A Progress Report On Caltrans Maintenance Activities in the City Of Oakland

SUMMARY

In December 2005, the City of Oakland and Caltrans signed a Letter of Understanding (LOU) that formalizes the structure for the ongoing relationship between the City and Caltrans in the maintenance of Caltrans properties. The LOU aims to maximize the clean-up activities by Caltrans within Oakland, while recognizing the limited public resources that are available. This progress report is the fourth and last semi-annual report provided for by the LOU, covering January through June 2007. Future reports will be annual reports, pursuant to the LOU.

Caltrans has complied with all of the tasks agreed to in the LOU, including:

- Meeting monthly and responding in a timely manner to issues brought to them
- Providing monthly maintenance records for all activities listed in the LOU

Highlights from Caltrans from January through June 2007 included:

- Response to the April 29, 2007 maze fire
- Long term solutions to on-going problems such as using steel fence that could not be cut or bent to deter illegal activity
- Support from the California Highway Patrol and Oakland Police Department
- Expedited graffiti removal.

FISCAL IMPACT

This is an informational progress report only; therefore there is no fiscal impact.

BACKGROUND

On December 21, 2005, as a result of the public nuisance action filed by the City, Caltrans signed a ten-year monitoring and maintenance commitment with the City of Oakland. As required under this LOU:

Public Works Committee

- Caltrans and Oakland established a joint working group to meet monthly to discuss, coordinate, prioritize and strategize Caltrans clean up activities in Oakland
- Caltrans submits monthly maintenance records of their work in Oakland
- The City and Caltrans submit a progress report on abatement activities in Oakland to the City Council
- Caltrans provided a comprehensive listing of all Caltrans properties in Oakland so that the information could be integrated into the City's computerized mapping system
- Lessees of Caltrans properties are being held accountable to the LOU.

From July through December of 2005, City and Caltrans representatives held informal monthly meetings to discuss projects of mutual interest. In January 2006, after the LOU was signed, this informal group became the Working Group established by the LOU. The Working Group has met monthly to encourage communication and coordinate abatement efforts of blighted conditions such as illegal dumping, litter, graffiti, overgrown vegetation and other fire and health safety hazards in the City. The monthly meetings are attended by representatives from Caltrans, the City's Public Works Agency, Police Department, Community and Economic Development Agency, and Fire Department who bring their lists of Caltrans issues to the table. The meetings include discussions of citizens' concerns regarding homeless encampments, litter, fire abatement and the appearance of their neighborhoods. All issues are discussed and a timetable for resolution by Caltrans is established. As a result of the LOU and Working Group, joint inspections and cleanups of various sites have been performed more quickly and on a more regular basis. Communication has greatly improved and Caltrans has become an active partner in cleaning up Oakland.

At each monthly meeting since the LOU was signed, Caltrans representatives have provided monthly reports, which include results for each abatement activity in the City:

- rights of way swept
- · overgrown vegetation removed
- graffiti removed
- illegal dumping removed
- signs installed, fencing installed or repaired
- homeless encampments removed
- · pavement project coordination and
- other cooperative or joint projects

The activities in Caltrans' reports include their regular activities, as well as responses to lists provided by City staff of locations that require attention regarding weeds, homeless encampments, high litter areas, potholes, and fence repair. A list of locations serviced by Caltrans is attached as Attachment A.

Blight issues such as homeless encampments have been abated in a timely manner. Caltrans has installed signs to deter the homeless from camping. Caltrans has taken immediate action to remove combustible material around parcels in the Wildfire Prevention Assessment District that were under direct threat of fire damage. Routine maintenance such as street sweeping, graffiti removal, fence repair, and litter removal has also been performed in a timely manner. In addition, Caltrans' Adopt-A-Highway program has 20 volunteer groups that pick up litter in Oakland. This has reduced complaints of unsightly trash along the freeway.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

At the May 9, 2006, Public Works Committee, City Council members directed staff to continue working with Caltrans to maintain cleaning frequencies and maintenance issues as described:

