OAKLAND CITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION NO. 89106 C.M.S.

INTRODUCED BY COUNCILMEMBER KALB

RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION OF CALIFORNIA STATE ASSEMBLY BILL 2808 (O'DONNELL) THAT WOULD PROHIBIT RANKED CHOICE VOTING IN STATE AND LOCAL ELECTIONS

WHEREAS, along with Berkeley, San Leandro and San Francisco, Oakland has used ranked choice voting for more than a decade; and

WHEREAS, ranked choice voting allows voters to rank up to three candidates in order of preference when voting and eliminates the need for run-off elections; and

WHEREAS, if no candidate receives over 50% of first place votes cast an elimination process begins where the candidate who received the fewest first-choice votes is eliminated and the votes for that candidate are transferred to the voter's next ranked choice among the remaining candidates. This process continues until one candidate receives a majority and is declared the winner; and

WHEREAS, ranked choice voting promotes democracy without the need for a costly runoff election as there is no steep decline in voter participation as which typically occurs in a runoff election; and

WHEREAS, candidates have an incentive to engage with all voters to earn both their first and second or third votes which give voters a greater chance of being heard; and

WHEREAS, ranked choice voting is expanding to city primary and special elections in New York City, state and federal elections in Maine and Alaska and more than 40 local jurisdictions in 14 states; and

WHEREAS, research suggests that ranked choice voting had fewer voter errors than traditional single mark ballots, increased voter turnout, improved the civility in debates and no significant racial or ethnic differences in understanding voting instructions or electoral systems; and

WHEREAS, AB 2808 will ban ranked choice voting eliminating Oakland's tried and true electoral process; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council hereby opposes AB 2808 (O'Donnell) and urges the California State Legislature and Governor Gavin Newsom to oppose its enactment into law.
