

## Mission Statement

The Public Ethics Commission (PEC) ensures compliance with government ethics, campaign finance, transparency, and lobbyist registration laws intended to promote fairness, openness, honesty, and integrity in Oakland City government.

## Service Inventory Summary

Lead/Collaborate – Lead by example and facilitate City policy, management, and technology changes to further PEC goals.

Educate/Engage – Provide education, advice, technical assistance, mediations, and legal opinions to promote awareness and understanding of campaign finance, ethics, and transparency laws.

Disclose/Illuminate – Facilitate accurate and accessible disclosure of government integrity data, including campaign finance, conflicts of interest/gifts, and lobbying, which help detect noncompliance.

Detect/Deter – Conduct investigations and audits to monitor compliance with the laws within the Commission's jurisdiction.

Prosecute – Enforce violations of the laws within the Commission's jurisdiction through administrative or civil remedies.








# Oakland Fair Elections Act / Measure W (2022) – 74% Yes


### Less Than 1% of Residents Donate to Oakland Candidates

### Measure W Overview


Every registered voter receives 4 x \$25 voucher (\$100 total)

- Applies to:
  - Mayor
  - City Council
  - City Attorney
  - City Auditor
  - School Board


### Measure W Budgetary Overview

- Requires, for FY 2023-2025:
  - "Sufficient funding" to administer, including at minimum:
  - 4 FTE in program staff
  - \$4,000,000 for candidate vouchers
  - \$350,000 in overhead
  - \$700,000 in one-time startup costs
- Permits the City to reduce these budget set-asides if the City faces an "extreme fiscal necessity"

### Overview – *Non-*Measure W Significant Changes

- New Revenue: Adds annual lobbyist registration fee \$70,000
- Savings: Cuts Limited Public Financing (LPF) (\$155,000) (program repealed by Measure W)
- New Spending: Adds one-time funds for election-year candidate education and engagement \$50,000

### Overview – Measure W Significant Changes

Postpones public financing implementation to 2026

• Eliminates funding for candidate vouchers and program staffing, and significantly reduces startup and O&M funds

 Allocates \$525,000 in startup funding, including to develop the database to distribute, process, and track vouchers

## Measure W Funding Cuts – Service Impact & Equity Considerations

### Service Impact:


- No public financing available for 2024 election
- Reduced candidate fundraising ability for some candidates due to decreased contribution limits (\$900 to \$600) without offsetting increase in public financing

### • Equity Considerations:

- Candidates: opportunity loss particularly for candidates lacking connections to personal wealth or wealthy donor networks due to historical and ongoing effects of racism
- Residents: opportunity loss particularly for residents from low-income communities of color the program is designed to draw into greater civic engagement.

### Measure W – Cost for Scaled Down Pilot

- PEC directed staff to explore a limited pilot for council district elections-only in 2024 at its May 2023 meeting
- Districts-only pilot would reduce voucher, mailing, outreach, and some staff costs
- PEC staff estimates a \$3.2 million pilot cost for FY2023-2025
  - This represents a \$2.7 million increase from the \$525,000 already in the Proposed Budget
