Dear City Leaders and Staff: Thank you for everything you are doing to keep our City functioning through budget cuts and transitions of leadership. Like you, I love Oakland, And when my community is suffering with the impacts of crime, homelessness and systemic harm, my instinct is to step up and do everything I can to serve. I am grateful for the opportunity to apply to become a commissioner on the new Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission (OPSPOC). As the former Vice Chair of the Safety and Services Oversight Commission (SSOC) and an attorney with expertise in criminal justice. I believe I have the skills needed to ensure that the OPSPOC fulfills its critical mission. Serving on the SSOC for three years taught me a lot. It taught me how making a commission successful requires a lot more than just attending monthly meetings, reading staff reports and asking good questions at meetings. It requires developing a strategic plan for how the commission will effectuate the purpose of the enabling legislation, setting goals and tracking progress toward those goals monthly. It requires holding meetings in the community, not just in City Hall, to let the public know what the commission is doing and to solicit feedback. Transparency and accountability are key, especially right now when there is a fair amount of distrust of city processes. On the SSOC, Chair Omar Farmer and I fully transformed the way the commission functioned. We tracked progress, we held community meetings, and we proposed ordinances to City Council. We turned the SSOC from a more passive commission to the active citizen oversight body that it was intended to be. At the end of the life of the commission in December 2024. I wrote and shared with City Council a comprehensive memorandum that summarized our lessons learned from 10 years of the SSOC (available at https://bit.ly/ssocmemo). Some of those lessons involved best practices for all commissions, others were recommendations to City Council for ordinances that would fulfill the purpose of Measure Z, and others yet were suggestions for the new OPSPOC body. If I am selected to serve on the OPSPOC, I would approach the work with the following three guiding principles: (1) Practice Transparency and Community Engagement: Include community input into the development of the Four-Year Community Violence Reduction Plan. While the expertise of the commissioners is key, the work of the commission will not be seen as legitimate unless we are able to effectively solicit and include ideas from community members and organizations. (2) Measure and Demonstrate Success: Ensure that the Violence Reduction Plan includes timelines and benchmarks by which we can measure success or failure. Retain an independent evaluator to annually evaluate the implementation of the Community Violence Reduction Plan, with the key question being — are the activities and strategies outlined in the plan effective in meeting the goals of the measure, i.e. is what we are doing leading to improvements in public safety? (3) Make Timely Policy Recommendations: Provide City Council with policy recommendations, not just once per year, but as often as necessary to implement the Violence Prevention Plan. Ensure that all recommendations are based on reliable evidence and data. I am an attorney, policy analyst and restorative justice circle keeper, committed to making Oakland more just and more safe for all. Most of my work over the last fifteen years relates directly to the mission of the OPSPOC to improve community safety. I spent nearly three years working as Assistant District Attorney at the San Francisco District Attorney's Office, implementing effective consequences and accountability measures for individuals who had committed crime and harm. I worked to expand access to Restorative Justice (RJ) diversion because RJ processes have been shown to not only improve victim satisfaction but also reduce recidivism and improve public safety. I appeared in Drug Court, Community Justice Court and other collaborative courts in San Francisco, Previously, I worked at the ACLU, Equal Justice Society, and clerked in federal court. I also served on the Oakland Reimagine Public Safety Task Force where I co-authored three of the twelve recommendations that the City Council voted to prioritize in 2021. Currently, I teach Restorative Justice Diversion at UC Berkeley School of Law, lead a new reentry project at Impact Justice, serve as associate member of the Alameda County Democratic Central Committee, and support many efforts to build community power and wellbeing. RESOLUTION CONFIRMING THE MAYOR'S APPOINTMENT OF BILLY DIXON, ERIC KARSSEBOOM, ROBERT NICHELINI, JULIA OWENS, AND YOANA TCHOUKLEVA AS MEMBERS OF THE OAKLAND PUBLIC SAFETY PLANNING AND OVERSIGHT COMMISSION

WHEREAS, Section 601 of the City Charter provides that members of City boards and commissions shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the affirmative vote of five members of the City Council; and

WHEREAS, on November 5, 2024, Oakland voters adopted the Oakland Community Violence Reduction and Emergency Response Act of 2024 (Measure NN) which mandated the creation of the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission to replace the Public Safety and Services Violence Prevention Oversight Commission; and

WHEREAS, Measure NN specified that the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission shall consist of five (5) members; at least one (1) member shall have lived experience with service-eligible populations, and one (1) member shall have professional law enforcement experience, preferably at a command officer level, and/or academic expertise in law enforcement; and

WHEREAS, on March 18, 2025, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 13838 C.M.S. to implement this requirement of Measure NN, establishing the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission, providing for the appointment of its members, and defining the duties and functions of the Commission; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 13838 C.M.S., provides that Commission members shall be appointed to overlapping terms of three (3) years beginning on March 1st of each year and ending on February 28th three years later. The Ordinance further provides that two (2) initial members will serve a three-year initial term, two (2) initial members will serve a two-year initial term, and one (1) initial member will serve a one-year initial term, to assure that terms overlap; and

WHEREAS, The Honorable Mayor Kevin Jenkins has appointed Billy Dixon, Eric Karsseboom, Robert Nichelini, Julia Owens, and Yoana Tchoukleva to serve on the Oakland

Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission subject to confirmation of the City Council; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council hereby confirms the Mayor's appointment of the following individuals to the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission as set forth below:

Billy Dixon, to serve a 2-year term on the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission beginning on April 15, 2025 and ending on February 28, 2027;

Eric Karsseboom, to serve a 3-year term on the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission beginning on April 15, 2025 and ending on February 28, 2028;

Robert Nichelini, to serve a 1-year term on the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission beginning on April 15, 2025 and ending on February 28, 2026;

Julia Owens, to serve a 3-year term on the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission beginning on April 15, 2025 and ending on February 28, 2028;

Yoana Tchoukleva, to serve a 2-year term on the Oakland Public Safety Planning and Oversight Commission beginning on April 15, 2025 and ending on February 28, 2027.
