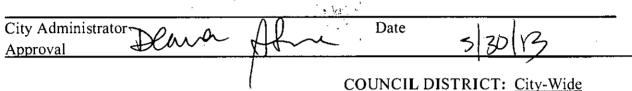

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the City Council approve the following package of resolutions to recognize new revenue and appropriate undesignated General Purpose Fund balance:

- Resolution Authorizing the City Administrator or Her Designee to Appropriate Four Million Eight Hundred Fourteen Thousand Six Hundred Ten Dollars (\$4,814,610) From Undesignated General Purpose Fund Balance to Compliance Director Compensation and Staff Costs, Remedial Action Plan Costs, and Strategic Policy Partners Recommendation Costs.

part of the quarterly report, the City is expecting the Oakland Police department to exceed its budgeted expenditures for overtime, due primarily to the need to backfill critical sworn and civilian shifts. Finally, the City is the defendant in lawsuits that have recently been decided or settled or are expected to soon be decided or settled, for which the City is expected to incur significant expenses and has not budgeted adequate resources, such that it is prudent to establish a reserve for this purpose.

#### **OUTCOME**

Adoption of the proposed resolutions will match budgeted revenues and expenditures with actual revenues and expenditures based on recent mid-year data, as well as create a prudent reserve for some specific anticipated expenditures.

#### BACKGROUND/LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The Oakland City Council adopted the FY 2011-13 Biennial Budget on June 30, 2011 pursuant to Resolution No. 83444 C.M.S. It was subsequently amended for FY 2012-13 on June 28, 2012 pursuant to Resolution No. 83943 C.M.S.

#### ANALYSIS

As is normal, there have been some mid-year developments regarding the City of Oakland's revenues and expenditures that require City Council action. As a result of the FY 2012-13 Third Quarter Revenue and Expenditure Report, the City is estimating increased General Purpose Fund revenues. - Backfill of open beats in Patrol due to a high number of sworn vacancies,
- Backfill of 911 operators due to vacancies and low authorized strength relative to demand for service,
- Overtime related to planned protests, and
- Security for the President of the United States' visit

**RESOLVED:** That the City's FY 2011-13 Policy Budget is hereby amended to increase the Oakland Police Department's FY 2012-13 General Purpose Fund overtime budget with funds from the Undesignated General Purpose Fund balance; and be it

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that the City of Oakland will incur significant expenses in connection with litigiaton and settlements; and

WHEREAS, the normal source from which the City would pay the expenses, the Self Insurance Liability Fund (Fund 1100), presently has a negative fund balance due to historic under-recovery; and

WHEREAS, the Self Insurance Liability Fund (Fund 1100) would increase its negative fund balance were it to fund the anticipated expenses, which is counter to Generally Accepted Accounting Practices (GAAP); now, therefore be it

**RESOLVED**: That the City Council hereby establishes a reserve within the General Purpose Fund of seven million dollars (\$7,000,000) solely for the purpose of paying pending litigation expenses and settlements.; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Administrator is authorized to take any other action necessary consistent with this Resolution and its basic purposes.

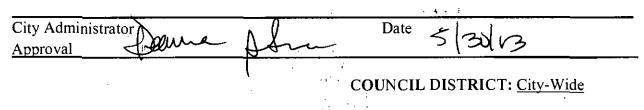

SUBJECT: Appropriation for Compliance Director, DATE: May 30, 2013 Remedial Action Plan, and Strategic Policy Partners Recommendations



#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Adopt a resolution appropriating four million eight hundred fourteen thousand six hundred ten dollars (\$4,814,610) from undesignated General Purpose Fund balance to Compliance Director compensation and staff costs, Remedial Action Plan costs, and Strategic Policy Partners recommendations costs.

#### <u>OUTCOME</u>

Adoption of the resolution will provide funding for items mandated by the court-appointed Compliance Director, fund some additional priority items identified by Strategic Policy Partners, and prudently establish a set aside of \$1,000,000 for anticipated future mandates from the Compliance Director.

This supplemental report adds newly available information to the FY 2013-15 Proposed Policy Budget for City Council's consideration and will require new balancing measures along with the entirety of the FY 2013-15 Proposed Policy Budget.

#### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City is required to compensate the court-appointed Compliance Director and their support staff. The City is also required to make expenditures on Remedial Action Plan items, and is expecting additional future required expenditures. The City is also in receipt of recommendations from Strategic Policy Partners on key investments that could improve the effectiveness of the Oakland Police Department. To address these required, recommended, and anticipated costs, the City Administrator is recommending the City Council appropriate resources from undesignated General Purpose Fund balance totaling \$4,814,610.

#### BACKGROUND/LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

On January 3, 2003, Judge Thelton E. Henderson signed an order pursuant to a negotiated agreement by parties in the Delphine Allen case (N\$A) that set forth numerous tasks to be completed by the Oakland Police Department. On March 4, 2013, Judge Henderson appointed Commissioner Thomas C. Frazier as the Compliance Director, who was tasked to issue a Remedial Action Plan ("Plan"), to facilitate sustainable compliance with all outstanding tasks by December 2013.