- 1. Property maintenance to be based on regular schedules and not strictly complaint driven. Caltrans maintenance schedule and service levels remain the same and are reflected in their monthly and semi-annual reports to Oakland (Attachment B). Their sweeping, trash removal and vegetation management are schedule driven. Graffiti removal, downed fences and illegal dumping are handled as they occur. Homeless encampments are now removed during the third week of each month. Caltrans also responds to complaints.
- 2. Service contract with the East Bay Conservation Corps (EBCC). There are six EBCC crews assigned to various projects. Two crews work in Alameda County.
- 3. Adopt-A-Highway Program. This remains an active program with 857 litter bags collected during this period.
- 4. Caltrans herbicide/pesticide. Spraying continues in medians and rights-of-way where there is no potential for public contact with herbicides.
- 5. Clarification on who is responsible for property around freeway ramps. Caltrans is generally responsible for removal of trash, litter and illegal dumping around freeway ramps. Freeway ramps at some point touch City rights-of-way so Caltrans and City crews coordinate on a case-by-case basis to clean up these locations.

Attachment B is Caltrans' Progress Report for January through June 2007. The report highlights the following accomplishments:

- Rights-of-way swept 926 miles
- Overgrown vegetation removed 75.5 acres pruned

- Graffiti removed 72,441 square feet cleaned
- Fencing repaired 1,908 linear feet
- Homeless encampment removal 184 sites cleared
- Adopt-A-Highway 857 litter bags

During the six months covered by this report, the Caltrans Working Group has resolved complaints from the public in the many categories covered above. The Working Group has also worked on long-term solutions to particularly stubborn issues by being innovative and experimenting with new ideas. Some of those ideas included using steel fencing that could not be cut or bent to prevent illegal activity. A monthly schedule for homeless encampment removal was given to the group along with support from the California Highway Patrol and the Oakland Police Department. Graffiti was cleaned on an expedited schedule to remove tags quickly from high impact areas to lessen competition from other taggers.

On April 29, 2007, when the maze fire took place, Caltrans worked closely with the City during the crisis. Caltrans was supported by Oakland Fire, Police, Public Works, and other agencies and departments to ensure the safety of the traveling public around the damaged site. The repair of both structures was given high priority to be opened in short order and the goal was accomplished.

Staff believes that Caltrans continues to demonstrate its commitment to work collaboratively with the City by not only responding to and abating blight throughout Oakland in a timely manner but also by partnering and problem solving on other projects of mutual interest.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

<u>Economic</u>: The involvement of Caltrans staff in litter and debris removal and beautification will improve the physical appearance of the City of Oakland and will help stimulate economic growth, retain business, and promote civic pride.

<u>Environmental</u>: Removal of dumped materials and litter will reduce the amount of debris that enters the storm drain system, lessening pollution of our creeks and waterways.

<u>Social Equity</u>: Enhancement of communication and coordination between the City and Caltrans will improve the appearance of the City and enhance the overall living conditions and safety of all Oakland residents.

DISABILITY AND SENIOR CITIZEN ACCESS

The decreased amount of litter and increased beautification will improve the quality of life and safety for the disabled and senior citizens.

PROGRESS REPORT January 1, 2007 – June 30, 2007

This Progress Report is a summary of "Attachment A" reports that have been submitted for review at the monthly meetings with the City of Oakland, Public Works Department. This is the final semi-annual report as required by the Letter of Understanding between the State of California, Department of Transportation and the City of Oakland, Public Works Department.

During the past six months, the "working group" has resolved complaints from the public in numerous categories such as litter, graffiti and homeless. They have also worked on solutions to deter these activities by being innovative and experimenting with new ideas. Some of those ideas included using a steel fence that could not be cut or bent to prevent homeless activity. A monthly schedule for homeless removal was given to the "group" along with support from the California Highway Patrol and Oakland Police Department. Graffiti cleaning and removal was expedited in order to prevent similar copycat activities.

The Department worked cooperatively with the City of Oakland during the maze fire of April 29, 2007. This included support from Oakland Fire department, Oakland Police Department, City Administration and many other departments to ensure the safety of the traveling public around the crash site. The repair of both structures was given high priority and was completed in a short time, while using city streets to detour freeway traffic.
