Resolution Urging The United States Congress To End The Trade Embargo on Cuba

Dear Members of the Rules and Legislation Committee,

The economic, commercial and financial embargo on Cuba has been imposed on the island of Cuba since 1960. The embargo has had a detrimental impact on the development of Cuba. It has also had adverse effects on the Cuban citizens and has not achieved it intended goal. Cuba poses no threat to the U.S.

On July 20, 2015 diplomatic relations were officially restored between the U.S. and Cuba and a new era of relations between the two countries were re-established when both re-opened their respective embassies. In March 2016, President Obama was the first sitting US President to visit the island of Cuba in over eighty years and remittance and travel restrictions for U.S. citizens have been eased.

It is time to take it a step further, end this Cold War policy and resume full diplomatic relations with Cuba. The embargo currently serves no purpose; it only harms the people of Cuba and harms the United States' international reputation.

INTRODUCED BY COUNCILMEMBERS REBECCA KAPLAN and ABEL GUILLEN

RESOLUTION URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO END THE TRADE EMBARGO ON CUBA

WHEREAS, in 1960, the United States government imposed an economic, commercial and financial embargo on Cuba; and

WHEREAS, on April 11, 2015, Presidents Barack Obama and Raúl Castro shook hands for the first time at the Summit of the Americas in Panama, signaling a shift in diplomatic relations since the two countries severed their ties decades ago; and

WHEREAS, in March 2016, President Obama was the first sitting U.S. President to visit the island of Cuba in over eighty years, and

WHEREAS, on July 20, 2015 diplomatic relations were officially restored between the U.S. and Cuba and a new era of relations between the two countries were re-established when both re-opened their respective embassies; and

WHEREAS, the embargo harms the citizens of Cuba who suffer as a result of the policy, not the government; and

WHEREAS, we are in the 21st century and the U.S. embargo against Cuba is a policy of the Cold War era that has not achieved its goal; and

WHEREAS, the embargo inhibits the exchange of ideas, medicine, culture, the development of sports relations, investment opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the embargo denies citizens of both Cuba and the United States access to each respective country's medical technology and advancements and denies the exchange of vital medicines and equipment that could lead to improved health for the people of both nations; and

WHEREAS, Cuba has been a friendly international neighbor by exporting and doctors and medicines to other developing nations to combat diseases like Ebola and other international epidemics plaguing some of the most impoverished nations on the planet; and

WHEREAS, Cuba poses no threat to the United States; and

WHEREAS, many believe the embargo has a negative effect on the international opinion and the reputation of the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, many people of the United States and in the world believe this embargo is ineffective, inhumane and is in violation of U.S. laws and international conventions; and

WHEREAS, human rights groups including Amnesty International, Human Rights Watch, and the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights have all been extremely critical of the embargo; and

WHEREAS, it has been estimated that the embargo has cost the U.S. over \$1 billion dollars in lost sales of commercial exports; and

WHEREAS, ending the embargo will create jobs in the U.S. and will create new economic opportunities with the export of technology, food, medicine, and other goods; and

WHEREAS, the embargo is antithetical to the American ideas of security, sovereignty, free trade and markets, and mutual respect; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the City Council of Oakland, California, hereby urges the United States Congress to end the trade embargo on Cuba.
