## **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the City Council Adopt a Resolution Authorizing the City Administrator to Enter Into Sixty-Two (62) Cultural Services Grants to Fifty-Two (52) Oakland-Based Nonprofit Organizations and Individual Artists Providing Arts and Cultural Services in Oakland During Fiscal Year 2011-2012 in A Total Amount Not to Exceed \$854,862.

# **OUTCOME**

Passage of this Resolution will result in the award of 62 grants to 52 Oakland-based arts organizations and individual artists to provide services in dance, music, theater, media, visual, and literary arts for the benefit of Oakland citizens and visitors. Grant funds will support approximately 44,000 events and activities, including over 30,000 free activities, and expose over 280,000 participants (80% Oakland-based) to cultural arts services. Additionally, 7,612 Oakland Unified School District students will be served through 98 artist residencies, totaling 8,481 classes.

## BACKGROUND/LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The Cultural Funding Program (CFP) is an annual grants program supporting cultural services throughout Oakland. It is managed by Cultural Arts & Marketing staff within the Community & Economic Development Agency and overseen by the City of Oakland's Funding Advisory Committee. In 1985, City Council adopted arts grants policy establishing the CFP as the City's mechanism to support Oakland-based nonprofit arts and cultural organizations. Policies, review procedures, and a panel system of evaluating applications were established to ensure transparency and public trust in the distribution of public funds for the arts in Oakland. With Council support, CFP grants have historically been funded from the General Purpose Fund.

In FY 2009-10, voters passed Measure C, which added a Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) surcharge that in part supplements CFP funding. In the FY 2011-12 Amended Policy Budget passed on January 31, 2012, Council retained 100% of the General Purpose Fund contribution to the arts grants.

The broad goals of the CFP are (1) to provide grant support, through a competitive process, to a wide range of Oakland-based artists and nonprofit organizations providing arts and cultural services in Oakland; (2) to infuse Oakland's neighborhoods with arts and cultural activities that increase exposure to, understanding of, and respect for diverse cultural heritages, and to support arts activities that engage the community; and (3) to support arts education activities in Oakland's schools and among Oakland youth.

## **Review Process**

The CFP annually distributes program guidelines inviting applications for grant support of arts and cultural programming within Oakland. Community peer panels are convened to review eligible applications in open meetings and to recommend grant awards; panelists apply to the CFP and are selected based on diverse artistic experience, knowledge of Oakland and its arts and cultural communities, and skills in nonprofit and project management. The Funding Advisory Committee reviews scores, allocates funds based on panel ranking, and hears applicant appeals, if any. Funding recommendations are then forwarded to the Life Enrichment Committee of Oakland City Council.

In October, 2011, three panels evaluated proposals from the arts community for FY 2011-12 CFP funding in the grant categories of Individual Artist Project Support, Organization Project Support, and Art in the Schools. A total of 15 panelists (five per panel) reviewed 74 applications. Panelists thoroughly discussed, evaluated and scored each proposal based on established criteria (see ANALYSIS). Upon completion of the review process and ranking of the applications, the Funding Advisory Committee was charged with determining a cut-off for grant awards and the allocation of funds. Applicants receiving an average score lower than 70 (from a possible 104 points) were automatically disqualified for funding, as 70 is the minimum fundable score per Program policy. In most cases, applicant requests are reduced due to the variance between the sum of requests and available dollars.

On December 15, 2011, the Funding Advisory Committee determined grant amounts based on panel scoring and funds available, and voted unanimously to recommend that City Council award the proposed grants. The 62 grants recommended in FY 2011-12 will support projects, ongoing programs, operating expenses of organizations and individual artists, and artist residencies in public schools.

# ANALYSIS

The arts are an important sector of Oakland's economy. Multiculturalism and the abundance of artistic expression are a significant factor in the quality of life in the East Bay, and in particular Oakland, with its exceptionally high number of artist residents per capita. CFP awards are "lifeline" grants supporting dozens of Oakland-based organizations and individual artists each year. Grants provide support for organization projects, as well as much-needed operating support – less often available from other government and foundation funders. In the Individual Artist category, many projects with direct impact on underserved communities receive the majority of their funding from the City's CFP grant. Additionally, CFP grants are a critical factor for many Oakland organizations and individual artists in leveraging matching funds from other sources.

In broad terms, the CFP panels base their review on (1) soundness of the applicant's artistic description of the program or project and quality of the artistic product, (2) management ability of personnel and fiscal soundness of the program/project, (3) applicant's ability to implement proposed activities and identify and market to potential audiences, and (4) the extent to which applicant's activities fulfill the goals and objectives of the CFP, as noted above. In the view of the respective program category review panels and the Funding Advisory Committee, the 62 grants recommended for award this year best met the above criteria.

# PUBLIC OUTREACH/INTEREST

CFP application guidelines and grant category deadlines were widely publicized. Outreach included posting on the City website and other sites and publications featuring cultural grant opportunities, distribution of applications to all Oakland libraries, and emailing notice to interested groups including past grant applicants.

