ORDINANCE AMENDING OAKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 2, CHAPTER 2.04, ARTICLE 2.04.160, EXPENDITURES FROM RESTRICTED GIFT PROCEEDS, TO DELEGATE LIMITED AUTHORITY TO THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO, WITHOUT CITY COUNCIL ACTION, ACCEPT GIFTS AND DONATIONS AND TO APPROPRIATE AND EXPEND MONIES DERIVED FROM GIFTS AND DONATIONS, AND REPEALING OAKLAND MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE NO. 8144 C.M.S., ADOPTED JUNE 9, 1970, WHICH CONTAINS CONFLICTING AND OBSOLETE PROVISIONS; AND

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR, ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF OAKLAND, TO ACCEPT AND APPROPRIATE UNRESTRICTED GRANTS WITH A MARKET OR MONETARY VALUE OF TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00) OR LESS, AND RESTRICTED GRANTS WITH A MARKET OR MONETARY VALUE OF FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000.00) OR LESS, WITHOUT PRIOR COUNCIL APPROVAL

Dear Chairperson Quan and Committee Members:

### **SUMMARY**

This report recommends City Council authorize the City Administrator, on behalf of the City of Oakland, to accept and appropriate the proceeds of unrestricted gifts and grants of \$25,000 or less and restricted gifts and grants of \$50,000 or less, without prior Council approval. This will reduce an administrative burden and enable City departments to more easily accept and use these gifts and grants.

Gifts refer to real property, personal property and funds contributed to the City (including "donations"). Grants refer to funds from any outside source resulting from an application or

Under current City policy, Council approves and accepts *restricted* gifts by resolution before the proceeds are available for expenditure (Section 2.04.160, Ordinance 7937 CMS, as amended, October 4, 1973). Ordinance 8144 CMS (June 9, 1970) allows the City Administrator and certain department directors to accept *unrestricted* gifts, but Council approval is required to appropriate the proceeds.

Council approves gifts and grants through the City budget process and as gift and grant opportunities arise during the year. The agenda report process for approval to accept and appropriate gifts and grants adds 6 to 8 weeks before any funds, even very small amounts, are available for expenditure. Revision of current policies and requirements for accepting and appropriating small restricted gifts and grants is warranted, such that funding can be put to timely programmatic use in service to the public; a streamlined process will support staff efforts to seek gifts and grants and also encourage gift-making by reducing the amount of "red tape" associated with acceptance and authorization to expend such funds or resources.

Certain grants and gifts *would not* fall under this new approval authority and would continue to require Council approval. These would include:

- Gifts and grants for programs and projects (e.g., capital improvement or maintenance) not yet approved by City Council in the biennial or midcycle operating or Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget or by City Council legislation during the fiscal year; and
- Gifts and grants with conditions or requirements that will create unbudgeted costs for the City now or in the future. Examples include operation and maintenance (O&M); matching funds; overhead; and potential liability to the City; and
- Grants where the granting agency requires specific approval by the legislative body.

Expenditures from the gifts and grants would continue to be made in accordance with the City's Purchasing Ordinance.

### FISCAL IMPACT

Approval of the ordinance and the resolution will result in savings of time and resources for staff and Council, but will have no direct fiscal impact.

Based on the reported FY 2004-05 figures in Attachment A, the City received approximately 195 restricted gifts and grants up to \$50,000 each annually (totaling \$886,101) and 14 restricted gifts and grants that were between \$50,000 - \$100,000 each annually (totaling \$1,070,808) for an annual FY2004-05 grand total of \$1,956,909 or 0.22% of the FY 2004-05 Midcycle Adopted

Budget of \$900,981,567.

Funds received through gifts and grants would continue to be deposited in the City Treasury. Current administrative procedures would be revised to guide Agencies / Departments in documenting and reporting the receipt and expenditure or use of the gifts and grant revenues. The City Administrator's Budget Office will provide monitoring and oversight, and prepare an annual informational report to Council on all gifts and grants received during the previous fiscal year.

#### BACKGROUND

#### **Current Policies**

The following City policies defining roles, authority and limits for accepting gifts are currently in place. The proposed actions would amend Ordinance 8884 C.M.S (OMC Section 2.04.160) and delete Ordinance 8144 C.M.S listed below:

- Oakland Charter Article XII, Section 1203. *Gifts and Trusts*. The Council shall have the power to accept gifts and trusts in behalf of the City and to control, manage, dispose of and otherwise administer the same in accordance with their terms. (November 1988)
- Oakland Charter Article VIII, Section 806. Receipts and Expenditures. All monies received by the City shall be deposited in the City Treasury, and no monies shall be disbursed from the treasury without the approval of the City Administrator or of another officer duly authorized by him/her. No expenditure of City funds shall be made except for the purposes and in the manner specified by an appropriation of the Council....(Amended by: Stats. November 1988 and March 2004)
- Ordinance 8144 C.M.S Council authorized the City Manager to accept for the City gifts and
  donations that are unrestricted as to use of the City of Oakland or for the unrestricted use by a
  designated department or facility of the City but not involving construction on public
  property. Similarly, the Directors of Museum, Parks and Recreation and Library were
  authorized to accept unrestricted gifts and donations for use of the respective department or
  its facility, but not involving construction on public property. (June 9, 1970)
- 2.04.160 OMC Expenditures from Restricted Gift Proceeds. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this article, the City Manager is authorized to expend monies derived from gifts and donations to the City in accordance with any special conditions of the donor attached to said gifts and donations when the gift with the special conditions has been approved and accepted by the City Council by resolution. (Ordinance 8884 C.M.S., October 4, 1973)

City Administrative Instruction 1015 (Donated Revenues) (October 1, 1977), sets forth rules for accepting, depositing, appropriating and authorizing expenditure of donated revenues (and refund of unused balances). Donated revenues include cash, checks, money orders, bank drafts and all other forms of negotiable securities. The AI provides that the City Manager may accept contributed revenues of up to \$1,000; the City Manager may receive contributions of \$1,000 or more for formal acceptance by City Council resolution; the Finance Director may accept less than \$500; the Museum, OPR, & Library Directors may accept unrestricted gifts and donations, but not involving construction on public property; and that Department Heads may receive, not officially accept, donated revenues on behalf of City, except when specifically authorized.

The AI directs that donated revenues, if under \$100 or if unrestricted, must be deposited in the General Fund. Restricted revenues must be approved and accepted by City Council. All revenues which are donated and accepted require appropriation by Council before they are available for expenditure. All must be deposited in the City Treasury. Other AIs instruct City staff on grant application procedures and establishing grant awards in the City's accounting system for fiscal monitoring, control and accountability.

#### KEY ISSUES AND IMPACTS

### Current Practice

Staff use three principal methods to obtain Council approval for acceptance and appropriation of proceeds from restricted gifts and grants for expenditure:

Appropriation through Council budget adoption or amendment. If staff is certain that a specific gift or grant will be received, the Agency / Department will obtain Council approval to accept and appropriate grants and gifts during the budget adoption process (using projected revenue levels which can be revised when the actual gift or grant is received).

Appropriation through Council Resolution for each grant or gift (not already appropriated through budget adoption or amendment). For unanticipated grants and gifts, Agencies / Departments prepare a Council report and resolution to request Council approval as grant opportunities arise or as gifts are received. Over the course of a year, the City often receives offers of gifts and grants to support specific on-going City programs. Many are of small dollar amounts and would have the greatest service benefit to the public if they could be put to timely program use.

Appropriation through "blanket" Council Resolution authorizing application for, acceptance and appropriation of up to an approved ceiling amount. In recent years, Agencies / Departments have requested and Council has approved a number of annual "blanket resolutions" to accept and appropriate funds up to a certain amount for specific Council approved programs. These are typically time-saving measures to facilitate solicitation and acceptance of outside gifts and grant revenues for on-going support of Council approved programs. Recent examples include:

- Resolution 77526 C.M.S., authorizing the City Manager to Accept Donations on Behalf of the City of Oakland Hunger Program (November 12, 2002). The estimated annual donation total was projected to be \$50,000;
- Resolution 78717 C.M.S., authorizing the City Administrator, on behalf of the City of Oakland, to accept donations up to \$5,000 and grants up to \$20,000 on behalf of the Oakland Youth Commission without further Council approval of these future donations and grants (July 20, 2004);
- Resolution 79058 C.M.S., authorizing the City Administrator to apply for, accept and appropriate grant funds and contributions from private foundations and corporations on behalf of the Oakland Workforce Investment Board to fund the Mayor's Summer Jobs Program (projected annual minimum of \$73,000 in private contributions)(February 15, 2005); and
- Resolution 79187 C.M.S., authorizing the City Administrator to accept donations or grants on behalf of the Neighborhood Crime Prevention Councils (NCPCs) of up to \$10,000 per NCPC without further City Council approval. (May 3, 2005)

