance to the City. We will continue providing regular formal and informal updates on the politics and policy of the numerous bills of interest to the City.

STATE BUDGET UPDATE:

With regards to the budget and budget trailer legislation, on Monday, May 14, the Governor released his May Revise of the January budget. After the release, TPA participated on several conference calls with members of the Governor's Office, Department of Finance and other state agencies. Below is a brief summary of some areas of interest compiled based on the May Revise and the various conference calls.

The revised budget proposes \$104 billion general fund spending for the 2007/08 fiscal year, this is up 1.6% from last year's budget. When all funds are included, the May Revise sets the state's total expenditures at \$145.9 billion. Included in these expenditures, the Administration proposes a general fund reserve of \$2.2 billion. The May Revise proposes an additional \$900 million in spending above the January budget, which was surprising since many believed that the slumping housing market would require additional cuts from the original proposed budget. With the release of the May Revise the Governor is now backing off of claims that this budget will eliminate the structural deficit, instead he indicates that there will be a structural deficit of approximately \$1.4 billion next year.

Infrastructure Bond Implementation

For the most part, the May Revise did not significantly alter the availability of infrastructure bond funds that were set forth in January by the Governor. The one exception is with the transportation funds included in Proposition 1B. The major changes to the Governor's January budget include an accelerated funding schedule for the Corridor Mobility and Highway 99 programs. Additional funds have also been proposed for the State Transportation Improvement Program and school bus retrofitting. The May Revise also includes \$111 million from Prop 1B for the Air Resources Board to

improve air quality on the State's transportation and goods movement corridors. Additional funding, approximately \$178 million, will be allocated from Prop 1B to improve security at the state's ports. In total, the May Revise proposes to appropriate \$11.5 billion from Prop 1B over the next three budget years.

Local Government

The May Revise didn't result in many changes for local government. However, one major change is the Administration's proposal to eliminate the State subsidy of the Williamson Act. While the Governor does not propose to eliminate the Williamson Act in its entirety, the revised budget projects a \$40 million savings to the State by removing the state's financial obligation to the Act. The removal of this subsidy will likely receive much attention from the minority caucuses of the Legislature as majority of Williamson Act landowners reside in their districts.

Another of the Governor's proposals in the May Revise that will garner a lot of attention is his proposal to fund the \$200 million Home-to-School Transportation program with funds transferred from the Prop 42 Public Transportation Account. Traditionally, the transportation program is funding by using Prop 98 funds, not funds generated from the State's gas tax. The majority caucuses in the Legislature will likely oppose this shift for two reasons: it reduces the Prop 98 baseline funding for future years; and it takes money away from public transportation. The good news is the increasing gas prices in California have resulted in higher than anticipated general fund spillover revenues from the state's gas tax. The May Revise anticipates spillover revenues of \$617 million and Department of Finance officials believe that this could increase to over \$900 million in fiscal year 2008/09.

Gang Funding

The May Revise contains new funding for local governments' anti-gang efforts, which is direct follow-up from the Governor's meeting earlier this year with the Mayors and police chiefs of several of California's most populous cities. The proposed budget includes \$3.3 million for three proposed anti-gang task forces to be established in Los Angeles, the Bay Area, and the Inland Empire. While the details of these task forces still needs to be worked out by the administration, the goal is that the task forces will work supplement the efforts of local law enforcement to combat gang problems in these areas. Additionally, the proposed budget contains \$5.5 million grant to create a Threat Assessment Center within the Department of Homeland Security to help collect, analyze and disseminate information about gangs.

Education (K-12)

The Governor's May Revise proposes to fully fund Proposition 98 at a level of \$57.6 billion or \$8,681 per student. This represents a \$900 million increase in Proposition 98 funds from the Governor's initial January budget. The total spending per pupil in the May Revise including state funds is \$11,562.

