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

Ceasefire Update

Ceasefire: Goals

- Reduce shootings and homicides through respectful direct communication and followthrough with those at highest risk of violence
- Decrease recidivism and incarceration rates of individuals participating in interventions
- Strengthen police-community relations

Ceasefire: Direct Communication

- Most recent Call-In completed February 2016
- Next Call-In scheduled for May 2016
- Custom Notifications continue with appropriate modifications
- Since 2014, direct communication with 112
 Individuals during Call-Ins and 394 through Custom
 Notifications

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Ceasefire: OPD Commitment

- Dedicated Ceasefire team focused on strategies
- Weekly Shooting Reviews are conducted with relevant OPD staff and outside law enforcement agencies
- Partnership with Probation Department strengthened to include more robust Global Positioning System (GPS) monitoring and compliance checks

Ceasefire: Partnership Commitment

- Bi-monthly coordination meetings with Human Services Department and OPD to produce desired outcomes
- Comprehensive engagement from community partners continues
- All partners are heavily involved in violence reduction

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Ceasefire: Planning and Assessment

- Ceasefire Partnership Retreat held December 2015 to assess the work in 2015 and strategize for 2016
- Monthly Partnership Committee meetings scheduled throughout 2016

Ceasefire: Police Legitimacy/ Procedural Justice


- Police Legitimacy/Procedural Justice Training has been completed for all sworn OPD personnel (725 thus far) with process in place to continue training with new staff
- OPD partnered with Stanford University and the State Attorney General's Office to develop statewide *Principled Policing* training

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Ceasefire: Police Legitimacy/ Procedural Justice

- OPD has presented Procedural Justice Training to 15 local agencies and the expanded Principled Policing Course to more than 25 law enforcement executives throughout California
- The PSN Grant (scheduled for Public Safety in April) will help fund a pilot project that focuses on the implementation of procedural justice principles at shooting and homicide scenes

- · Victims are generally preoccupied
- Victims are generally walking on the street or exiting from cars

Area 5: Homicides and Shootings

- Three of the homicides in the first quarter had family undertones (victim and suspect were family members).
- Non-fatal Shootings:

- Recent shootings appear to involve conflicts between known members and associates of gangs
- Increase in shootings between vehicle occupants

Area 5: Burglaries (2)

- Residential burglaries have decreased 5% for this quarter compared to the first quarter of 2015.
- Commercial burglaries have decreased 15% for this quarter compared to the first quarter of 2015.
 - Jan-Mar 2015: 20 commercial burglaries
 - Jan-Mar 2016: 23 commercial burglaries