It is the City's policy to encourage staff to seek and find external resources to leverage local resources. Oakland's fiscal outlook underscores the need and desire for City staff to seek outside funding opportunities through public and private grants and gifts (cash and non-cash) to supplement City funded programs and cover the cost of unfunded programs. Under current policy, staff may receive small amounts of revenue but may <u>not</u> expend funds for programming without Council appropriation by resolution. The existing approval process reduces the maximum potential benefit of donated or granted revenue, and is particularly inefficient when the gift or grant is a small amount or will fill an immediate, time-sensitive need.

The City wants to encourage soliciting / obtaining funds and resources for Council approved programs, especially since *contributions to the City for public purposes* are tax deductible. The City Attorney's Office memorandum (dated December 29, 1999) regarding Tax Exempt Contributions to City is Attachment B and explains the allowances and limitations under State and Federal law. In the interest of furthering the City's ability to secure additional and new gifts and grants, it is important to reasonably revise policy and practice to reduce or eliminate barriers to acceptance and use of the proceeds.

### Characteristics of Gift and Grant Revenues Received

Value of Gifts and Grants: City Agencies and Departments were surveyed informally to report the number and types of grants and gifts under \$100,000 received in a given year, using FY 2004-05 for illustration purposes. Police Department (OPD), Fire Department (OFD), Library Services (OPL), Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR), Department of Human Services (DHS),

Public Works Agency (PWA), the Community and Economic Development Agency (CEDA) and the City Administrator's Office (Neighborhood Crime Prevention) reported receiving donated and granted cash revenues and non-cash gifts that are valued under \$100,000. Grouped results are listed below (line details are provided in Attachment A). The vast majority (173) of the gifts and grants were valued under \$15,000; of that, 153 were under \$5,000.

Donor or Grantor Conditions or Restrictions: All of the reported gifts and grant awards had conditions or restrictions attached. Donor or grantor restrictions typically stipulated that funds be used for specific program or program types, and/or the types of commodities or services. Government grant sources such as State Department of Forestry, Department of Justice, and Area Agency on Aging required specific match amounts or percentages and special reporting.

Programs / Projects Funded: The gifts and grants were given to support Council approved programs, including Branch Libraries, adult literacy, library teen services, Feather River Camp, Lake Merritt Boating Program, Aquatics program, Recreation Centers and science programs, Sports Program, Earth Day, African-American Library and Museum at Oakland (AAMLO), Even Start, Head Start Mentor Program, Senior Volunteer Services, Mayor's Summer Jobs Program, Senior Centers, Head Start-Violence Prevention, PASS! after school program, antigang education, tobacco control, Neighborhood Crime Prevention Council (NCPC), Police Canine (K-9) Unit, emergency services preparation, Citizens of Oakland Respond to Emergencies (CORE), tree planting, Multipurpose Senior Services Program, Hunger Program, Temporary Winter Shelter Program, and others.

A few gifts or grants of up to \$100,000 were made to the City for construction of public improvements. Examples include private donations through the Friends of Oakland Parks and Recreation of over \$26,000 for restoration of the borax mule statues at F.M. Smith Recreation Center and \$48,000 for Peralta Hacienda Historical Park improvement; donation of \$6,549 and \$41,059 in design services, materials and labor for the reconstruction of the Lake Merritt Dock at 17<sup>th</sup> Street; gift- in-place donations by Affordable Housing Associates valued at \$5,844 for benches and landscaping at 11<sup>th</sup> & Oak; donation by North Oakland Little League for \$30,000 in materials and labor for a sod infield at Caldecott Field; Oakland A's \$100,000 contribution for improvements to the Bambino Baseball Field at Greenman Field Complex; Hedco Foundation grant of \$85,732 for Library Children's Room Renovation; Gallagher and Burke grading services valued at \$11,000 for Joaquin Miller Playground; contribution of \$45,000 from the Friends of Rockridge Greenbelt for new swings, benches, and other improvements of the Rockridge Greenbelt; \$15,843 State of California grant for tree planting; and small donations (under \$1,000) for minor park improvements such as plants, kiosks, signage and benches.