On March 4, 2013, when Judge Thelton E. Henderson appointed the Compliance Director, the City was also directed to deposit \$270,000 with the Court for the Compliance Director's salary, with benefits to be resolved.

On April 17, 2013, Judge Thelton E. Henderson approved the three Compliance Director staff persons retroactive to March 11, 2013 and at the cost of approximately \$385,600 per year plus reasonable travel costs. The court order also stated that the Compliance Director may also hire a project manager or administrative assistant, as well as subject matter experts as required. The cost is to be determined and as of this report writing, is not resolved.

The City is required to compensate the court-appointed Compliance Director, Thomas C. Frazier, and compensate necessary support staff As illustrated in Table 1 below, the City estimates that these costs will total over \$1.6 million from now through December 2014.

The Compliance Director submitted his first Remedial Action Plan ("Plan") to the City on May 1, 2013. The Plan calls for new investments in the Police Department beyond what is already

included in the FY 2012-13 Amended Midcycle Budget and the FY 2013-15 Proposed Policy Budget. The Plan is available on the City's website at the following link:

The Plan contains a list of training, technology, and other items that the Compliance Director believes the Police Department needs to comply with the Negotiated Settlement Agreement (NSA). These are listed in the Plan's budget addendum beginning on page 57. The costs for items proposed by the Compliance Director in the Plan that are quantifiable at the time of this report is \$1,825,000.

The addendum also includes a number of items for which the estimated cost is still to be determined (TBD). City staff believes that the cost for these items as well as some other potential near term items required by the Compliance Director will total appropriately \$1,000,000. As such, the Budget Office is proposing that the City Council establish a budget set aside in this amount to reserve resources for these anticipated expenditures.

When the total costs are determined for the items listed above, staff will bring a report with a resolution to finalize the appropriation.

While the Compliance Director was identifying steps to the Police Department's compliance with the NSA, the City was also under contract with Strategic Policy Partners (SPP) to evaluate Police Department operations and crime fighting tactics. As a result of its analysis, SPP also recommended some new investments by the Police Department, in addition to those items identified by the Compliance Director. SPP's recommended expenditures are estimated to total approximately \$368,500. This will include training and professional exchanges between Oakland Police Department's middle and senior management and peers in other jurisdictions; a post-academy community orientation for new graduates; a new employee performance evaluation design; racial profiling data analysis; critical incident training; on-call mental health professionals; effort on reducing domestic violence homicides; and improving recruitment strategies. Note that a policy discussion of the SPP report will take place at the Public Safety Committee on June 11, 2013.

Compliance Director compensation and staff costs, Remedial Action Plan items, a set aside for anticipated future Plan items, and the recommendations of SPP total \$4,814,610, as shown below in Table 2. The total amount for mandatory items is \$3,311,110. This is not the total cost for NSA related actions. Some of the cost items are being identified as initial costs, and the Compliance Director has stated that there will be subsequent costs. There are items that are pending for determining costs.

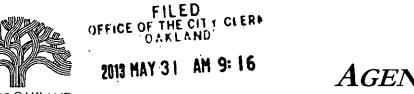

# **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that City Council approve a resolution authorizing the City Administrator to expend (\$3,042,000) Three Million Forty Two Thousand Dollars from the FY 2012-13 General Fund Undesignated Fund Balance on Public Safety Radio System (P25) including 911 infrastructure upgrades and immediate improvement needs to City dispatch communications centers and waive the competitive bidding, advertising, and the request for proposal process and delegate authority to the City Administrator to award contracts.

#### OUTCOME

Adoption of this resolution will allow the City Administrator to expend monies on 911 infrastructure upgrades and immediate improvement needs to the City's dispatch communications center and award necessary contracts for the purchase of equipment and services as necessary.

# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As discussed in closed session on May 21, 2013, staff is returning with a recommendation and resolution appropriating and authorizing the City Administrator to invest in infrastructure upgrades and improvements to the P25 Radio System. These infrastructure upgrades are limited to replacing current equipment within existing City facilities and therefore requires each replacement and/or upgrade to conform to the space and technical specifications of existing public safety facilities and/or systems.

Item: \_\_\_\_\_ Public Safety Committee June 11, 2013 The project requirements and limited scope restrict the City to a very limited pool of qualified vendors, which are familiar with existing City systems and facilities who could supply the necessary professional services and equipment to complete this project. In order to accomplish the project as expeditiously and cost effectively as possible, the project shall take into account the reuse of existing systems and facilities to the greatest extent possible, and ensure that professional services firms who perform the work have recent experience working with the existing systems and facilities.

Oakland Municipal Code ("OMC") Section 2.04.050 requires advertising and bidding for contracts for the purchase of supplies, equipment, and computer software and the award to the lowest responsible, responsive bidder if award is made. Section 2.04.050 I. 5 provides an exception to the advertising and competitive bidding requirement of the OMC upon a finding and determination by the Council that it is in the best interests of the City to do so.

Addhionally, OMC Section 2.04.051 A. requires that a competitive Request For Proposal ("RFP") or Request For Qualifications ("RFQ") selection process for award of contracts that exceed \$25,000 for professional service contracts and which are exempt from bidding under Section 2.04.050.1.1. OMC Section 2.04.051 B provides that the Council can waive the RPP/RFQ requirement if it finds that it is in the best interests of the City to do so.

Staff recommends that the City Council finds and determines that it is in the best interests of the City to waive formal advertising and bidding requirements for the purchase of the equipment and professional services to accomplish these immediate upgrades and improvements to the City 911 Infrastructure, and to waive the RFP/RFQ selection requirement for the professional services aspects of this project.

The resolution will also waive the advertising, bidding, and the request for proposal process in order to remedy the immediate public safety related communications needs as expeditiously as possible. To the greatest extent possible, staff will utilize existing contracts for equipment and services, including but not limited to, WSCA, CMASS, GSA, and other City contracts as part of this project.

This report provides the City Council with information about the funding and spending plan to accomplish this project. A high-level project plan has been established with well-defined deliverables to meet the project schedule and reduce any risk that these infrastmcture deficiencies may create to the City's public safety entities.

These improvements are required regardless of radio service providers; that is, whether the City joins the East Bay Regional Communications Systems Authority (EBRCSA) or maintains its own P25 radio system. Based upon the plan to design and implement these infrastructure improvements, the estimated completion date for this project is November 2013.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

This resolution will authorize the City Administrator to expend an amount not to exceed \$3,042,000 from the FY 2012-13 General Fund balance.

The Department of Technology is responsible for the maintenance of the equipment and facilities detailed in this project. The Radio Fund (4200) covers maintenance and operation of these systems and no additional maintenance costs are anticipated as a result of this project.

#### BACKGROUND

Beginning in August of 2012, the City Administrator directed the Department of Information Technology to identify and resolve any issues related to failures of the P25 Public Safety Radio System. Since that time, staff has performed a detailed analysis of the P25 System including the supporting facilities and infrastructure, which supports the P25 Radio System, as well as many other critical public safety systems. The infrastructure that supports the City's 911 communications centers is nearing fifteen (15) years old, well past its useful life, and requires immediate upgrades to ensure these facilities can continue performing their duties to serve the residents of Oakland and ensure for the safety of our public safety employees. Numerous instances of communication failures and the ongoing issues related to premature failure of existing equipment have been identified as being caused by this aged supporting infrastructure, as well as, deficient power and grounding systems. In addition, two communications facilities that support both 911 centers was identified as being structurally deficient and require remediation to ensure their survivability during a seismic event.

The list of facilities and deficiencies are detailed below, they include the following:

- APL Communications Facility Uninterruptable Power Supply Replacement, Emergency Generator Power System Reconfiguration, Emergency Heat Exhaust Fan Installation. *Estimated Cost:* \$450,000
- 911 Communications Centers (OPD Dispatch Center and Fire Dispatch Center) -Electrostatic Discharge Remediation and Upgrades, Video Display Monitor Replacements, Dispatcher Console Seismic Upgrades, Power & Grounding Upgrades, Console Cabling Replacements, Communications Shelter Replacement. Estimated Cost: \$1,592,000
- Seneca Communications Facility Building Shelter Replacement, Emergency Generator Replacement, Grounding & Power Upgrades. Estimated Cost: \$500,000

This one-time investment in public safety communication infrastructure upgrades will improve radio and 911 communications performance and help to ensure that our dispatch centers have the ability to maintain their mission critical function on a day-to-day basis. It will also increase the City's ability to function during regional natural disasters.

Further, the Council should consider that these upgrades to communications infrastructure are necessary regardless of the City continuing to operate its own public safety radio system, or opting to utilize an alternative radio system such as the East Bay Regional Communications Systems Authority (EBRCSA). It is also important to note that staff has uncovered additional cases of infrastructure related upgrades which require remediation, as well as operational deficiencies which may be contributing to reduced performance with its public safety technology systems, including radio communications. Staff recognizes that the City has limited personnel and financial resources to accomplish the full list of deficiencies and recommends that the above items be considered as highest priority items and should be considered as the first phase of a three phase approach to resolving the ongoing public safety technology deficiencies uncovered during this analysis.

Staff anticipates returning to the Council within the next ninety days to provide additional information and recommendations for the second phase of remediation.

#### SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: There are no economic development opportunities related to this report at this time.

Environmental: There are no environmental opportunities related to this report.

Social Equity: The City of Oakland continues to ensure that the Public Safety personnel are able to communicate during emergencies with minimal disruptions therefore providing first responders the ability to respond during emergencies to all of Oakland's residents and the community.
