Re: Castlemont High School Students Quality of Life Assessment and Action Project

All Ninth Grade Castlemont students in their Ethnic Studies class have been looking at the factors that impact their quality of life, including the physical environment and the infrastructure problems in their community. As part of this project, students read various articles about the social determinants of health, which argued that living in poverty has a negative impact on health outcomes. They also conducted their own field research by surveying their peers to learn about how the conditions in their community – even what they see walking to school – can influence how they feel. The field research has deepened their understanding of the effects of their immediate surroundings in East Oakland.

Students then took action by reporting infrastructure issues on the website <u>www.seeclickfix.com</u>. They took photos and reported issues like potholes, graffiti, broken street lights, and illegal dumping in their neighborhoods. Over the past few weeks, they have been tracking the progress on these issues and are prepared to present their findings to the Life Enrichment Committee on May 26, 2015.