Cash / Non-Cash Gifts or Grants: Cash received for donor or grantor-stipulated programs were used to purchase books, program equipment, games and supplies, health promotion kits, transportation services for field trips and programs, stipends/wages for youth employment, scholarships for youth who could not afford program costs, and for incidental program support costs such as printing and duplicating services.

Non-cash gifts or grants took the form of child car seats, food, books (particularly to Library Department), clothing, water, instructional materials, furniture, computers, school supplies and backpacks and equipment.

### POLICY DESCRIPTION

### Proposed Policy and Procedure Changes

Staff explored options to facilitate receiving and appropriating gifts and grants not included in the adopted biennial or midcycle budget, and limits and controls to set for financial and performance accountability. Two options appear feasible, though Option 1 is preferred by staff, for ease of implementation.

Option 1: Authorize the City Administrator, on behalf of the City, to accept and appropriate monies or proceeds derived from gifts and grants to the City in accordance with any special conditions of the donor without prior Council approval, up to a dollar limit set by Council.

A dollar value ceiling would be set at a *not to exceed amount* per gift or grant for Council approved programs. Based on the reported frequency and value levels of gifts and grants, staff proposes establishing a not-to-exceed amount of \$25,000 per unrestricted gift or grant and a not-to-exceed amount of \$50,000 per non-discretionary, restricted gift or grant award. An incremental contribution or grant from a single source for the same program which results in a total that exceeds the set authority limit would be forwarded to City Council for approval. Exceptions or conditions would be established that would automatically trigger the requirement for Council review and approval, including:

- Gifts and grants for programs or capital (improvement or maintenance) projects not yet approved by Council in the biennial or midcycle operating or Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget or by City Council legislation during the fiscal year;
- Gifts, donations and grants with attached conditions that add unbudgeted cost to City now or in the future. Examples include operations and maintenance (O&M); matching funds; overhead; potential liability to the City; and
- Grants where the granting agency requires specific approval by the legislative body.

Agencies / Departments would request City Administrator approval for acceptance and appropriation of gifts and grants up to the authority limit. The City Administrator would review the request for approval. If any of the above exceptions apply, the City Administrator would automatically require the requesting Agency/Department to submit an agenda report and resolution for City Council review and approval.

Current finance and administrative procedures would be revised to guide Agencies / Departments in documenting, monitoring and reporting the receipt and expenditure/use of the donations or grant revenues. Funds would continue to be deposited in the City Treasury. Expenditures would continue to be made in accordance with the City's Purchasing Ordinance.

Activities would be monitored to ensure internal coordination on funding solicitations. Council would be kept apprised of the funds and non-cash donations received and spent/used. The City Administrator's Budget Office would annually submit a special report to Council on funds received, sources, and expenditure amounts in the prior fiscal year. Agencies / Departments would describe the programs services, expenditures, users and results in a matrix format.

There are many advantages to this option. Funds or non-cash gifts would be put to their intended use in a more timely fashion. This affords greater flexibility for staff to pursue funding opportunities as they arise. Staff could also develop funding strategies that "market" and capitalize on the tax-exemption benefit to donors who contribute for public purposes, and demonstrate the City's ability to put the donated revenues to expeditious use for approved programs.

Option 2: Encourage Departments/Agencies to develop annual "blanket resolutions" for acceptance, approval, and appropriation of funds up to a certain amount for specific Council approved programs, similar to those done by the Youth Commission, Mayor's Summer Jobs Program, Hunger Program, and Neighborhood Crime Prevention Councils (NCPC). This approach facilitates soliciting and securing outside funding and contributions to support Council sanctioned programs.

The key advantage to this approach is it provides Council an opportunity to review in advance which programs are proposed for fundraising. Its main disadvantages are that approvals are granted case by case, with varying authority levels, conditions set, and reporting requirements, and still involve a 6 to 8 week agenda process.

### ACTION REQUESTED OF COUNCIL

Option 1 will require amending Section 2.04.160 OMC (Purchasing Ordinance) to delegate limited authority to the City Administrator to accept, appropriate and expend **gifts**, without City Council action, and require deletion of Ordinance 8144 C.M.S. to eliminate conflicting and obsolete provisions regarding receipt/acceptance of unrestricted gifts. Option 1 will also require a resolution establishing limited authority for the City Administrator to accept and appropriate

**grant** funds without prior Council approval. Expenditure of the funds would be in accordance with the City's Purchasing Ordinance.