Staff conducted public workshops for prospective applicants. There was an open call inviting volunteers to serve on peer review panels. Panels convened to discuss and evaluate applications in open meetings where applicants had the opportunity to attend and speak about their grant proposals. Meetings of the Funding Advisory Committee to review panel recommendations and determine award levels were open to the public and all applicants were informed. Staff outreach engaged 63 returning grantees and also effectively informed prospective/new grantees; 38% of applicants this year were first-timers.

# **COORDINATION**

The City Attorney's Office and the Budget Office have been consulted in the preparation of this report and resolution. The City of Oakland Funding Advisory Committee has also been consulted in the review process and made the award recommendations herein presented to Council.

- 4. FISCAL IMPACT: FY 2011-12 funds for CFP grants are budgeted as follows:
  [A] \$730,120 in Non-Departmental (CCAD Cultural Programs 90523), General Purpose Fund (1010), of which \$71,009 will be used for staff administration and \$648,906 will be distributed as grants.
  - [B] A projected total of \$2.4 million in revenues from the Transient Occupancy Tax (fund 2419) surcharge, of which \$205,956 will be reserved for arts grants (within the Cultural Funding Unit 88742, and the Cultural Funding Program-Transit Occupancy Tax project – P391850).
  - NOTE: Dedicated staffing (2 PTEs) for the CFP was eliminated in this budget cycle. With Budget Office approval, Cultural Arts & Marketing hired a Temporary Contract Service Employee to assist with management of the program; the cost of this temporary position totals \$71,009 in FY 2011-12, and funds for the temporary position were drawn from the GPF grant fund pool.

## SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

*Economic*: Community-oriented arts activities bolster the cultural arts identity of Oakland, fortifying the city as a destination, and creating positive publicity resulting in varying levels of economic return.

*Environmental*: There are no environmental opportunities or benefits resulting from any action outlined in this report.

*Social Equity*: The organizations and activities being recommended for funding add to existing economic and educational opportunities, thereby increasing the quality of life for all Oakland residents and visitors to the *c*ity.

\*\*\*The Organizational Assistance Program is a two-year program. The funding cycle commenced in FY 2010-11 and will conclude in FY 2011-12. Recommended grantee award amounts are identical in both years.

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## **Organization Project Support**

The Organization Project Support category supports Oakland-based nonprofit organizations producing art activities in Oakland that culminate in a local public outcome for the benefit of the community. Such activities may include, but are not limited to, performances of dance, theater and music, exhibitions, classes and workshops.

#### Individual Artist Project Support

The Individual Artist Project Support category supports Oakland resident individual artists producing art activities in Oakland that culminate in a local public outcome for the benefit of the community. Such activities may include, but are not limited to performances of dance, theater, and music, exhibitions, classes and workshops.

#### Art in the Schools

The Art in the Schools category exposes young people in the Oakland public schools to quality, hands-on arts experiences in the school setting to educate them about the process of creating and producing arts, and to support and enhance the classroom curriculum. Funds support arts residencies on the school site before, during or after school hours wherein there is a long-term, in-depth interaction between professional artists and an ongoing group of students.

#### Organizational Assistance

Organizational Assistance is a two-year program that supports Oakland-based 501(c)3 nonprofit arts organizations producing ongoing art and cultural activities that may include, but are not limited to, performances in dance, music or theater, classes and workshops, and exhibits, for the benefit of the community. Organizational Assistance serves to promote the health and stability of Oakland's nonprofit arts and culture providers. There are two levels to the program: Level I – Strategic Development Support and Level II – General Operating Support.

WHEREAS, in 1985, City Council adopted the first arts funding policies and procedures for the City of Oakland, establishing a panel system of evaluating funding proposals and distributing City funds to the arts; and

WHEREAS, the Cultural Funding Program is the City's funding mechanism to support Oaklandbased nonprofit organizations and artists providing arts and cultural activities to the public; and

WHEREAS, the mission of the Cultural Funding Program is to fund Oakland-based art and cultural activities that reflect the diversity of the city for citizens of and visitors to Oakland, focusing on the key areas of General Support, Neighborhood Arts and Arts Education; and

WHEREAS, during October, 2011, three funding review panels convened and forwarded recommendations to award sixty-two (62) grants to fifty-two (52) organizations and individual artists proposing to provide arts and/or cultural programming in the city of Oakland; and

WHEREAS, Fiscal Year 2011-12 funds for the Cultural Funding Program are budgeted as follows: \$648,905.69 in Non-Departmental – Entity (1), General Purpose Fund (1010), Cultural Programs Org (90523), Undetermined Project (0000000); and a projected total of \$2.4 million in revenues from the Transient Occupancy Tax (fund 2419) surcharge, of which \$205,956.31 will be reserved for arts grants in Entity (1), Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) Surcharge Fund (2419), Cultural Funding Org (88742), Cultural Funding Program TOT Project (P391850); and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2012, the Life Enrichment Committee of City Council approved specific funding recommendations to nonprofit organizations and individual artists as follows:
