


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
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Citywide Homicides – All Investigated Incidents 01 January to 30 June






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

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

Police Area 1- Captain Clay Burch

- Homicides, shootings, robberies, and burglaries remain priorities of focus.
 - Measurable gang and group violence in West Oakland decreased from Q1 into Q2 in collaboration with preventative patrols and intelligence-led patrol strategies, Ceasefire, Department of Violence Prevention (DVP), and OPD's Violent Crime Operations Center (VCOC). Those strategies continue.
 - Robbery in Police Beat 3 has declined in correlation with continued preventative patrols, collaborative community efforts, and focused enforcement and investigations. Those strategies continue.
- Problem solving projects continue in Q3 to address public safety issues and crimes committed in proximity to OUSD schools for which OPD response or extra patrols have been requested. These projects emphasize prevention and conflict resolution through community partnerships.

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Police Area 2- Captain Robert Rosin

- Shootings are a main focus for Police Area 2.
- There have been no homicides in Police Area 2 this year.
- In Q1 & 2, Patrol teams were directed to conduct focus on serious and violent crime incidents:
 - Thorough preliminary investigation, video canvassing recovery, dissemination, partnering with VCOC, and working with DVP and Ceasefire strategies
 - Shooting rates have decreased overall in Area 2 as a whole: 3 murders in 2021 Jan-Jun vs 0 in 2022
- CRO Projects:
 - While Area 2 CRO numbers continued to attrite, project work was limited.
 - In order to supplement the efforts to the CRO teams, the Area 2 Captain worked with BID leaders and developed overtime patrols in order to reduce violence in areas targeted by robbery crews.

Police Area 3- Acting Captain Michael Beaver

- Homicides have reduced by 18% year to date (11 in 2021 vs 9 in 2022)
- Carjackings are up 19% in 2022 compared to 2021
- Our focus is to safely reduce gun related violence, robberies, and human trafficking through collaborative efforts with the Vice Crimes Unit, Alameda County Sheriff's Office, United States Marshals Service, and the Community to conduct intelligence-based policing and an increased presence.
- Special Resource Section 3 conducted an extensive investigation with community assistance targeting dozens of illegal gambling shacks in the area associated with multiple shootings.
- Working in collaboration with the community, overall crime was reduced by 1 percent.
- Beat 19x continues to be a focal point of public safety and community concern.


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Area 4 Homicides – All Investigated Incidents 01 January to 30 June



Police Area 4 – Captain Jake Bassett

Aggravated firearm assaults – 43% decrease

Robberies – 9% decrease

Area 4 Command implemented the following strategies to address the violent crime decrease:

- Provided intelligence to Patrol Commanders to direct available resources to those areas most affected by violent crime.
- Prioritized patrol and supplemental presence during times, days, and locations where offenses were trending.
- Developed a ShotSpotter detail focusing on crime analysis of where to direct resources on a bi-weekly basis.
- Collaborated with the Department of Violence Prevention (DVP) on victims of violent crime with attention to the mitigation of retaliatory violence.


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Area 5 Homicides – All Investigated Incidents 01 January to 30 June



Police Area 5 – Captain Anthony Tedesco

- Area 5 Part 1 crimes for Q2 from Jan to Jun 2022: the largest increase was the following:
 - Aggravated Assaults with firearms at a 30% increase
 - Burglary Unknown at a 100% increase.
 - Homicides were down 100% from March to June.

• In response, Area 5 staff deployed the following measures in an attempt to continue to reduce the increase in firearm related assaults:

- Continued intelligence briefings to identify possible groups or gangs escalating violence.
- Continued Patrol briefings to ensure all stakeholders have timely and relevant information of the conflicts driving the violence in Area 5.
- Reviewed ShotSpotter activity while gathering intelligence and deploying available resources to those areas.
- Continued Violence Suppression operations that are laser focused on groups, gangs, and/or areas of known violence.
- Proactive collaboration with DVP (Department of Violence Prevention) who assist with reaching out to involved parties to prevent further violence.
- Worked closely with the VCOC and Ceasefire which will continue to focus on individuals driving the violence.
- Conduct weekly meeting with all stakeholders, law enforcement partners and city leaders to include local Councilmembers.
- Prioritized Ceasefire strategies and referrals with requests for outreach and prevention.
- Ensure quality preliminary investigations are being completed in the field and in partnership with CID (Criminal Investigations Division).