I request that the City Council approve an ordinance and a resolution authorizing the City Administrator, on behalf of the City of Oakland, to accept, appropriate and expend the proceeds of unrestricted gifts and grants of \$25,000 or less, and restricted gifts and grants of \$50,000 or less, without prior Council approval.

### **Executive Summary**

You have asked us to whether contributions, including grants, to the City of Oakland may be tax deductible. The City of Oakland is a charitable organization for both state and federal tax purposes if the donation is made for public purposes.

Contributions to the City of Oakland may be tax deductible, subject to the limitations of federal and state law applicable to the donating party. While we cannot advise the donating party on its tax liabilities, the two primary rules are:

- 1. Donations to the City are tax deductible for federal purposes, with a cap of fifty percent of adjusted income ("contribution base").
- 2. Donations to the City are tax deductible for State purposes

#### Discussion

### Federal Law:

Internal Revenue Code (Title 26 of the United States Code, "IRC") section 170 provides, in relevant part:

- (a) Allowance of deductions.---
  - (1) General rule.--- There shall be allowed as a deduction any charitable contribution ... payment of which is made within the taxable year. A charitable contribution shall be allowable as a deduction only if verified under regulations prescribed by the Secretary.

- (b) Percentage limitations.—
  - (1) Individuals.—In the case of an individual, the deduction provided in section (a) shall be limited as provided in the succeeding subparagraphs:
- (A) General rule.-- Any charitable contribution to---
  - (v) a governmental unit referred to in subsection (c)(1)<sup>1</sup>

shall be allowed to the extent that the aggregate of such contributions does not exceed 50 percent of the taxpayer's contribution base for the taxable year.

Under these rules, an entity may donate a portion of its income to the City; however, to the extent that such donation exceeds 50% of the "contribution tax base" no deduction will be allowed <sup>2</sup>

### State Law:

California recognizes contributions to cities as charitable donations for the then current tax year. (Revenue & Taxation Code § 24357.<sup>3</sup>) Revenue & Taxation section 24357 provides, in relevant part:

(a) There shall be allowed as a deduction any charitable contribution (as defined in Section 24359) payment of which is made within the income year. A charitable contribution shall be allowable as a deduction only if verified under regulations prescribed by the Franchise Tax Board.

Revenue & Taxation Code section 24359 provides, in relevant part:

For the purposes of sections 24357 to 24359, inclusive, the term, "charitable contribution" means a contribution or gift to or for the use of—(a) A state, a possession of the United States, or any political subdivision of any of the foregoing ...

The California statute does not contain the same explicit limit on the deductibility of charitable contributions; however, California law does look to similar federal statutes for interpretation. California may also cap deductions in other means.

### Conclusion

The City of Oakland is a charitable organization for both state and federal tax purposes if the donation is made for public purposes. However, we must stress that we cannot opine as to the ability of any particular taxpayer to take advantage of available deductions.

ORDINANCE AMENDING OAKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 2, CHAPTER 2.04.160, *EXPENDITURES* FROM 2.04. ARTICLE RESTRICTED **GIFT** PROCEEDS. TO DELEGATE LIMITED AUTHORITY CITY TO ADMINISTRATOR TO, WITHOUT CITY COUNCIL ACTION, ACCEPT GIFTS AND DONATIONS AND TO APPROPRIATE AND EXPEND MONIES DERIVED FROM DONATIONS. AND REPEALING AND OAKLAND ORDINANCE NO. 8144 C.M.S., ADOPTED JUNE 9, 1970, WHICH CONTAINS CONFLICTING AND OBSOLETE PROVISIONS

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Oakland Charter – Article XII, Section 1203, *Gifts and Trusts*, specifies the City Council is authorized to accept gifts and trust on behalf of the City and to control, manage, dispose of and otherwise administer the same in accordance with their terms; and

**WHEREAS,** Oakland Charter – Article VIII, Section 806, Receipts and Expenditures, specifies that:

All monies received by the City shall be deposited in the City Treasury, and no monies shall be disbursed from the treasury without the approval of the City Administrator or [his/her delegee]. No expenditure of City funds shall be made except for the purposes and in the manner specified by an appropriation of the Council . . .

