RECOMMENDATION

Staff Recommends That The City Council Adopt A Resolution Authorizing The City Administrator To Change The Name Of Fiscal Year 2015-16 Cultural Funding Program Artists-In-The School Grantee From ARC Associates To Unity Schools, By Amendment To Resolution No. 85820 C.M.S. That Authorized Entering Into Seventy-Seven (77) Cultural Services Grants To Sixty-Eight (68) Oakland-Based Nonprofit Organizations Providing Arts And Cultural Services In Oakland During Fiscal Year 2015-16, In A Total Amount Not To Exceed \$969,500.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Last year, as part of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-16 Cultural Funding Program, a grant for \$16,200 was awarded to ARC Associates for an Art-in-the-School project. ARC Associates has since changed its name to Unity Schools. City Council approval is required to amend Resolution No. 85820 C.M.S. that authorized the Cultural Funding grant, such a change is needed to codify the name change and allow Unity Schools to receive the approved grant.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The Cultural Funding Program awards project and operating funds to Oakland-based artists and arts organizations, through a competitive process. The goal of the program is to provide financial support to artists and arts organizations, encourage arts education in local schools, and support the infusion of arts in Oakland neighborhoods. The Cultural Funding Program reviewed 122 applications in response to a March 30, 2015 Call for Applications. Funding Review Panels comprised of community members, arts professionals, and education professionals reviewed these applications in public meetings held June 10-18, 2015. Based on the panel's application rankings and scores, there was a recommendation that the City award 77 grants to 68 Oakland-based artists and arts organizations for FY 2015-16. A complete list of the recommended grant recipients is included in this report in Attachment B. The Funding Advisory Committee (FAC) met on July 22, 2015 to review the recommendations of the panel, and voted unanimously to recommend that the City Council award the proposed

grants, totaling \$969,500 comprised of \$730,000 from the General Fund balance, and \$239,500 from the Transient Occupancy Tax Fund in FY 2015-16.

The City Council approved the FY 2015-16 Cultural Funding grant awards on October 6, 2015, Resolution No. 85820 C.M.S. The grant award for ARC Associates was included as part of this resolution.

ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES

The applicant organization Oakland Unity High School (OUHS) was founded by ARC Associates (ARC) in 2003. During its inception, the ARC Board of Directors made the decision to have the school managed by its own non-profit organization with ARC providing support services to OUHS. ARC has been providing support services to OUHS under a contractual agreement. However, ARC ended its operation in April 2015 and has ended its contractual agreement with OUHS in July 2015. Unity Schools, a 501(c) 3 entity, was formed to operate the school.

The Cultural Funding applications were submitted in April 2015 before the organization's name transition, with the name listed as ARC Associates, and the Council Resolution dated October 6, 2015 lists the organization's name as ARC Associates for Oakland Unity High School. The City's fiscal services staff will only disburse payment to the name of the organization listed on Council Resolution No. 85820 C.M.S, thus, this amendment is being brought before the City Council.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact associated with changing the name of the grantee from ARC Associates to Unity Schools. The \$16,200 is a part of previously allocated grant funds from Resolution No. 85820 C.M.S. The authorized funds total \$969,500 which is comprised of \$730,000 from the General Fund balance, and \$239,500 from the Transient Occupancy Tax Fund in FY 2015-16.

PUBLIC OUTREACH / INTEREST

The availability and open application period for FY 2015-16 Cultural Funding Program grants was announced in spring 2015. Application guidelines and grant category deadlines were widely publicized from March through May 2015. Outreach included posting on the City website and other sites and publications featuring cultural grant opportunities, emailing notice to interested groups including past grant applicants and all parties contacting the City for arts funding opportunities and announcement of the grant opportunity at public events. Staff conducted six public workshops for prospective applicants April-May 2015. Staff outreach engaged grantees, and effectively informed prospective/new grantees: 30 percent of this year's applicants were first-timers, with the Individual Artist Project category receiving the majority of new applications.

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An open call invited volunteers to serve on peer review panels. Panels convened to discuss and evaluate applications in open meetings, where applicants had the opportunity to attend and speak about their grant proposals. Panels were open to the public and were held June 10-18, 2015 in City Hall, Hearing Room 3. These were well-attended.

The July 22, 2015 meeting of the FAC to review panel recommendations and determine award levels was open to the public and all applicants were informed. The meeting was very well attended by organizational and individual artist applicants, and generally supported the FAC grant recommendations to City Council.

Cultural Funding staff received communication from Oakland Unity High School's Director Lance Tsang regarding the name change in March 2016. He was informed that that changing the name on any grant agreement would require approval from the City Council.

