Projected \$8.22 million Deficit in the General Purpose Fund.

An Ordinance Amending Ordinance Number 12880 C.M.S. (Master Fee Schedule), as Amended, to Establish, Modify, and Delete Fees Assessed by the

Office of Parks and Recreation.

#### **SUMMARY**

At its March 31<sup>st</sup> meeting, the City Council reviewed balancing measures proposed to address the projected \$8.22 million deficit in the General Purpose Fund (GPF) with the following results:

- Council adopted the resolution authorizing specific balancing items (see revised Exhibit A).
- The Council voted to approve lap swimming fee increases, however, this item must return to Council because the fee increases proposed by Council during the March 31<sup>st</sup> meeting are greater than the amounts noticed on the agenda.
- The Council set aside for a separate motion (1) parking fee increases at parks and (2) reduction in library operations and maintenance spending, however took no action.

Staff is re-introducing the legislation with amendments to Ordinance Number 12880 C.M.S. (Master Fee Schedule) to increase Parks and Recreation fees, per Council direction.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The Master Fee Schedule increases would generate \$0.01 million in General Purpose Fund revenue through June 30, 2009, and \$0.03 million on an annual basis.

#### KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

# A. Balancing Plan to address FY 2008-09 projected GPF shortfall

On March 31, 2009, the City Council reviewed and adopted balancing measures to address the projected year-end deficit of \$8.22 million in the General Purpose Fund.

The items that were approved on March 31, 2009 include:

- Deferred spending on specific citywide projects (\$4.21 million);
- Elimination of vacant positions (\$0.22 million);
- Pool fee increases by Parks and Recreation (\$0.01 million); and
- Miscellaneous departmental savings (\$3.69 million)

The following items were specifically **not approved** for implementation of the balancing measures:

- Suspending auto allowances for unrepresented non-sworn staff positions (\$0.01 million);
- Elimination of filled / linked positions (\$0.14 million)

Items not addressed by the City Council on March 31, 2009 include:

- Parking fee increase in Lakeside Park (\$0.02 million); and
- Library operations and maintenance reduction (\$0.02 million).

Revised Exhibit A represents the final balancing measures adopted by the City Council on March 31, 2009.

### B. Ordinance Amending Master Fee Schedule for Office of Parks and Recreation Fees.

The Master Fee Schedule (MFS) changes that would be approved through the attached ordinance are summarized below and in <u>Exhibit B</u>. The revenue increases, totaling \$0.01 million, are already reflected in the "Parks and Recreation" section in the revised Exhibit A.

#### 1. Office of Parks and Recreation

- The Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR) is increasing certain MFS fees and adding a new fee. Additionally, OPR proposes a change to the language of an existing fee description. Specifically:
  - a. Aquatics, Swimming Pools
    - i. Adult Lap Swim Fee: Increase from \$3 to \$5 (per Council direction)
    - ii. Senior/Disabled Lap Swim Fee: Increase from \$2.25 to \$3.00
    - iii. Adult Lap Swim Pass Book (10): Increase from \$27.50 to \$40.00 (per Council direction)
    - iv. Senior Lap Pass Book (10): Increase from \$17.50 to \$21.00

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NUMBER 12880 C.M.S. (MASTER FEE SCHEDULE), AS AMENDED, TO ESTABLISH, MODIFY AND DELETE FEES ASSESSED BY THE OFFICE OF PARKS AND RECREATION

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland periodically updates its Master Fee Schedule to account for general cost of living increases and program changes or other costs; and

WHEREAS, the fee modifications and additions proposed herein have been justified by the respective agency and are identified in an "Agenda Report" dated March 31, 2009 to Dan Lindheim, City Administrator, entitled "An Ordinance Amending Ordinance Number 12880 C.M.S. (Master Fee Schedule), as Amended, to Establish, Modify, and Delete Fees Assessed by the Office of Parks and Recreation"; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines that the herein-referenced modifications and additions are necessary to reimburse the City for the costs of performing the various municipal and regulatory functions; now, therefore

#### THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OAKLAND DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Master Fee Schedule as set forth in Ordinance Number 12880 C.M.S., as amended, is hereby amended to modify and establish fees assessed by the Office of Parks and Recreation and as set forth in Exhibit B, attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage as provided by Section 216 of the City Charter, if adopted by at least six members of Council, or upon the seventh day after final adoption if adopted by fewer votes.