WHEREAS, Council adopted Ordinance 8144 C.M.S., June 9, 1970, which authorized the City Manager and Directors of Museum, Parks and Recreation and Library to accept unrestricted gifts and donations for use by the respective department, but excluded authority to accept gifts and donations for construction of public improvements; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council amended Section 2.04.160, *Expenditures from Restricted Gift Proceeds*, of the City's Purchasing Ordinance, Ordinance No. 7937 C.M.S., as amended, on October 4, 1973, authorizing the City [Administrator] to expend monies derived from gifts and donations to the City in accordance with any special conditions of the donor provided the City Council has accepted the gift/donation by resolution; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council wishes to improve the City's efficiency in accepting, appropriating and utilizing gifts and donations in order to encourage the offering of such gifts and donations to the City and to facilitate their timely use by the City for the public's benefit; and

WHEREAS, to improve the City's efficiency in accepting, appropriating and utilizing gifts and donations, the City Council wishes to delegate authority to the City Administrator, within set dollar

limits, to accept, appropriate and expend monies derived from restricted and unrestricted gifts and donations to the City of Oakland; and

WHEREAS, the City Administrator will comply with all Charter requirements for fiscal administration of such funds and otherwise apply proper and sufficient procedures and controls necessary to monitor and ensure fiscal and performance accountabilities;

### NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OAKLAND DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** Oakland Municipal Code Title 2, Chapter 2.04, Section 2.04.160 is amended to authorize the City Administrator to accept, appropriate and expend monies derived from gifts and donations as follows:

### 2.04.160 Acceptance, appropriation and expenditures from gift proceeds.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this article, the City Administrator is delegated limited authority to accept gifts/donations to the City, including money gifts, and to appropriate and expend moneys derived from such gifts/donations in accordance with any special conditions of the donor without City Council action, provided that the gift/donation does not create unbudgeted costs for the City and is for a program or project that has been approved by the Council in the biennial or midcycle operating or Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget, or by City Council legislation during the fiscal year, as follows:

- 1) up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) for non-restricted gift proceeds i.e., monetary gifts or donations, or monetary proceeds from gifts or donations, with no special conditions, limitations or restrictions by the donor on use; and
- 2) up to fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) for restricted gift proceeds i.e., monetary gifts or donations, or monetary proceeds from gifts or donations, with special conditions, limitations or restrictions by the donor on use.

For monetary proceeds from or monetary gifts/donations that exceed the above limits, restricted or otherwise, the City Administrator is authorized to <u>expend</u> such monies in accordance with any special conditions without City Council action, when the gift has been approved, accepted and appropriated by City Council resolution.

**Section 2: Remaining Provisions Unchanged.** Except as amended herein, all provisions, articles, sections, subsections, sentences, clauses or phrases of Oakland Municipal Code 2.04, shall remain unchanged and in full force and effect.

Section 3. Oakland Municipal Ordinance No. 8144 C.M.S. Repealed. Oakland Municipal Ordinance No. 8144 C.M.S., adopted June 9, 1970, which authorized the City Manager, Director of Museums, Director of Parks and Recreation, and Director of Library to accept certain unrestricted gifts and donations on behalf of the City of Oakland is hereby repealed.

**Section 4: Severability:** If any article, section, subsection sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is held to be invalid or unconstitutional, the offending portion shall be severed and shall not affect the validity of remaining portions which shall remain in full force and effect.

**Section 5: Effective Date:** This ordinance shall become effective immediately on final adoption if it receives six or more affirmative votes; otherwise it shall become effective upon the seventh day after final adoption.

WHEREAS, the City Administrator will comply with all Charter requirements for fiscal administration and expenditure of such funds and otherwise apply proper and sufficient procedures and controls necessary to monitor and ensure fiscal and performance accountabilities; now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED:** That the City Administrator, on behalf of the City Council, is hereby authorized to accept and appropriate, without prior City Council approval, monies derived from:

- 1. Any unrestricted grant with a market or monetary value of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) or less, and
- 2. Any restricted grant with a market or monetary value of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) or less,

provided that the grant is for programs and projects approved by the City Council in the biennial or midcycle operating or Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget or by City Council legislation during the fiscal year, that the grant does not create unbudgeted costs for the City and does not require specific approval by the legislative body; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That expenditures of grant funds shall be in accordance with the requirements of the City of Oakland "Purchasing Ordinance" (Ordinance No. 7937 C.M.S.), as amended.