The May Revise reflects the Governor's philosophy that students should be prepared for either higher education or the world of work. To that end, the Governor has proposed additional funding for expanding career technical education and teachers to ensure that students are ready to enter the workforce. This budget proposes \$25 million for career technical education counselors as well as a grant program for high schools with the highest need based on enrollment in CTE courses and other factors. The grants would be a minimum of \$45,000 per high school. Additionally, the May Revise proposes a one-time expenditure of \$100 million for career technical education equipment.

One of the major sources of contention between the Legislature and the Governor will be with the proposal to transfer \$627 million to the Home-to-School Transportation program from the Public Transportation Account. In addition to moving this funding away from public transportation groups will object that this funding is being shifted away from Prop 98, thus reducing the Prop 98 baseline in future years.

Higher Education

The Governor's May Revises maintains funding levels for University of California and California State University systems in line with the Higher Education Compact (\$346 million). Funding for community colleges is proposed to be 5.7% above current year amounts; however, this is lower than the 6.4% increase that was contained in the Governor's January budget. The Governor proposes one-time Prop 98 funds for community colleges totaling \$100 million. These funds would be enacted through trailer bill legislation. The Governor proposes that \$50 million of the one-time funds go towards the purchase career technical education equipment and the other \$50 million for grants to colleges for nursing programs. The Governor's revised budget also proposes an \$80 million reduction in apportionments to reflect excess current year and prior year growth funding.

Projections

The May Revise contains revenue and savings projections which will result in general fund savings of nearly \$5 billion. If these projections do not materialize, it is likely that additional cuts in the budget will be needed. Below are some of the revenue/savings projections included in the May Revise:

- Sale of public resources, specifically, EdFund. The May Revise proposes that the State sell EdFund, a quasi governmental entity that guarantees student loans in California as well as other states. The Governor believes that EdFund can be sold on the open market and the state can expect one-time general fund revenue of \$1 billion.
- The May Revise also anticipates significant general fund savings by not providing a cost of living adjustment for SSI/SSP recipients. The Administration anticipates a general fund savings of \$185 million by suspending this COLA. The majority caucuses in the Legislature will likely oppose eliminating this COLA.
- The May Revise also anticipates \$350 million in revenue to the general fund from Gaming Compacts. At this point, no new gaming compacts have been ratified by the Legislature.
- The May Revise proposes one-time shift of certain special fund dollars to the general fund, thus resulting in additional general fund revenue. These shifts include \$600 million from the Tobacco Settlement and \$200 million from the gas tax spillover.

Budget Schedule Preview:

- June 15th Constitutional deadline for passing the budget.
- July 1st First day of fiscal year 2007/08

DEVELOPMENT OF LEGISLATION:

Public safety:

- 1. **Sideshows:** SB 67 passed out of the Senate on a 36-0 vote on April 16th. This is well ahead of the deadline for bills to pass out of the house of origin. We are now working with the Assembly Public Safety committee and the Speaker's office to ensure that the bill is in a form that will pass through the Assembly as quick as possible. It is anticipated that the bill will be heard in Assembly Public Safety committee in early June and is in position to be signed by the Governor is July.
- Sexually-exploited minors: AB 499 (Swanson) has been held in the Assembly Public Safety committee and is now a two-year bill. We are working with committee staff, as well as the County, to craft language that is acceptable to the committee and other stakeholders. The bill will be held in committee until it is eligible to move in January 2008.
- 3. Power to prosecute misdemeanors: The city decided not to pursue a legislative solution for this issue. The City Attorney's office, and other stakeholders in the city, are working to develop a MOU with the County in order to prosecute certain misdemeanor offenses. We have spoken to several members of the Legislature about this issue and are prepared to introduce legislation next year, if necessary.
- 4. Nuisance Liquor Stores: AB 960 was introduced by Assemblywoman Hancock to address the issue of problem liquor stores. The bill was held in the Assembly Governmental Organization committee after a hearing on April 25th. The committee has requested the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control to submit a report by August on problem liquor stores and revocation of liquor licenses in areas of over concentration. The City Attorney's office has provided a list of questions to Assemblywoman Hancock's office to be included in the request of ABC. The committee anticipates that once ABC has submitted the report to the committee that there will be an informational hearing on the report. This hearing will likely be held in Oakland sometime in October.

