SUBJECT: Budget Outlook Message & Calendar **DATE:** April 10, 2015

On April 30th we will release a balanced, two-year budget proposal that strives to position Oakland as a vibrant, equitable city that is growing responsibly.

In the short-term, it will close the funding gap. It will begin to restore compensation to workers who made great sacrifices during the recession. And it will preserve and start to enhance the delivery of services that Oaklanders deserve. It will give city staff the tools and training to do their jobs in a way that reflects their true professionalism.

It will also demonstrate a strong, long-term commitment to growing responsibly by beginning to get our long-term financial obligations down to manageable levels and making the strategic investments that will grow our permanent revenue base.

We recognize there are many compelling demands, but this balanced approach is the discipline we need. This is how we will keep our eyes on the prize so we can afford to do more of the things we so urgently want to do in the future.

In looking at growth, we know that property tax, sales tax and economic development are the primary revenue sources that pay for city services. We must look to responsible ways to spark growth and ensure that its benefits are shared equitably. Our four priorities for growing those revenue sources responsibly are:

- 1. Improve public safety using a holistic approach, including more police, better community policing, intervention and prevention programs, as well as addressing the root causes of crime starting with better jobs and education. Oakland will not grow unless people are confident it is getting safer.
- 2. Improve the city's physical infrastructure, starting with our roads, so they look better, cost less to maintain and create more vibrant, attractive and healthy neighborhoods making Oakland a great place to come live, play and bring your business.
- 3. Create more housing and jobs, but do so in an equitable way that keeps Oakland affordable for residents at every income level and provides employment opportunities for Oaklanders with every skill and education level.

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4. Be more responsive to requests for city services so things in every neighborhood get cleaned and fixed right away and police and firefighters are there when we need them. This will show that government is trustworthy and transparent, and making the city look attractive so people feel good about living and working in Oakland.

We look forward to working with the City Council when they take their turn to weigh in and ultimately approve the balanced budget we will have for the next two years.

We are excited to engage <u>you</u> in this critical process that will help meet Oakland's immediate needs and position our city for a better future.

Community Engagement Opportunities

As part of the budget process we will be doing direct outreach in the community. To make this as fun, engaging and accessible as possible, between now and April 30th as Mayor, I will host a series of low-key events online and in-person. I will also be using this as an opportunity to gather input by encouraging residents to take a short survey.

This engagement will continue after our budget proposal is released on April 30th with City Council-led Community Budget forums throughout May.
