RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Public Safety Committee accept the Quarterly Informational Report from the Oakland Police Department (OPD) on Crime, Crime Trends, and Crime Reduction Activities.

BACKGROUND/LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The Oakland Police Department expanded its Ceasefire effort and investigative capabilities in 2013 and 2014. This is a quarterly report to inform the Public Safety Committee on the status of OPD's reduction initiatives, and to discuss crime trends, OPD's response and crime statistics with the assigned Area Commanders.

In 2013 OPD reorganized into a Neighborhood Policing model which included law enforcement accountability distributed into five distinct areas. Each area is commanded by a Captain of Police.

<u>ANALYSIS</u>

This informational report is presented to the City Council and the Oakland community to provide an update on crime in Oakland. The attached presentation contains information as follows:



Ceasefire Update

Ceasefire: Goals

- Reduce shootings and homicides through respectful direct communication and follow-through with those at highest risk of violence.
- Decrease recidivism and incarceration rates of individuals participating in interventions.
- Strengthen police-community relations.

Ceasefire:

Focus on Quality Implementation (1)

- Most recent call-ins completed in November 2014 and March 2015
- Next Call-in scheduled for July 2015
- Custom Notifications/Direct Communications continue

Ceasefire:

Focus on Quality Implementation (2)

- Dedicated Ceasefire team focused on strategies
- Weekly Shooting Reviews are conducted
- Partnership with Probation Department strengthened to include more robust Global Positioning System (GPS) monitoring and compliance checks

Ceasefire:

Focus on Quality Implementation (3)

- Police Legitimacy/Procedural Justice Training has begun
- Strong engagement from community partners continues
- All partners are heavily involved in violence reduction



- Continued development of information on known gangs/individuals
- Focused effort on gang members and violent offenders
- Communication of weekly priorities

Area 2: Robberies

- Primary robbery hot spots include:
 - Oakland Ave / Harrison St and Piedmont Ave (Beats 8X, 9X, 14X)
 - Recent increase around Grand Lake (14Y)
- Robbery patterns and trends
 - Evening (6pm-1am) / During Week (Monday)
 - Major thoroughfares and surrounding streets

Area 2: Burglaries

- Points of entry:
 - Residential: Force front/back door/pry window
 - Auto: Window break
- Primary hotspots:
 - Residential: Adams Point (14X), Bushrod (11X), Shafter (12Y)
 - Auto: Temescal (12X), Northgate / Waverly (8X), Grand Lake (14Y)
- Burglary patterns and trends
 - Residential: Day (7am-3pm) / Tue and Fri
 - Auto: Evening (6pm-9pm) / Mon-Fri

- Peak hours 3rd watch (6:00 p.m. 11:00 p.m.)
- Peak days Monday and Thursday

Area 3: Trends (2)

- Several teams are committing robberies using stolen vehicles as get away cars
- Victims generally Asian and Latino
- Victims are generally walking on the street or exiting from cars

 - In front of residences
 - Entering/Exiting vehicles
 - Sidewalks talking on cell phones

Human Trafficking Intervention Efforts

- John Arrests
 - 20 of the males arrested as Johns were Oakland residents
 - 43 of the males arrested as Johns were residents of other cities
 - The cities of Alameda, Berkeley, San Francisco, and San Pablo each had 4 residents
 - Redwood City and San Leandro each had 3 residents
 - Other cities had 1 to 2 residents each