Restorative Justice:

5. Support for parolees: AB 508 (Swanson) has passed out of the Assembly Appropriations committee and is currently on the Assembly Floor. The bill is eligible to be voted on by the entire Assembly and will likely be taken up by the end of May. Once the bill is in the Senate we will be discussing the measure with the members of the Senate Human Services committee to ensure passage.

Additional Social, Economic, and Political Justice Priorities:

- 6. Universal Healthcare: AB 516 (Swanson) was heard in the Assembly Appropriations committee on May 16th. The bill was moved the Appropriations suspense file due to the cost associated with the measure, which was slightly above the suspense file threshold of \$150,000. We are currently working with Assembly Appropriations committee staff to ensure that the measure will pass off of the suspense file on May 31st. Additionally, we are engage in discussions with the author to amend the bill to include a healthcare access pilot program for the City.
- 7. Anti-Predatory Lending: The City is currently not sponsoring a measure to deal with anti-predatory lending. We have engaged Assemblyman Ted Lieu on a bill he is authoring, AB 1502, which would promote financial institutions to establish branches and services with a demonstrated need for mainstream financial services. Additionally, we continue to dialogue with several members, including Assemblymembers Hayashi and Ma, about the possibility of introducing legislation in the current session to allow cities the power to enact anti-predator lending ordinances that are stronger than state law.

FUNDING PRIORITIES:

There are three updates on funding opportunities of interest to the City of Oakland pertaining to Proposition 1B congestion relief funding, housing funding, and Proposition 40 cultural and historic resources funding.

- Proposition 1B Corridor Mobility Improvement Act (CMIA) Funding: On the first round of funding from Proposition 1B, the \$4.5 billion Corridor Mobility Improvement Act funding, though the City of Oakland could not be a recipient as the funding was routed to regional transportation agencies, we worked closely with the City of Oakland in advocating with the MTC and AC-CMA to secure funding for regional projects that would benefit the City. In the final allocation of funding, Northern California received \$1.8 billion, of which the Bay Area received \$1.28 billion (not \$1.5 million as in the e-mail below), of which Alameda County including Oakland received \$400 million, by far the most successful showing for a region when compared to the share that we would get based on population and the initial staff recommendations, which had the Bay Area, for example, receiving only \$600 million.
- Emergency Housing and Assistance Program Capital Development (EHAPCD) Deferred Loan Application: We have received confirmation from the Department of Housing and Community Development that the EHAPCD application for \$999,999 submitted by the City of Oakland for the Henry Robinson Multi-Service Center is on the staff recommendation list. The 14-member EHAPCD application review committee will meet on May 31st to review the list of projects. In the past, the board has had a 95% approval rate based on staff recommendations. We are working with HCD staff and will reach out to our contacts on the board to advocate in support of the application.
- Proposition 40 funded California Cultural & Historical Endowment (CCHE): The City submitted an application for \$1.85 million for the Peralta House in Division 4 of Round 3 of the CCHE grant program. The Redevelopment Agency submitted an application for \$2.4 million for the Oakland Fox Theater in Division 4 of Round 3 of the CCHE grant program. In addition to these two City-sponsored projects, Planning Grant applications were submitted by the Oakland Zoo and the 16th Street Train Station Project for \$300,000 each in Divisions 3 and 1 respectively of the CCHE Round 3 grant program. A project application associated with Oakland Technical High School was also submitted. Before knowing what projects could be funded, we must wait for staff recommendations, which will be released in mid-July. Final funding decisions will be made by the Board of the CCHE on August 22-23 in Sacramento.

We continue to work with City staff on developing a comprehensive and coordinated list of projects and potential funding opportunities.