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Area 6 Homicides – All Investigated Incidents 01 January to 30 June




Police Area 6- Captain Casey Johnson

- **Part 1 crimes for Q2** from 2021 to 2022: The two largest increases:
 - Aggravated Assaults are down over 40%, but there were still 49 incidents.
 - Auto Burglary over 200% increase.
 - Homicides 63% Decrease from 2021.
- In response, Area 6 staff deployed the **following measures** in an attempt to continue to reduce this rise in violence:
 - Continued Data intelligence to identify possible groups or gangs escalating violence
 - Increased partnership with DVP (Department of Violence Prevention) who assist with reaching out to involved parties to prevent further violence.
 - Worked closely with the VCOC and Ceasefire which will continue to focus on individuals driving the violence.
 - Conduct weekly meetings with all stakeholders, law enforcement partners, and city leaders to include Councilmembers Reid and Taylor.
 - Prioritized Ceasefire strategies and referrals with requests for outreach and prevention.
 - Reviewed ShotSpotter activity while gathering intelligence and deploying available resources to those areas.
 - Run overtime details such as ShotSpotter and Violence Suppression Units to focus on identified locations with increased firearm-related aggravated assaults.
 - Continue to enforce thorough preliminary investigations (Patrol Officers) while working with our Criminal Investigations Division on follow-up requests.
 - Run anti-burglary operations focused on Beat 31 where over 75% of all burglaries occur.
 - Work with local merchants and stakeholders to conduct CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) evaluations for long term burglary mitigation solutions.

Violent Crime Operations Center (VCOC) Captain Roland Holmgren

The <u>Violent Crime Operation Center's</u> vision is to centralize the strategic dissemination of criminal intelligence and deployment of Departmental resources in support of the Criminal Investigation Division and intelligence-led violent crime prevention.

Mission: Reduce citywide violent crime through intelligence-informed and task-driven operations.

- CGIC is operational 7 days a week, disseminating real-time criminal intelligence/information to Patrol, CID, and VCOC Operations Teams.
- CGIC tracks/analyzes violent crime & gang trends throughout the Bay Area, that directly affects the City of Oakland.
- CGIC collaborates with Ceasefire and external partners (FBI, USMS, DVP, CBOs) to prevent, interrupt, and solve violent crime.

**Miscellaneous includes offenses not categorized as violent felony offense arrests. This includes firearms arrests, probation/parole violations, and other offenses and/or warrants. Some of the arrestees within the miscellaneous categories may have also been witnesses to violent crimes where the investigator needed to speak to them.

CEASEFIRE-Captain Trevelyon Jones

- Ceasefire is a data-driven violence reduction strategy coordinating law enforcement, social services and the community.
- Ceasefire works in partnership with the Department of Violence Prevention (DVP), Community Based Organizations and the Faith Community to prevent and reduce gun violence
- Using the Ceasefire strategy, Oakland saw a homicides reduced from 125 in 2012 to a record low 68 in 2018. Shootings went from 553 to 277 over the same time period.
- Individuals, who are most prone to be associated with gun violence, either as an offender or victim, are identified and receive direct communication regarding alternatives from a team of OPD staff and community members.
- Ceasefire actively engages with community partners to build public trust between the community and OPD.

CEASEFIRE

- Ceasefire added six (6) officers, increasing to three (3) teams. Unit is still down eight
 (8) officers.
- Ceasefire has hosted three (3) Call-In meetings YTD with two (2) more planned for 2022.
- Ceasefire has engaged in direct communication with 117 at risk individuals and offered services YTD in 2022.
- Ceasefire has conducted 24 operations targeting gangs YTD in 2022.
- Noted an increase of juveniles associated with criminal street gangs and engaged in violent crime.
- Gang/ Group dynamics account for over 50% of non-fatal shootings.
- As of June 2022, shootings and homicides were down compared to 2021. However, 2022 shootings and homicides are up compared to 2019 and 2020 incidents year to date.