COORDINATION

Date:

The City Attorney's Office and the Controller's Bureau have been consulted in the preparation of this report and resolution. The City of Oakland Funding Advisory Committee has also been consulted, and made the award recommendations herein presented to Council.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: Community-oriented arts activities bolster the cultural arts identity of Oakland, fortifying the city as a destination, and creating positive publicity resulting in varying levels of economic return. The Oakland Cultural grantees employ over 500 cultural workers and support staff. Their activities generate local sales taxes and revenues for city and local businesses. Many Oakland grantee organizations have received international notoriety and draw large crowds for their performances or art work.

Environmental: There are no environmental opportunities or benefits resulting from any action outlined in this report.

Social Equity: The Cultural Funding Program offers an open, competitive process for applicants, resulting in awards to artists and arts organizations that represent all seven Council districts. Social equity is achieved through outreach activities that include Howto-Apply Workshops, one-on-one technical assistance provided by Cultural Funding Program staff, and the recruitment of review panelists that represent Oakland's diverse community. The FY2015-16 grantee roster includes art projects that provide support to artists and organizations that serve low-income, culturally-specific, LGBTQ, youth, and senior communities.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO ENTER INTO SEVENTY-SEVEN (77) CULTURAL SERVICES GRANTS TO SIXTY-EIGHT (68) OAKLAND-BASED NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS AND INDIVIDUAL ARTISTS PROVIDING ARTS AND CULTURAL SERVICES IN OAKLAND DURING FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016 IN A TOTAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$969,500

WHEREAS, in 1985, City Council adopted the first arts funding policies and procedures for the City of Oakland, establishing a panel system of evaluating funding proposals and distributing City funds to the arts; and

WHEREAS, the Cultural Funding Program is the City's funding mechanism to support Oakland-based nonprofit organizations and artists providing arts and cultural activities to the public; and

WHEREAS, the mission of the Cultural Funding Program is to fund Oakland-based art and cultural activities that reflect the diversity of the city for citizens of and visitors to Oakland, focusing on the key areas of General Support, Neighborhood Arts, and Arts Education, through four grant making categories for Individual Artist Projects, Organization Projects, Organizational Support, and Art in the Schools; and

WHEREAS, during June, 2015, three funding review panels convened and forwarded recommendations to award seventy-nine (77) grants to seventy (68) organizations and individual artists proposing to provide arts and cultural programming in the city of Oakland; and

WHEREAS, on July 22, 2015, the City of Oakland Funding Advisory Committee met to review the grant recommendations received from the review panels, and voted unanimously to recommend to City Council that these grants be funded in the amounts listed herein;

WHEREAS, Fiscal Year 2015-16 funds for the Cultural Funding Program are budgeted as follows: \$730,000 in General Purpose Fund (1010), CCAD-Cultural Programs Org (90523), Undetermined Project (P385310); and \$239,500 from the Transient Occupancy Tax surcharge, which will be reserved for arts grants in the Measure C: Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) Surcharge Fund (2419), Cultural Arts & Marketing Org (85511), Cultural Funding Program TOT Project (P391850); and

A RESOLUTION AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 85820 C.M.S. WHICH AUTHORIZED FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016 CULTURAL SERVICES GRANTS, TO CORRECT THE NAME OF ART-IN-THE-SCHOOLS GRANTEE FROM ARC ASSOCIATES TO UNITY SCHOOLS

WHEREAS, in 1985, City Council adopted the first arts funding policies and procedures for the City of Oakland, establishing a panel system of evaluating funding proposals and distributing City funds to the arts; and

WHEREAS, the Cultural Funding Program is the City's funding mechanism to support Oakland-based nonprofit organizations and artists providing arts and cultural activities to the public; and

WHEREAS, the mission of the Cultural Funding Program is to fund Oakland-based art and cultural activities that reflect the diversity of the city for citizens of and visitors to Oakland, focusing on the key areas of General Support, Neighborhood Arts, and Arts Education, through four grant making categories for Individual Artist Projects, Organization Projects, Organizational Support, and Art in the Schools; and

WHEREAS, during June, 2015, three funding review panels convened and forwarded recommendations to award seventy-seven (77) grants to sixty-eight (68) organizations and individual artists proposing to provide arts and cultural programming in the city of Oakland; and

WHEREAS, on July 22, 2015, the City of Oakland Funding Advisory Committee met to review the grant recommendations received from the review panels, and voted unanimously to recommend to City Council that these grants be funded in the amounts listed herein; and

WHEREAS, in September, 2015, the Life Enrichment Committee of City Council approved specific funding recommendations to nonprofit organizations and individual artists, and forwarded these recommendations to the full City Council for approval; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 85820 C.M.S., passed on October 6, 2015, the Oakland City Council approved the funding recommendations to nonprofit organizations and individual artists as follows:
