RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council accept this Quarterly Informational Report from the Oakland Police Department (OPD) on Crime Trends and Crime Reduction Activities, Including the Ceasefire Violence Reduction Strategy, in the City of Oakland.

OUTCOME

This informational report is presented to the City Council and the Oakland community to provide an update on crime trends and OPD's crime reduction strategies as of September 2014.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

OPD expanded its Ceasefire efforts and investigative capabilities in 2013. This is a quarterly report to inform the Public Safety Committee on the status of OPD's crime reduction initiatives, and to discuss crime trends, OPD's response and crime statistics with assigned Area Commanders.

In 2013, OPD reorganized into a Neighborhood Policing model which included law enforcement accountability distributed into five distinct areas. Each area is commanded by a Captain of Police.



Ceasefire Update

Ceasefire Goals

- Reduce shootings and homicides through respectful direct communication and follow-through with those at highest risk of violence.
- Decrease recidivism and incarceration rates of individuals participating in the intervention.
- Strengthen police-community relations.


Ceasefire Focus on Quality Implementation

- Call-in completed in July 2014, prior one completed on March 2014.
- Next Call-in scheduled for November.
- Custom Notifications/Direct Communications continue
- Dedicated Ceasefire team focused on strategies
- Weekly Shooting Reviews

Ceasefire (Cont'd) Focus on Quality Implementation

- Partnership with Probation Department strengthened to include more robust Global Positioning System (GPS) monitoring and compliance checks
- Police Legitimacy/Procedural Justice Training has begun.
- Continued strong engagement from community partners.
- All partners heavily involved in violence reduction.

Area 3 Response

- Directed patrol, as calls for service allow
- Park marked patrol cars in hot spots
- Officers walking in business districts
- Officers riding bicycles
- Conduct enforcement operations (undercover)
- Regular briefings with Robbery investigators

Area 3 Response

- Officers being directed to conduct thorough preliminary investigations
- Command review of robbery reports to audit initial investigations and direct follow up
- Problem Solving Officers (PSOs) conducting follow ups and canvass on robberies looking for additional witnesses and / or video

- List of Robbery parole / probationers in Area to conduct "check ups"
- Handout robbery prevention flyers in hot spots
- Meeting with Latino and Asian community to help them report crimes

- Identify root causes of crime in certain areas
- Identify City/Community services that can aid in crime reduction
- Engage Community members to get involved in crime reduction
- High visibility patrols
- Walking/Vehicle stops

Area 5 Robbery Trends

- Victims waiting at bus stops
- Victims coming home and entering residence
- Multiple suspects involved in robberies
- Loss is cash, cell phones, jewelry

Area 5 Robbery Response

- CRTs with the assistance of Probation and Parole will conduct Probation and Parole Searches
- Deploy the mobile command vehicle in hot spot locations
- High visibility patrols, conduct walking stops and vehicle stops in intel-directed locations

Area 5 Burglary Response

- Directed patrols in burglary hotspots
- Park marked police cars and mobile command vehicle
- Conduct burglary suppression operations
- Use of electronic billboards in target areas

Area 5 Shooting Response

- Deploy the mobile command vehicle in hot spot locations
- Continue to work with Measure Y to deploy their resources in Hot Spot locations known for shootings
- High visibility patrols, conduct walking stops and vehicle stops in ShotSpotter locations

Criminal Investigation Division Current Investigator Staffing
