DEFINITION OF CHILD SEXUAL EXPLOITATION

Academic definition:

"A practice by which a person, usually an adult, achieves sexual gratification, financial gain, or advancement through abuse of exploitation of a child's sexuality by abrogating that child's human right to dignity, equality, autonomy, and physical and mental well-being"

"The economic exchanges involved may be either monetary or non-monetary (i.e. food, shelter, drugs) but in every case, involves maximum benefit to the exploiter"

DEFINITIONS

"Romeo Pimping"

When an exploiter lures the victim with gifts, attention, flirtation, and/or physical pleasure.

"Guerilla Pimping"

When an exploiter uses force to coerce a victim to perform sexual acts; this often includes kidnapping

"Survival Sex"

- When a child is engaging in sex for food, money, drugs, shelter, etc.
- This is more common amongst male victims

DEFINITION OF CHILD SEXUAL EXPLOITATION

- CSEC is NOT child prostitution
 - Youth Radio "Real Talk" Video Clip from You Tube

- Children who are exploited are victims and survivors
- Sexual exploitation is child rape
- Pimps and johns should be referred to as exploiters
- CSEC is child sexual abuse

HOW DO CHILDREN BECOME EXPLOITED?

Techniques used by exploiters:

- Seduction
- Isolation
- Coercion
- Violence

Risk Factors or Vulnerabilities:

- Childhood sexual abuse
- Homelessness
- Running away
- Inadequate supervision or care
- Inadequate food, clothing and shelter
- Family and/or community history of exploitation
- Exposure to domestic violence in the home

DATA ON CSEC IN OAKLAND

- The FBI estimates that 100,000 children are sold for sex each year in the US
- Alameda County identified 486 as at risk for or already involved in commercial sexual exploitation from January 1, 2011 to March 20, 2015. Their research found that:
 - 86% had juvenile arrest history
 - 79% had a runaway history
 - 56% had drug use history
 - 40% were currently in custody or had been in custody of Social Services.
 - 22% had a family criminal history
 - 29% had mental health challenges
- Safety Net is a multi-disciplinary team in Alameda County, California that plans for the safety of children who have been commercially sexually exploited and those who are at-risk for exploitation.
- During 2011, Safety Net reviewed 179 separate cases:
- 178 were girls
- Nearly 75% were African American
- Over 50% of the children were on juvenile probation
- Close to 1/3 were dependents under the state's child welfare system

DATA ON CSEC IN OAKLAND

- From 2006 to early 2011, the Oakland Police Department:
 - Reported 1,782 sex trafficking cases
 - Obtained CSEC related charges on 71 traffickers
 - Most cases involved multiple traffickers and child victims of CSE
 - Observed a nexus between exploitation & technology in virtually every case
 - Almost all cases involved victim and/or an offender utilizing Internet tools, most notably Backpage.com to further the exploitation

The Oakland Police Department rescued 305 children from 2006-2014

- In partnership with OPD, BAWAR Sexually Exploited Minors Program
 - Served 202 youth in 2013
 - Served 240 youth in 2014
 - Youth are referred by OPD, the District Attorney's office, and other service providers


- Love Never Fails

ADVOCACY: THE OAKLAND CSEC TASK FORCE

- In 2013, Councilmember Lynette Gibson McElhaney passed legislation to form the Oakland CSEC Task Force. The resolution was passed unanimously by the Council on June 18
- Task Force Members: 70 from service providers, OUSD, Alameda County, City Attorney, District Attorney's Office, community organizations, clergy, and more.

Highlights:

- April 5, 2014 Led a "Day of Action" for the implementation of SB 1193 which galvanized 100 volunteers to inform business owners of their responsibility to post signage about CSEC
- April 20-26, 2015 Supported events for Sexually Exploited Minors Awareness Week
- The CSEC Task Force is open to the general public. We encourage all elected officials, advocates, and service providers to attend our meetings and engage in our work.

- Victims and survivors need:
 - Housing for victims
 - Jobs and employment
 - Support services
- Enhanced Prevention Education & Training
- Continued support from Public Safety Parcel Tax -Measure Z
- Continued financial support to OPD to do operations to provide the youth with an exit path to safety
- Resolution 84456 (the resolution that formed the CSEC Task Force) also called upon the City Administrator to train City staff on the warning signs of CSEC and how to connect youth with appropriate services
